IN MOST FITTING MANNER

Fraser has ably looked after his duties, and during his stay with the company has, by his genial and courteous manner, won the esteem of all the employees. It is with sincere regret that the members of the staff say farewell to him but it is their earnest wish that in due time he will be restored to good health, and that he will be in a position to again return to Kingston. With Mrs. Fraser, he leaves on Saturday for his new home. A large circle of friends throughout the city join the staff of the Montreal Transportation Company in their best wishes.

The employees of the company presented Capt. Fraser with a handsome tie pin and a pair of cuff links, and at the same time presented Mrs. Fraser with a lady's companion. E. A. Turner, the local agent of the company, ably looked after the duties of master of ceremonies, and before calling upon Francis King, solicitor for the company, and "Jack" Sowards to make the presentations read an address, which was beautifully engrossed and framed. Mr. King and Mr. Sowards referred to the many sterling qualities of Capt. Fraser, and expressed the deep regret of all the employees at his removal from the city.

Speeches were also made by Capt. Robert Crawford and Hugh Welch, manager of the Kingston Shipbuilding Company, both personal friends of Capt. Fraser. 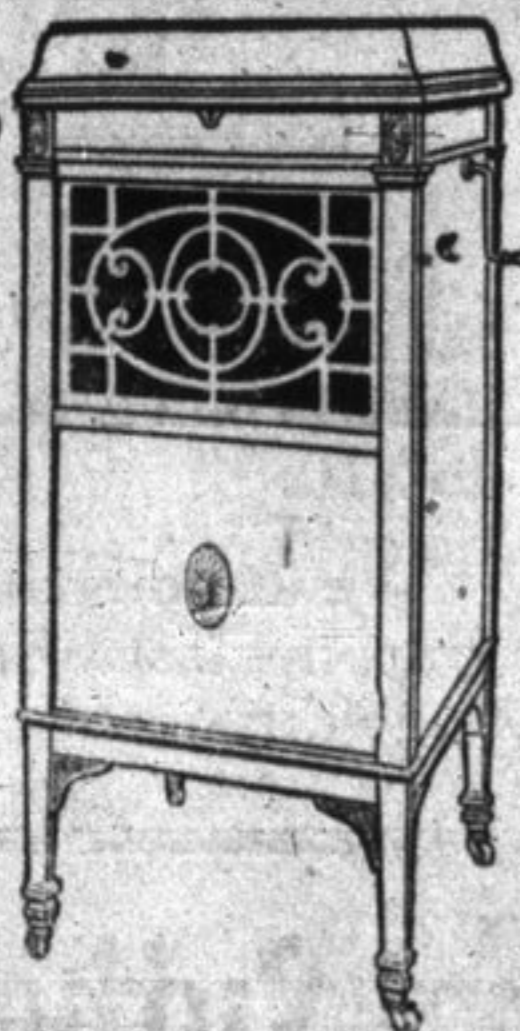
