COUNCIL OF WOMEN MET

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE TO GATHER HERE IN NOVEMBER.

Local Body Favors Making of Toys in Canada—Desires that Provincial Voters' Lists be Used for Dominion Purposes.

An interesting meeting of the executive of the Local Council of Women took place in the council chamber on the 12th instant, when various important items of business were attended to. In regard to the partitioning of the Duchesse de Connaught, no remonstrances to the treasurer were reported, but as it was found that the Daughters of the Empire had already collected a handsome sum for the purpose, and as people are generally overtaxed for similar ends, it was agreed that the Kingston Council should, in this matter, allow itself to be represented by one of its strongest and most patriotic societies.

The police matron, Mrs. Ensign Smith, was present, and at the President's request, gave a most touching report of her work among erring women, which called forth expressions of warm sympathy from members present, and a standing vote of thanks for the efficiency of her much needed work, which has so amply justified its initiation and recommendation by the Council.

A resolution forwarded by the Toronto council was endorsed by the meeting, asking that, as in the western provinces which have adopted equal suffrage, the provincial voters' lists should be accepted for Dominion purposes, as usual without alteration.

Canadian Toy-making. A communication from Watson Griffin, on behalf of the Minister of Trade and Commerce, asking co-operation in the promotion of the business of toy-making in Canada, was also brought before the members, one of whom reported the interesting exhibition of Canadian-made toys which she had lately seen in Toronto, and it was agreed to bring the matter to the notice of the local dealers, with the view of encouraging this profitable employment here.

The question of extending to the executive of the National Council of Women an invitation to hold its November meeting in Kingston was then considered, and after a lively discussion of ways and means, it was decided to leave the final decision to the sub-executive, who should meet at an early date, for fuller information regarding local possibilities should have been secured.

At this subsequent meeting, last Wednesday, it was agreed that the Kingston Local Council should invite the National Executive to meet in this city on the 16th and 17th of November, an arrangement which, it is hoped, will prove beneficial to all concerned, as Kingston is a convenient and central place of meeting; and as some of Canada's leading women workers will be present, interesting discussions and national and pressing problems of social services may be expected.

The business sessions of the National executive are open only to delegates, and the proxies of such are may be absent; but there will be evening meetings in Convocation Hall at which inspiring and illuminating addresses may be expected.

PTE. ANDERSON WOUNDED. Young Kingstonian Has Been Serving With 8th C. M. B. Pte. Albert Anderson has been wounded in action. His mother, who resides at 124 Lower Bagot street, received a telegram from the Militia Department at Ottawa announcing the fact. Pte. Anderson was wounded on Oct. 3rd. He was serving with the 8th C. M. B. in France with the Fourth Infantry Brigade.

Buried in France. Mrs. J. Murray, 100 Lower Bagot street, has received a letter from the Adjutant-General's Department at Ottawa, which gives particulars regarding the burial of her son, Gunner F. Murray, who died of wounds. He has been buried at Boulogne Eastern Cemetery, a recognized military burying ground in France. A wooden memorial, bearing all the particulars of his death, has been erected.

Now in Germany. List of prisoners of war now in Germany shows that Lieut. Frederick S. Hubbs, 4th C.M.R. Battalion, is at Reserve Lasarette (Hospital), 3 Kollschuhel, Stuttgart, Germany. Lieut. Hubbs trained last year at Barrielfield camp as an officer of the 8th C.M.R.

A Number Have Been Issued by the City Engineer. Morrison & Robinson have taken out a permit with the City Engineer for the erection of a dairy on Johnson street, between Ontario and King streets. It will be built of brick and cement blocks.

E. Anderson has secured a permit for the erection of a store on the southeast corner of Princess and Division street. It will be built of cement and plastered.

J. W. Smith has a permit for the erection of two brick veneer cottages on the north side of Plum street, between Barrie and Cherry streets.

R. H. Somerville has a permit for a dwelling on Frontenac street north, on the west side.

Work on Metzner. Captain C. Daryaw, of the schooner Lizzie Metzner, aground at Oswego is discussing the proposition to get the New York Central wrecking crane, having a capacity for lifting sixty to eighty tons, to work on his boat that he may block her up and thus save her from the ice this winter.

The case against G. A. McGowan for not having proper sanitary improvements put in his cigar factory and against R. J. McLelland in houses for which he acts as agent, will be heard by Magistrate Farrell on Tuesday. D. B. Murray has contributed \$10 to the Belgian relief fund.

MEMBER OF C.M.R. WRITES

ABOUT THE WORK BEING DONE IN ENGLAND.

Regiment Moving to Do Coast Duty; and Trooper W. W. Peck Does Not Expect to Get to France This Winter.

Major W. Alan Stroud, recruiting here for "C" squadron, Canadian Mounted Rifles in Hamilton, has received a very interesting letter from Trooper F. H. Peck, formerly of "C" squadron, and now with "E" squadron, R.C.D.R.E. The letter reads: "We get lots of work and little to eat, but are getting hardened to it now. We have quite an assortment of drills here, and the troop drill is all done in two ranks. Our daily programme is as follows: 6 a.m. to 7 a.m. physical drill; 7 a.m. to 8.30 a.m., breakfast and clean-up; 8.30 a.m. to 9.30 a.m., sword drill; 9.30 a.m. to 10.30 a.m., musketry; 10.30 a.m. to 11.15 a.m., troop drill; 11.15 a.m. to noon, bomb throwing; noon to 1.15 p.m., dinner and rifle cleaning; 1.15 p.m. to 2.15 p.m., bayonet fighting; 2.15 p.m. to 3.15 p.m., more musketry; 3.15 to 4.45 p.m., extended order. Supper is at 5.30 p.m.

"You certainly have to soldier here and they are very strict on discipline and you get no special appearance. You get handed seven days if you fail to shave in the morning, and I believe they would lock you up for duration of the war if you shaved your upper lip.

"Joe Kennedy and Bill Crapps have both got on stripes, so I guess Crappe is on the way to get his three again. Mostly all of the three Hamilton drafts are in France. Andy Forsythe, Joe Smith, Cleary and Chick Kennedy went last Sunday morning. The majority of the boys have gone over and are attached to the 9th and 11th Reserve Infantry Battalion, but some have gone over as mounted police. I do not expect that any of us fellows on this last draft will get over this winter, as the whole regiment is moving out to a place about seventy miles from here to do coast guard all winter. We are to be ready by twenty-four hours' notice. It will be three or four days' horseback ride, so I expect we will feel kind of sore when we arrive.

"We have seen quite a few Zeppelin raids from the camp here, being an average of two or three a week. The best air raid we saw was the one that was in progress the night we landed. It lasted for about three hours, and they failed to bring it down, but they got one down in flames Saturday night."

A pretty October wedding was solemnized at three o'clock Saturday evening at the home of Mrs. McCallum, North Waterloo street, Stratford, when her daughter, Mary C., became the wife of Lieut. E. J. L. Stinson, of the 11th Battalion, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Stinson, formerly of Kingston. The ceremony was performed in the drawing room by Rev. Finlay Matheson, of St. Andrew's church. Following the ceremony, a buffet luncheon was served, the bride cutting her cake with Capt. Glen N. Gordon's sword. At 5 o'clock Lieut. and Mrs. Stinson left on a trip to points in Eastern Ontario, the bride travelling in a green velvet suit, with small hat to match, and corsage of orchids and lily of the valley.

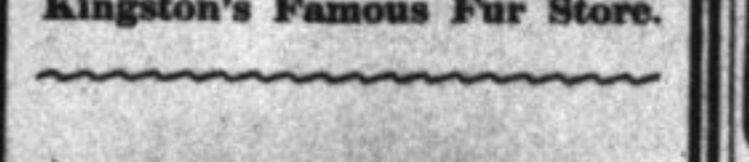
