**UNITED STATES IS
FLAYED BY FIGARO**
Reinach Comments Sarcastically in Paris Paper on Lusitania and U-53.
Paris, Oct. 14.—Under the heading: "From the Lusitania to the U-53," Joseph Reinach says in the Figaro: "How strangely once more the truth stands revealed! Imagine America having sent Germany on the morrow of the wholesale massacre an ultimatum a l'Anglaise, to become effective in forty-eight hours. Either Germany would have given way (and how many victims would have been spared on the high seas), or she would have stood her ground, in which case America would have declared war, and the world war would now be over, or very nearly so.
"The cry of the German press for several months has been: 'America supplies the Allies with cannon and munitions!' What does it matter if the Somme and Verdun munitions were supplied by our own or British arsenals? for Germany there was America.
"Will America accept this siege outside her own ports? This impudent violation of a promise given? Telegrams from New York say that the raid of the U-53 provoked great excitement in financial circles, and shares have fallen ten points and the cotton market forty-nine. The world has occasionally seen a decline in honor and credit. Yesterday I read in Emerson: 'We acquire the force we have vanquished.'"

**HE LAID IN WHISKEY
TO LAST HIS LIFETIME**
Seaforth Man Wanted to Make Sure of Supply for Self and Wife 14 Years.
Clinton, Oct. 14.—Before Police Magistrate Andrews here yesterday Jacob Weber of Seaforth testified that the twelve half barrels of whiskey which he had bought in previous to the closing of the bars and shops was for the use of his wife and himself, and expected it would last them for perhaps fourteen years. He claimed that at the price he bought it, viz., \$2.25 a gallon, it was as good an investment as five per cent, farm mortgages, and as he also expects that while the province might in the future give license to sell beer and wine, whiskey would likely be cut out entirely, he was laying in a stock to do him during his lifetime, and told the court the only fear he had now was that he might not have enough.
The prosecution proved that the liquor had been bought from Walsh Bros. of Starford, 320 gallons, at a cost of \$742, and arrived in Seaforth by wagons about 3 o'clock in the morning, but Weber explained this by saying that he did not want everybody to know that he was putting in such a stock and chose to bring it in at night rather than by freight, although that would be the cheaper way.
While the charge of causing liquor to be brought in for other than personal use was dismissed, there is another charge to be tried later, that of storing for sale or other disposal, and until this is disposed of the twelve kegs which were seized are in the custody of the inspector.

ARRAIGNED IN COURT**
Two Allowed to Return to 156th Battalion—Third Sent to Reformatory.
Three members of the 156th Battalion appeared Friday afternoon before Justice of the Peace Bradshaw, on the charge of being absent without leave from their battalion. Two of them, J. E. N. Brabant and J. H. Campbell, who had merely overstayed their leave, were, at the desire of the military authorities, allowed to return to their unit, provided they paid the cost of an escort back to camp.
