REDUCTION IN POWER RATES

Hydro-Electric Engineer Will Recommend a Decrease of \$2.

CONDITION IS ATTACHED

THAT CITY MUST INSTALL ELECTRIC-DRIVEN PUMPS.

Local Commission Seems Disposed to Do This—If This is Done Kingston Will Get Power at \$28 Up to 3,000 Horsepower.

Provided the Utilities Commission installs an electric-pumping plant at the waterworks house, Gordon Kribbs, of the Hydro-Electric Commission, who discussed with the local commission Monday night—the Hydro's power proposition, will recommend that Kingston be given power at \$28 per horsepower up to 3,000 horsepower.

The proposition of the Hydro Commission was as follows: 1,000 horsepower, \$30; 2,000 horsepower, \$28; 3,000 horsepower, \$26; 4,000 horsepower, \$24.

The Commission contrasted these rates with those offered by the Seymour Company, which were as follows: First 3,000 horsepower, \$25; over 3,000 and up to 4,000 horsepower, \$24; over 4,000 horsepower, \$22.

Explains Difference. Asked to account for the difference, Mr. Kribbs said that the Seymour power would in reality cost the Commission \$3 more per horsepower than the figure quoted, as it would have to pay for the stepping-down.

Contract Not Exclusive. Furthermore, the Hydro contract, unlike the Seymour proposal, was not exclusive, the local Commission having the right to use the Campbell power or its own steam plant to take off the peak load and improve the load factor.

Mr. Kribbs thought that the cost of producing power could be materially reduced. Since the Hydro had taken over the Seymour system the heavy overhead expenses had been eliminated, and he was confident that as time went on other means could be found for reducing the cost.

No Capital Investment. Under Hydro, Mr. Kribbs explained the city would be required to make no capital investment, the province providing everything. The Hydro engineer asked as to the outlook for power consumption, said that he thought that the consumption would soon go to 2,000.

WHAT MAKES LIVING HIGHER?

Canadian Courier, Toronto. Surely the action which the Government promised the Labour men to take with regard to the high cost of living will not take the form of another commission.

WILD NIGHT ON LAKE; VESSELS SEEK SHELTER

The Wind Blew Regular Hurricane All Monday Night.

One of the worst gales of the season raged all Monday night, and vessels arriving in port did not venture out again, although there were several arrivals.

The steamer India, with the barge Ungava, both grain laden from Port Colborne, arrived in port at 4 o'clock on Tuesday morning, during the time the storm was at its worst.

SNEAK THIEF AGAIN AT WORK IN CITY

Got Into the Office of H. F. Price's Milk Dairy and Stole \$11.

Some time during Monday night the office of H. F. Price, at his milk dairy on Princess Street, was robbed of \$11.

It is believed that the thief secured an entrance to the building via the upper door, where the milk is hoisted in. A window in the office was found to have been smashed, showing that he had taken this means of getting at the till.

Duty of Hydro Commission. Commissioner G. Y. Chown thought the Hydro in all fairness to Kingston, should give at least as low a rate as the Seymour Co offered, seeing that the province had stepped in just when the city was about to make a contract with the private concern.

"I think," said Mr. Chown in conclusion, "that we should tell Hon. Mr. Ferguson, who negotiated the Seymour deal, that we'll be damned if we'll pay the Government more than we would have had to pay the Seymour Co."

New Proposal. Mr. Kribbs frankly admitted that he realized the position the local commission was in, and that he would like to meet the Seymour rate.

The Hydro Commission would install an electrically driven motor pump or pumps at the waterworks house for the purpose of boosting the load factor, or he would recommend to the Hydro Commission that Kingston be given a rate of \$28 for the first 3,000 horsepower, which was what it would have had to pay for Seymour power.

The question of rates being temporarily disposed of, the commission went over the rest of the contract with Mr. Kribbs, but nothing was found for controversy.

Asked what 25 per cent. leeway mentioned in the contract, meant, Mr. Kribbs explained that if the city contracted for 1,000 horse power, it would be required to take only 750.

Mayor Richardson asked when provided a contract was made, power could be delivered to Kingston, and Mr. Kribbs replied that delivery could be made inside of four months.

SILVER CROSSES FOR MOTHERS. The suggestion made by W. A. Fraser, a prominent Canadian, that a specially designed silver cross be awarded to every mother who has lost a son in the war, is being everywhere endorsed throughout the Dominion.
