ROOSEVELT HITS OUT FROM THE ELBOW

Gets After President Wilson—Calls Lusitania Sinking Colossal Murder.

Battle Creek, Mich., Oct. 2.—Speaking before Saturday afternoon in the interests of Republican presidential candidate Charles E. Hughes, Col. Roosevelt termed the sinking of the liner Lusitania "the most colossal murder of noncombatants by any power calling itself civilized for over a century."

"Had full notice as to what was to be done," and that he erred in not taking action that would have stopped it.

"And after it," said Roosevelt, his teeth flashing in the old way, and his voice raised to a high falsetto, "he only speaks. He said something about being too proud to fight. Imagine George Washington saying that after the battle of Lexington, or Lincoln making such a statement after Sumter was fired on."

Roosevelt declared the President has vacillated and reversed himself. "Even when he did finally act," he said, "the administration refused to recognize Huerta because his title was based on intrigue and assassination," but that Col. Benavides "was recognized as President of Peru, although Benavides imprisoned the President and assassinated the Minister of War and various others."
