A resolution that no alien enemy should have business connections with Jamaica for twenty years after the war was unanimously passed by the elected members. The Government members were instructed not to vote.

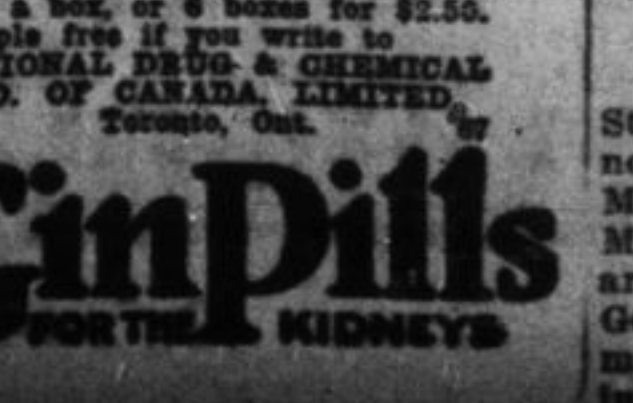

Again the past week 20 1/2c was paid here, while at Brockville 21c was freely paid the same day, and the following day 21 1/2 to 21 3-16c was paid at Napanee. Now, we don't blame those doing the dealing being as cheap as they can, but the salesman that we employ are doing business in a very unsatisfactory way and not boarding their cheese and selling to the highest bidder, allowing buyers to board and sell their goods. I fear the Frontenac Cheese Board will be a total failure if salesmen neglect to board their cheese and sell on the board.—PATRON.
