Some time ago Bruce was taken seriously ill, but is now better. He is a son of Fireman John Hall, of the Ontario street station. In his letter he says: "I was more than surprised the other night. I had just got through shaving, and who walked into the camp but Bruce Hall. I was certainly glad to see him. He came about 9 p. m. and stayed until 10 p. m. He is going to try and get into the battalion with me. It will be great if we can both get together. I don't believe he looked any better in his life than he does now. To look at him you would think he never had a sick day in his life. Tell his mother that I say that she has no need to worry about him. He can take care of himself. If he gets with me I will be a father to him. Some father, eh!"

OUTLOOK IS POOR FOR LOCAL UNION

Bethel and First Congrega-tional Churches Unable to Reach Understanding.
Bethel and First Congregational churches have discussed the question of uniting into one body, but as yet have reached no decision, and, ac-cording to leading members of both churches, the present outlook is not very bright for union. Neither con-gregation, as yet, seems prepared to give up all the things that the other congregation wants it to give up.
One of the chief obstacles to union is the location of the joint place of worship. Bethel's members, who live mostly in the west end of the city, object to coming down to the First church for worship, holding that the united church should be more central than this one is.
A union service of Bethel and First congregations will be held in the former church next Sunday morning, the service to be conducted by Rev. D'Corsey Raynor, of Hamil-ton. Mr. Raynor is sent here by the Congregational Union, and it is thought in some circles that the object of his visit is to remove the difficulties that stand in the way of a union of the two churches.

DANCED IN HIS GARDEN

AN ODD CHARGE OF MAN MADE AGAINST HIS LANDLADY

Edmond Harding said That Miss Noble Made Merry in His Vegetable Garden—Charges Against Couple Dismissed By the Magistrate.
Miss Jane Noble, who rents a house to Edmond Harding and his wife, had the couple before Magistrate Farrell, in the Police Court, on Wednesday. The husband was charged with using bad language, while the wife was accused of assault. Both charges fell very flat, and after the taking of evidence, the Magistrate dismissed both.
The complainant said, among other things, that Harding and his wife made all sorts of noise and disturbed her. The noise consisted of hammering on her home, which was next door, calling at her, and making things disagreeable for her in general.
Harding who went into the box, denied the charges against him and told about Miss Noble annoying him. "I caught her dancing on my car-pet and parsnips in the garden," he told the magistrate.

This made the complainant very warm under the collar, and jumping to her feet exclaimed, "Your Wor-ship, I'm too old to dance. I never did such a thing."

However, Harding stuck to his story about the dancing, and stated that in addition to dancing, Miss Noble raised her skirts up to her knees and clapped her hands. There was also something said about a little tussle Miss Noble had with Mrs. Harding. This occurred when Miss Noble tried to get the key of the front door from her. The latter, however, knew that her land-lady had no right to demand the key until the 30th, inst which will be "moving day," and she hung on to the key for all she was worth. Miss Noble claimed that this little episode constituted an assault, but the Magistrate did not see eye to eye with her on this point, stating that Miss Noble had no right to demand the key until the end of the month.
