### DEMAND WILL BE LARGE FOR CANADIAN CATTLE TO REPLENISH THE WORLD.

Preparations Are Needed—Closer Co-operation Between Cattle Breeders is Held Desirable.

Ottawa, Oct. 25.—The whole world will look to this continent, particularly Canada, for replenishing its supply of cattle, which has been reduced to unprecedented proportions by the war, and means towards supplying this need were outlined by H. S. Arkell, assistant live stock commissioner for the Dominion, in evidence submitted to the Dominion's royal commission yesterday.

He made several recommendations. First, was an intelligent system of handling the industry. Annual statistics were needed. In the past they have been issued every ten years. Statistics should also show the quality and condition as well as the number of cattle. There should be definite periods during the year for marketing cattle, so that the farmers could raise cattle to suit that time. Statistics should not be biased for commercial reasons. Information and statistics should also be supplied regarding the condition in competitive cattle raising countries, such as the Argentine and the United States. Field officers ought to be appointed in Canada, and at least one technically trained man should be stationed in Great Britain to organize the export trade.

He believed that there should be closer co-operation between farmers in the cattle trade such as now ex-

Constable Barnes of Marmora arrived in town and took Seltych in charge on a warrant signed by B. C. Hubbell, J. P. Seltych is said to have had a stolen shirt and a new pair of boots on when arrested.

### DESIRES TO DOUBLE ONTARIO HOSPITAL AT ORPINGTON, ENGLAND—4,000 MORE BEDS ARE WANTED FOR CANADIANS.

London, Oct. 25.—Agent-General Reid has just cabled Premier Hearst regarding a proposal to add 500 to 1,000 beds to the Ontario Hospital at Orpington. He thought possibly that if Ontario, was only willing to supply 500, the balance could be supplied from the Dominion, but he hoped Ontario would give one thousand beds.

### COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

Perjury Charge Arises Out of Toronto Doctor's Testimony.

Toronto, Oct. 25.—Dr. James C. Beatty of Brunswick avenue appeared in the police court yesterday on a charge of perjury and was committed for trial. Bail in one surety of \$1,000 was furnished by the doctor's mother. The charge arose out of the sworn testimony of Dr. Beatty during the trial of Dr. L. N. Coulter, found guilty in the general sessions of performing an illegal operation upon Annie Sweet. At that trial Beatty testified to the best of his belief and according to his records, that he had made a test of the girl's blood. Miss Sweet swore yesterday morning that she was not in Toronto on the date when the doctor was supposed to have made the test.

Counsel for Dr. Beatty asked that his client be allowed to see the girl's arm. Miss Sweet consented, but insisted that the doctor first say which arm he wished to examine, claiming that one of her arms bore a mark which resulted from a test made by Dr. Jukes Johnson. This caused a deadlock; no examination was made and Dr. Beatty was committed for trial.

## Gananoque

October 25.—There was a rather small turnout to the nomination meeting called for Monday evening at the town hall to nominate a candidate to fill the vacancy at the Council board by the resignation of councillor William Pratt to accept the position of tax collector for the municipality. T. I. Ellis, four and feed merchant, was the unanimous choice of the gathering and was therefore duly elected by acclamation. Mr. Ellis moved into town from Pittsburg township a few years ago and has during that time taken an active interest in the progress of the town.

### Recruiting Meetings.

Brockville, Oct. 24.—Last evening in the town hall at Prescott addresses were delivered in the interest of recruiting for the 207th Sportsmen's Battalion. The speakers were Lieut.-Col. C. W. MacLean and Capt. S. N. Dansey, lately returned from France. On Wednesday evening at the New Theatre, Brockville, the same two speakers will hold a meeting. It will be under the Speakers Patriotic League, and a large crowd is expected to attend. Lieut.-Col. MacLean is a former mayor of Brockville, and now the officer commanding the 207th Battalion.

### EXCHANGE OF PRISONERS.

Only Few at Fort Will be Allowed to Return to Germany.

The agreement of the British and German Government to exchange all interned prisoners over the age of forty, as announced in a London cable, will not mean the release of very many Germans from Fort Henry. It is thought that there are only about twelve German prisoners who are over forty-five years of age. Of course, said an official, many more will claim that they are past that age, but as there is at the fort a record of the age of each prisoner as given by himself, it will be hard to convince the authorities that they have suddenly grown several years older.

### HUGHES HITS "HYPHENS."

He Disdains Support of Men Swerved by Allen Machinations.

New York, Oct. 25.—Charles E. Hughes told an audience that he did not want the support "of anyone who has any interest superior to that of the U. S., who would not instantly champion the right and interest of America against any country whatever, who wants immunity for foreign aggression or who would have the power of this nation held captive to any foreign influence or swerved by alien machinations." This is the first public utterance of the Republican nominee indicating repudiation of pro-German support.

### IN CRITICAL CONDITION WITH GUNSHOT WOUNDS

Pte. Dennis Murphy, of Kingston, Had Leg Amputated Just Recently.

Pte. Dennis Murphy, formerly of Kingston, who is overseas with the 5th Royal Highlanders, is lying in No. 4 General Hospital at Camiers, seriously ill from gunshot wounds in the left arm. His left leg was amputated a short time ago.

Pte. Murphy, whose mother lives at 108 Montreal street, was but three weeks in the trenches before being hit, and for several weeks has been hovering between the "slightly improved and dangerously ill" condition, according to numerous telegrams received from the Militia Department.

Norman Murphy, son of Mrs. Murphy, is now in France with the Canadian Mounted Rifles, and Corp. Thompson, a son-in-law, is also overseas with the 21st Battalion.

### MONTREAL WHISKEY MAKES FATAL DEBAUCH

Jury Informed of Facts Relating to Death of Bridget O'Reilly.

Toronto, Oct. 25.—An express order for three bottles of whiskey from Montreal was among the documentary evidence produced at the inquest last night concerning the death of Bridget O'Reilly, sixty years of age, late of 84 Clarendon avenue, on Monday last, October 22. The evidence went to show that friends had visited the house on Sunday and departed after having emptied the three bottles. Mrs. O'Reilly and her son slept on the floor and in the morning she was found dead. The jury brought in a verdict of death from natural causes, in accordance with the medical evidence.

### ROOSEVELT WOULD USE BIG STICK ON TEUTONS

He Would Have Forced Issue After the Sinking of the Lusitania.

Denver, Colo., Oct. 25.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt told an audience here yesterday that if he had been president and had sent President Wilson's "strict accountability" message to Germany "there would have been no more ship sunk—unless there was a fight afterward. The Lusitania was sunk with its 1,394 deaths as a consequence because other nations believed we'd welcome being kept out of war. If I had been president then I'd have asked every interned German ship and then I'd have said to Germany, 'Now, we'll see not what you are going to give us as compensation for this, but what we are going to give you.'

"I abhor a peevish, wanton war. But if it were necessary to protect our women and children I'd have gone to war as the Entente powers did. When I was president and Germany wanted to assume control of part of Venezuela 'temporarily' I got Deway and had every ship in the fleet ready down south of Porto Rico. And I got the arbitration I asked for because Germany knew I meant what I said."

"If it had been otherwise we would have had a German stronghold in Venezuela, and most of the present war would have been fought right here at our front door."
