Three Policemen Wounded-Siege of Over an Hour-Posse Attempted to Arrest Man Who Had Squatted on Farm Eighteen Years.

New York, Oct.25,-Sheriff Paul Stier, of Queens County, was shot instantly killed and three polcemen were wounded this afternoon when the sheriff attempted to execute a warrant of arrest issued Frank Taff, who for eighteen years has lived as a squatter on the old John D. Locke farm, two hundred yards north-west of the railroad station at Whiteston Landing, Long Island. The squatter, known by many persons in the community to have always been very eccentric, was finally killed on top of his shanty, where for an hour and twenty minutes he had kept at bay a posse including nearly forty policemen and deputies.
