Fried Tomatoes.

Materials-Four large tomatoes, 2 tablespoons drippings, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon cloth. salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 8 pieces of Dir toast, 4 sprigs of parsley.

Utensils-One large frying pan, cake turner or spatula, teaspoon, taspoon, sharp knife and toaster Directions-Put the drippings

pan; when hot put in the tomatoes, which have been dusted with salt pepper and sifted with flour. When brown turn and fry slowly. Sprinkle with sugar and pour in the cold milk; cook until thick, (about on platter and lift the tomatoes on the toast; pour the gravy around and

Materials - One and-one-half pounds meat, 1 cup cut carrots, 3 cup cut celery, 1 cup onions, 1 quart small potatoes, 1 teaspoon salt, teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon sugar, tablespoons flour, Itablespoon caramel, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 1 quart boiling water, 1/4 cup cold wa-

Utensils-Small roast pan, paring knife, measuring cup, teaspoon, tablespoon, small bowl, piece of cheese-

Directions-Have the butcher saw the bone in 2 places (which will make six small pieces). 


