### A BATTALION FOR QUEEN'S MOTHER RECEIVES SAD NEWS

#### MAJOR P. G. C. CAMPBELL APPOINTED TO COMMAND.

R. D. Sutherland May be Second in Command—Capt. J. E. D'Esteer Likely to be Made Commandant at Fort Henry.

The Militia Department has accepted the recommendation made by Brig.-Gen. T. D. R. Hemming, G.O.C., that was published some time ago in the Whig that Queen's University should have a kilted battalion. Major P. G. C. Campbell, as present commandant of Fort Henry, will be in command, and to amalgamate the university and city interest in the unit, Ex-mayor R. D. Sutherland will probably be second in command. The major has a host of applications for positions as officers but they will be chosen only on their ability to recruit men for overseas. Major Campbell expects that recruits will be coming from the city and country, and the battalion will also recruit graduates and students of Queen's University throughout the Dominion.

The 146th Battalion band will be the musical organization, as it will be returning to Canada in the near future.

In regard to organization, Major Campbell will depend to a great extent on Major G. I. Campbell, chief recruiting officer, who has been exclusively engaged in such work.

The organization will not commence until all plans for the whole campaign is settled, and this will not be before the principal officers are selected. He expects them to have the men come in at one time and not have them "dribbling in one at a time." The campaign will be conducted with a rapidity.

The successful for the fort position vacated by Major Campbell will probably Capt. J. E. D'Esteer, who is next senior on the list of officers who wish the position. He has been on duty for some time, and should make an excellent commandant.

### QUEEN'S DESIRES \$50,000

#### IT AIMS AT \$10,000 A YEAR FOR FIVE YEARS.

Movement Inaugurated by Trustees—Committee Appointed to Nominate Principal to Continue Its Work—Attitude of Staff and Students Toward War Praised.

At the meeting of the trustees of Queen's University, Wednesday afternoon, a movement was inaugurated to supplement the income of the university by \$10,000 a year for five years. A number of the trustees undertook to make annual subscriptions.

The committee appointed to nominate a successor to Principal Gordon, who has resigned, was not in a position to make a report, and it was empowered to continue its searching and sifting.

Resolutions were adopted, expressing appreciation of the part the staff and students were playing in the war. They were as follows: "The Board of Trustees desires to express its profound appreciation of the spirit of self-sacrifice which has marked the members of the staff of Queen's who have enlisted in this war and their readiness to face every possibility."

"The Board sends its sympathetic greeting to those who have received honorable wounds, and prays, that if it be the will of God, they may have a complete recovery."

"The Board of Trustees rejoices in the enthusiastic response of the students of Queen's University to the call of the war. It congratulates them on the intelligent sense of duty which has prompted their action, and on the justice of the cause they have espoused, and assures them that their career as soldiers of the King will be followed with the keenest interest, and the most fervent wishes for a happy issue of it."

### MOTHER RECEIVES SAD NEWS

#### THAT HER SON, THOMAS HUTTON, WAS KILLED IN ACTION.

Saw Name in Casualty List and Wired Militia Department, Which Informed Her That Soldier Was Her Son.

There is sadness in the little home of Mrs. Ann Hutton, at 113 Barrack street. On Thursday morning Mrs. Hutton received a telegram from Ottawa informing her that her son, Pte. Thomas Hutton, had been killed in action on Oct. 4th. Another son, Pte. John Hutton, is laid up in an hospital in England suffering from German gas.

Mrs. Hutton is one brave woman. She has but the two sons, and she gladly consented to their going to the front to fight for King and country. She has given her all, and now in her time of sadness will have the sincere sympathy of the entire community. Both sons enlisted with the 33rd Battalion at London, Ont.

Mrs. Hutton first learned that her son had probably been killed in reading over a casualty list in a newspaper. Every day since her boys went on the firing line the anxious mother has been reading the long list of casualties in the newspapers. She came across the name of Thomas Hutton, but as the name appeared with the 4th C.M.R. she did not think that it was her boy. However, to make sure she wired the Militia Department at Ottawa, with the result that she got a telegram on Thursday morning informing her that her son had paid the supreme sacrifice. The deceased was twenty-six years of age, while the other brother is twenty-three years old.

### F. A. White Believed Killed.

Frederick Arthur White, whose family resides on Johnston street near Victoria, has been missing since a late engagement, and is now believed killed, according to a message received by his wife on Thursday morning. The deceased was a resident of Ottawa until enlisting, at which time his wife moved here. Daniel M. Savoyers, who boarded at 412 Barrie street, has been wounded, according to the casualty list.

### WAS QUITE SURPRISED

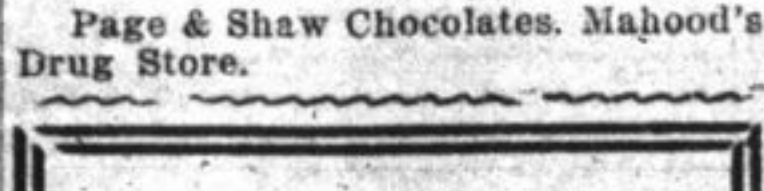
#### At the Attack Made Upon Him For the Part He Took.

### In Marine Circles

The following is taken from the Oswego Times:

"The spot where the Metzner went aground is known in marine circles as the 'boneyard.' Many vessels have gone ashore there, including the schooner 'Wayne,' which was owned by the late M. J. Cummings, loaded with grain; the barge James G. Blaine, which was loaded with coal; the schooner Albacore and the schooner Snow Bird. The Albacore is the most recent wreck. This schooner was making port one early morning in a heavy wind and was picked up just outside the harbor entrance by the late Captain William Scott. The tug succeeded in getting a line to the schooner and almost had her safe when a gust of wind caught the schooner and tug. The schooner was drawing the tug back into the lake though every ounce of steam was being used to check the schooner's path to destruction. Unable to make any headway and to save his own boat, Captain Scott was forced to get clear of the schooner. A short time later the schooner landed in the 'boneyard,' the crew was rescued and the boat later was pounded to pieces."

Movements of Vessels.

The schooner Katie Eccles arrived from Oswego, with a cargo of coal for Robert Crawford.

The steamer Jax cleared on Thursday morning for Oswego.

The steamer Saskatchewan passed up at 8.30 p.m. Wednesday, and the steamer Doric passed down at 4.30 o'clock on Thursday morning.

Raising the Sunda.

The work of starting pumping water out of the sunken steambarge Simla, near Coronation Island was started Wednesday morning, six steam pumps, each throwing a 12-inch stream, being engaged. The work of raising the stranded craft has progressed materially, and it is expected the barge will be in dry dock in a day or two.

Weather Notes.

The storm from the Gulf of Mexico is now centred in the Middle States, and is moving north eastward. The weather is cold in all the provinces except British Columbia, and rain is falling throughout Ontario and storm signals are displayed at ports on the Great Lakes and also in the Gulf and maritime provinces.
