To Sign an Agreement for Increased Wages and Better Conditions.

(Special To The Whig) Winnipeg, Oct. 26 .- C.P.R. trainmen at 11 o'clock to-day went into conference with Grant Hall at the C.P.R. offices to sign an agreement which gives increased wages and bet ter working conditions to 8,000 conductors, brakemen and yardmen. The men received much more than was given by the 1915 board of arbitration. That did not concede any increase in wages. The company will now pay preparatory time in yards before trains commence to move, and will also pay for the time spent in switching in junction points and will pay for a minimum of mileage of 2,-800.

New York End of the Case-A Conspiracy Action as a Side-Issue-The Clergyman's Charges Against

His Wife. New York, Oct. 26.-Rev. John Edmund Triplett, a Presbyterian clergyman, has brought an action for divorce against his wife, and charges her with intimacy with three men. The divorce is the aftermath of a conspiracy case heard at New Haven, Conn., last June, in which Grenville Hampden Triplett, an attorney of New York, to serve between four and ten years in the state prison, convicted of an assault on Mrs. However, groups of Conservative Dorothy A. Triplett, wife of his bromembers of Parliament continue to ther, the clergyman. The evidence showed that the lawyer had arranged the enactment of the assault in order to obtain divorce evidence for his brother. J. Wilson Shaw, Frank Campbell and Thomas J. Donahue were charged with being co-conspira-

The trial was sensational, and during its course Donahue and Campbell, witnesses for the accused, were arrested for perjury, and Shaw was also arrested and held, pending action on serious charges in connection

Induced to Go to New York.

Mrs. Triplett, according to the evidence brought out at the trial, had been induced to go to New Haven on May 15th, 1915, to meet a New York real estate dealer for the purpose of discussing the sale of some property belonging to her mother, Mrs. Dora M. Nelson, of New York. This man met Mrs. Triplett at the Garde Hotel and induced her to go to a room where they might talk without being disturbed. It is alleged that he there attacked her, and as he did so Grenville H. Triplett, Donahue and Shaw

forced the door of the room. After the conspiracy case Mrs. Triplett brought, in the New York courts, an action for separation, accusing her husband of cruel and inhuman treatment.
