Ottawa, Oct. 14 .- Further action charged to division 42; \$5.35, Ayls- toward securing effective observance of the order-in-council passed in November last regarding the employment of returned soldiers in the government services. The various departments of the service were instructed, in making ap pintments, to give a preference to men who had served in the Canadian expeditionary

> This rule has been observed generally, but the government desires to ensure, in all cases where practicable the granting of priority to men who have served at the front, and at the same time to avoid having appointed the eligible for military duties.

> With this view a new order-incouncil has been passed providing inside or outside service, preferen is to be given to men who have fought at the front and have been honorably discharged, especially those whose former occupations are no longer open to them by reason of disability resulting from military

The Civil Service Commission, as well as the heads and deputy heads of departments, will be held responsible for carrying out this regulation. The rule as to returned soldie candidates for the Civil Service are to be exempt from payment of the usual fees, and the age limit of thirty-

five years is not to apply in the case of a man honorably discharged from service during the war.
