In Marine Circles

A start was made on Thursday in the raising of the steamer Simla, which went down near the Narrows at Brockville. Over one hundred tons of coal were taken off the vessel.

The steamer Henry B. Hall, which has been in the Kingston Shipbuilding Company's dry dock for two weeks undergoing repairs to her engine, cleared on Friday for Erie.

The schooner Julia B. Merrill cleared on Friday for Oswego. The tug Seymour is on the Kingston Shipbuilding Company's dry dock.

The schooner Katie Eccles cleared for Oswego. The steamer City of Hamilton passed down on Thursday night.

The steamer City of Ottawa passed up on Friday morning. M. T. Co.'s Bulletin: The tug Bartlett arrived with the barges Hamilton and Selkirk with grain from Port Colborne, and cleared with two grain barges for Montreal; the tug Emerson is due to-day with the barge Gaskin, loaded with coal from Fairhaven; the steamer Jex arrived from Charlotte and is discharging a cargo of coal.

Raising Steamer Simla. A despatch from Bucknell says: "The wrecking outfit of the Donnelly company of Kingston, consisting of a steambarge and two scows, arrived at the scene of the wreck of the steambarge Simla, off Coronation Islands during the night and this morning shortly before seven o'clock the work of floating the stranded vessel was started. It is expected some of the cargo of bituminous coal will be removed from the Simla, after which the craft will be raised and taken to either Ogdensburg or Kingston for repairs. The president of the Northern Transportation Company, L. Henderson, of Montreal, owners of the Simla, was in town yesterday. It is expected the vessel will be floated within ten days."

Capt. W. K. Smith, a well-known local mariner, has purchased a steamer, which he intends to operate on the Rideau next summer.
