MRS. G. A. BATEMAN IS ELECTED PRESIDENT.

Fifty-six on the Roll—Sixteen Penitentiary Prisoners Have Joined the Pocket Testament League.

The annual meeting of the Women's Christian Temperance Union was held on Tuesday afternoon. Reports of the year's work were received. The sum of \$169.93 was raised for the work; \$52.50 was sent to help in the prohibition campaign, \$55.75 was given to support Y. M. C. A. workers among the soldiers at the front to provide soup, chocolate and other comforts for the men in the trenches. Fifty-six names are on the roll.

The following officers were elected: President, Mrs. G. A. Bateman; vice-president, Madames Craig, Lyon and Sparks; recording secretary, Mrs. Stickney; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Halkett; treasurer, Mrs. Muirhead. Mrs. Brebner and Mrs. Sparks were elected as delegates to the provincial convention in Hamilton. Several new members were received.

Good work has been done during the year in the hospital and Sunday schools and among the women prisoners in the penitentiary. Sixteen prisoners have joined the Pocket Testament League.

BUY SOLDIER IN JAIL; INVESTIGATING CASE

W. H. Wylie is tracing up record of sixteen-year-old deserter.

Pte. H. W. Simpson, the sixteen-year-old man who was arrested as a deserter, is in the county jail on remand until some inquiries have been made concerning his case. He is the young fellow justice of the peace George Hunter wanted to send to the central prison for a term of a year and a half.

W. H. Wylie, inspector for the Children's Aid Society, was protested against the boy being given such a stiff sentence, has written to secure the boy's age, and has also notified the Industrial School at Toronto, the lad being a ward of this institution. The authorities can take the boy back to the Home if they so wish. The boy soldier says that he will not be sixteen years old until October 31st.

THE WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF FORM.

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pithy and Pointed Way.

Cobourg Town Council has decided to raise the poll tax from \$1 to \$5.

Alfred Jury, the Canadian emigration agent at Liverpool, is seriously ill.

Capt. C. C. Everly, of the Canadian Veterinary Corps, is dismissed from the service.

J. W. Flavell, chairman of the Imperial Munitions Board, is leaving early in October for England.

The Spanish Government has sent a note to Berlin protesting energetically against the torpedoing of Spanish steamers by German submarines.

Vancouver, B.C., citizens waited on Sir George Foster and presented him with a resolution approving "enforced national service under a proper system of selection."

Austrian officers and soldiers who have arrived in Trieste from the Carso plateau are reported from Trieste to have said that they are tired of the war; they say they can stand it no longer.

Free From Outrages.

That Canada has enjoyed a remarkable immunity from outrage and attack by alien enemies within her borders since the war began, was the statement made by Hon. C. H. Doherty recently, in reviewing the activities of the Justice Department during that period.

Contrasting strongly with the experience of the United States, which, though a neutral country, has had bomb outrages and explosions one after the other proved to be the work of Germans and Austrians, some of whom were her citizens, Canada has had only a few isolated attempts at such acts of violence, and in no case has any serious damage been done. There was, of course, the attempt of Werner Vanhorn, the ex-German army officer from the United States, to blow up the International Bridge at the Vassboro, Maine, end. Extradition proceedings were instituted by the Justice Department, but they will have to await the termination of proceedings taken by the United States authorities.

"The Austrian in Canada has proved to be a thoroughly inoffensive citizen," said the Minister of Justice. "We have released large numbers of them from internment camps. As for the Germans, we have not had much trouble with them, though their sympathies are, as a rule, more strongly with their homeland than with the Americans. Of course we have taken preventive measures."
