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

#### R. C. CORPORATION SUED IN THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S

ACTION BEING HEARD IN COUN- THE TY COURT.

Plaintiff Is E. P. Halligan, Who Installed Heating Apparatus Cushendall Church and in Priest's House.

The adjourned sittings of the ounty Court opened Thursday morning before Judge Madden, of Napanee. The first case was that of E. P. Halligan against the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation Kingston. The plaintiff installed heating system in the Cushendall church, and is suing for moneys for work done and for material supplied. A. B. Cunningham appeared for the plaintiff, and J. L. Whiting, K.C. for the defendant.

William G. Simmons, of Simmons Bros., said that in September, 1915, his firm tendered for the heating of the Roman Catholic church at Cushendall. Two tenders were submitted, one being for \$760 and the other for \$820.
