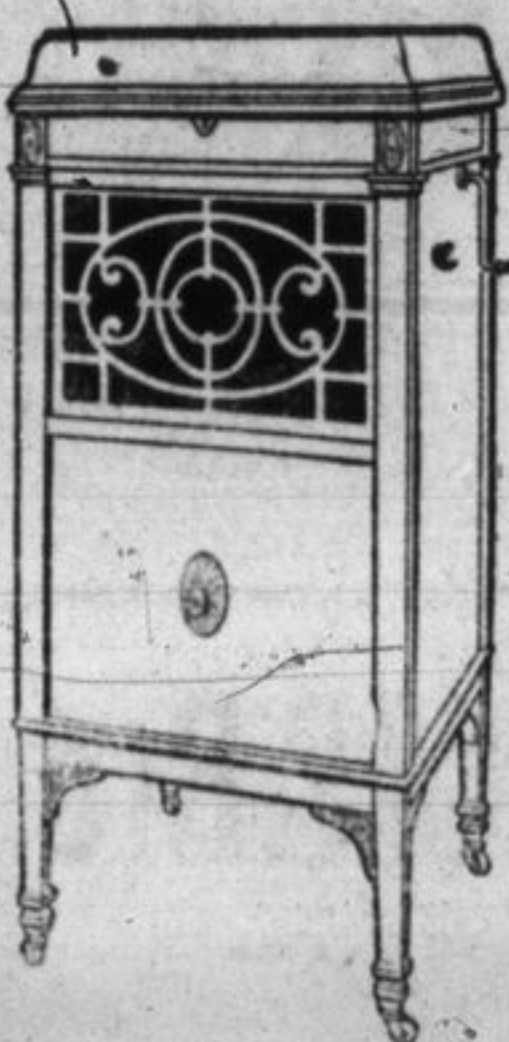

WAR IS THROWING BACK PROGRAMME OF SPORTS

THE WHOLE WORLD UPON GOD, SAYS PRINCIPAL GORDON.

Who Gave the Young Students of Queen's Some Timely Advice in a Splendid Sermon in Convocation Hall on Sunday Morning.

With the opening of a new session at Queen's University, the regular Sunday morning services have commenced, and yesterday Principal Gordon preached the opening sermon in Convocation Hall. At the present time the difficulties that beset a young man with a great war in progress are often almost heartbreaking. The words of the poem sung by a young girl in the bright springtime,

"All's right with the world," do not apply, and there are a great many things wrong which must be righted.

"This war is throwing the whole world back on God," said Principal Gordon. The youth fresh from the University or from school or from his home, starting out upon the journey of life, will fall unless he waits upon the Lord, and has his spirit renewed, and is inspired by the touch of the Lord to perform the heavy duties that are thrust upon each one aiming at success.

THE STORY DENIED

That Belgian Relief Supplies Are Stolen Or Interfered With.

Maurice Goor, Belgian Consul General at Ottawa, has received a wire from American Belgian Relief headquarters in New York as follows:

"Report that German soldiers interfere with our supplies is not true, our system of distribution being so thoroughly organized and our inspection service so effective as to insure control up to the point of actual issue to the people in the same small rations. Beyond this point there is of course the chance that an individual may part with rations for a consideration but you will agree that this is so extremely remote in the circumstances as to be a negligible factor probably of less significance than the inevitable petty leakage in ordinary commercial affairs."

SOLDIER SHOT IN FOOT

Member of 154th Battalion Met Accident At Russell.

Pte. Lavitorie, 154th Battalion, is in the Ongwanada Military Hospital being treated for a gunshot wound in the foot. The accident occurred while the patient was at his home in Russell while on the recruiting trek of the 154th Battalion. He was handling a .22 calibre rifle when the gun discharged and the bullet entered his right foot behind the big toe. The wound was dressed by a doctor at Alexandria and the patient was able to return to the camp on Saturday. He went, however, to the Field Hospital for treatment and later to the Ongwanada.

THE DAY OF ATONEMENT

A Day of Reconciliation of Man With Man.

The Day of Atonement or "Yom Kippur," the tenth day of the month of Tishri, begins at sunset Friday, October 6th and ends at sunset Saturday, October 7th. The thought underlying the day is expressed in the scriptural words, "On this day He will atone for you, to purify you from all your sins." It is a day, therefore, of reconciliation of man with his fellow-man and with God, and comes as a climax to the holiday season, which began Wednesday evening, September 27th with the New Year's Day and continue through the ten days of penitence. On New Year's Day Judgement of ordinary people, who had been neither completely righteous nor utterly sinful was left undecided and the opportunity was given them for repentance; now the Day of Atonement provides all men with the possibility of returning to their God and "finding reconciliation with Him through prayer."

The Day is the most solemn of all days in the Jewish calendar. It is passed in fasting and prayer. The whole day is spent in the synagogue. In the evening there is the service which commences with the chanting of the well-known Kol Nidre prayer. The day proper has four services. Of these the Musaf or additional service contains a description of the atonement rites as practiced in the ancient days in the Temple at Jerusalem; and the Neilah service is understood to be held at the time when decision is finally made as to man's fate, and thus the Neilah prayers instead of having the usual phrase, "Inscribe us in the book of life," uses the expression: "Seal us in the book of life."

According to Jewish tradition expressed in an ancient law-book, the Day of Atonement, when spent in praying and repenting, will bring pardon for sins between man and God; but as for the sins committed by man against his fellow man the Day cannot bring pardon until he has appeased his fellow man. This idea is the basis of the effort always made before the Day of Atonement to bring peace between such friends who have become estranged and are on unfriendly terms with one another; and in this way, the day will put the worshipper at peace not only with his Maker, but with his fellow man.
