NEW BONDS FORGED IN BRITAIN

N. B. Rowell in Woodstock
"Our men have touched shoulder to shoulder with the men of Great Britain, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa; they have fought as brothers side by side; they have shed their blood in a common cause; they have struggled back to hike and health side by side in the same hospitals; many of their comrades lie buried in the same grave; bonds have been created which will never be broken. However provincial any of them may have been in their vision or outlook before this war, they now know life in its wider ranges and something of its deeper significance. When they return they will pay much less difference to old conventions and customs, to party appeals and shibboleths. I believe they will return to us stronger Canadians than ever, determined to maintain our freedom and self-government, but they will also return with a consciousness of a larger citizenship—a citizenship in the British Commonwealth as a whole—and with the resolute determination to stand together throughout all the days that lie before us, to preserve the liberty, democratic institutions and free government which means so much to them, to us and to all humanity."

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND THE SLACKERS

Industrial Canada.
The paramount importance of the issues facing Canada to-day makes it clear beyond question that safe foundation upon which to build our organization for the prosecution of the war. With the illuminating spectacles before us of what England is doing, of what France, Russia and our other Allies are doing, we must realize that to content ourselves with doing less than our best is to brand ourselves as slackers. Now Canada is no slacker, as the votes of her people will one day show, but the men who comprise the government of Canada are slackers of the worst kind if they persist in negating the desires and efforts of a proud and loyal race that is determined to maintain the traditions of its volunteers who have poured out their life-blood on the battlefields of Flanders.

The thing is so perfectly obvious, so absolutely unanswerable, that in looking for an explanation of the government's policy of masterly inactivity, one is forced to conclude either that they are utterly incompetent to administer Canada's affairs in this time of crisis, or that they attach more importance to the preservation of their political life than they do to winning the war. It may be a brutal statement to make, but why not be frank about it?

WHERE IS THE CANADIAN NAVY NOW?

Hamilton Herald (Ind.).
Obviously it will be far more difficult for the British Admiralty to cope with the danger on this side than it is to do so with it in English waters. What will have to be done, probably, is to despatch a flotilla of destroyers to patrol the waters off Canadian ports and outside the three mile limit off American ports, and convey British ships out of the danger zone.

Col. Stewart, Halifax, for Hospital.
Ottawa, Oct. 13.—Col. Stewart, Halifax, has been recommended to succeed Col. Gorrell as head of the Duchess of Connaught Hospital at Cliveden, England. It is not known whether he will be able to accept.

THE NEW PARTY AND THE WEST

The New Party and the West.
Grain Growers' Guide.
As far as indicated in the Toronto World, the platform of the new independent party would be nationalization of railways, banking and currency reform, the abolition of the patronage system, a non-partisan civil service, national prohibition and national woman's suffrage. The World also calls for honesty in administration, which depends largely upon the standard of men elected.

The men named as possible leaders of the new party are all regarded as protectionists. Unless there is going to be something progressive in tariff legislation in the platform of the new party it cannot hope to win very much support in Western Canada, the greatest burden of the people of this country is that imposed by the protective tariff and it brings no compensating advantages. This same tariff is the chief cause of corruption in public affairs.

If the new party that is proposed actually materializes and is prepared to take the same progressive attitude towards the tariff as towards other national questions, it would seem hopeful that there might be some possibility of the East and the West getting together for mutual advantage.

Before Western Canada can develop as it ought to do, the desperate burden imposed by the protective system must be very largely removed and the taxes necessary for federal revenue must be raised in a manner that will distribute them more equitably over the people of Canada.

The corporation income tax provided for at the last session of Parliament is a step in the right direction. If the protective tariff were removed and taxes levied on land values together with a graduated income tax on private incomes and a graduated tax on corporation incomes there would be a better opportunity for the development of a prosperous and contented people than there is under the present iniquitous system.

FINANCIAL MATTERS.

Toronto Theory of Big Buying of Canadian Steel.
Toronto Theory of Big Buying.
Toronto, Oct. 13.—It is still believed that what New York buying has been going in the Canadian steel stocks is part of an ambitious plan to bring about a consolidation of interests. It has not been a plan of sudden development and will hardly be hurried along.

Back of it all is the idea that when the war ends Canadian industries are going to have a preference over the United States in business with Britain and France and Russia. Plausible as that is the theory to-day, there are enough uncertainties to suggest that American capital will not commit itself too deeply until the future becomes clearer. In the meantime the foundation for a consolidation if being laid.

Turned Down the Option.
Montreal, Oct. 13.—The Montreal holders of the Consolidated Mining Company are kicking themselves over the ultra conservatism of the management. Four years ago the Consolidated secured an option on the Standard Silver Lead property of St. Lawrence, but the option was allowed to expire. Since then the net profits of the Standard have reached \$2,600,000, out of which the sum of \$3,300,000 has been paid in dividends. This fact has been recalled by a quite recent discovery in the Alpha mine owned by the Standard of a body of clear galena ore running 61 per cent. lead and 218 ounces of silver, the estimate being made that there is at least five million dollars in sight.

Order for Trawlers.
Despatch from New York says that the Submarine Boat Co. has a \$30,000,000 order for trawlers for the British Government. The company's profits are estimated at \$15,000,000.

New Incorporations.
In the twenty-six months including September since the war started new companies incorporated in the United States have a capitalization of \$804,227,000, of which new oil and gas companies contribute a total of \$456,000,000 and are 445 in number.

Exchange Seats Up.
A membership on the New York Stock Exchange has been sold for \$70,000, the highest price of the year. Names of the principals were withheld for announcement after the meeting of the committee on admissions to-day. The highest price paid for a seat on the board last year was \$74,000. The latest transaction shows an advance of \$7,000 in the last fortnight.

TIME FOR ACTION, NOT WEASEL WORDS

New York Herald.
Surely, even the most pusillanimous cannot find excuse for delay on the part of the government of the United States in bringing Prussianism to an immediate account for the sinking of the Red Cross liner Stephano, plying between St. John's and New York.

We are all Americans on this side of the Atlantic. The Stephano was engaged in peaceful commerce between two American ports. Her international status was just as clearly that of an American vessel engaged in America coastwise trade as if she were of American registry and flew the flag of the United States. She bore no more relation to the conflict in Europe than does any one of the steamships plying between New York and Norfolk or New York and New Orleans.

The Stephano had among her passengers American men, women and children. She was pursuing her peaceful way in American waters. The lives of the Americans were placed in jeopardy by the crime of this agent of Prussian "frightfulness."

This is American territory—this North American continent—and, thank God! the spirit of the Monroe Doctrine lives in American hearts. Can anybody doubt that the United States would rise in its might to repel a Prussian invasion of Canada?

The warfare instituted by Prussian submarines in American waters is just as much an attack upon the Monroe Doctrine as would be a Prussian attempt to invade Canada.

THE SHELL OUTPUT.

Volume Increasing Each Week—Capacity of Montreal Fuse Plant.
Ottawa, Oct. 13.—Canada's total munition output, as reported by the present week the Imperial Munitions Board has been instructed to place additional contracts to the value of \$60,000,000, running well into 1917.

The quantity of shrapnel shells now produced, complete with cartridge cases, fuses, primers and propellant charge, has reached almost 250,000 per week.

The fuse plant built by the Board at Montreal has now reached a capacity of 10,000 per day, and by Jan. 1st will reach 25,000 per day. The policy of the Board in placing new business will be to keep all plants now producing munitions fully employed.
