Hot Gingerbread.
 Materials—One cup brown sugar, 1 cup New Orleans molasses, 1/2 cup shortening, 3 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1 cup boiling water, 1 teaspoon baking soda.
 Utensils—Mixing bowl, 2 measuring cups, teaspoon, wooden spoon, flour sifter, shallow bakepan.
 Directions—Cream the sugar, shortening and molasses together; add the baking soda, dissolved in the boiling water; mix well and add the sifted flour, cinnamon and ginger; mix until smooth. Line shallow pan with paper, put in the mixture and bake thirty minutes in moderate oven.
