## R. C. CORPORATION SUED

### ACTION BEING HEARD IN COUNTY COURT.

Plaintiff is E. P. Halligan, Who Installed Heating Apparatus in Cushehdall Church and in Priest's House.

The adjourned sittings of the County Court opened Thursday morning before Judge Madden, of Nanawau. The first case was that of E. P. Halligan against the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation of Kingston. The plaintiff installed a heating system in the Cushehdall church, and is suing for money for work done and for material supplied. A. B. Cunningham appeared for the plaintiff, and W. Whiting, K.C., for the defendant.

William G. Simmons, of Simmons Bros., said that in September, 1915, his firm tendered for the heating of the Roman Catholic church at Cushehdall. Two tenders were submitted, one being for \$760 and the other for \$820.

### Plaintiff's Evidence.

E. P. Halligan, the plaintiff, who is a plumber in Kingston, said that he put in a tender for \$735, after having been told by a member of the Cushehdall church committee that McKelvey & Birch had submitted a tender for \$745. When Father Kingsley, the parish priest, learned that the system which the plaintiff proposed to install would heat the church only to sixty degrees when it was open outside, he declared that it would not do, as it was desired to have a system which would heat the church to seventy degrees when it was twenty degrees below zero on the outside. He told the plaintiff that he was anxious to give him the job, and showed him the plans submitted by Simmons Bros., McKelvey & Birch, and Elliot Bros., along with their prices.

The plans made by Simmons Bros. being suitable, Father Kingsley, the witness testified, consented to his making a copy of them and submitting the copy to the committee, accompanied by a new tender, this new tender was for \$880, and included the heating of the priest's house as well as the church. This was \$25 less than the work would have been done by Simmons Bros. The tender was accepted and work was begun.

When the plaintiff was well advanced with the contract, early in May, 1915, he asked for some money on account, but this was not immediately forthcoming. Indeed, he had finally to issue an ultimatum to Father Kingsley that he would not return to complete his contract until he had received some money. The plaintiff had a sign placed on the furnace to the effect that he was not to be used.

At the request of the Archbishop, he returned and completed the contract. He was given a cheque for \$500 for the work on the church, and \$300 for the work done in the house, making \$800 still due on the contract. The plaintiff said that he had also presented a bill for \$130.30 for extras. He stated he had completed the tender according to agreement. The extras in the house, he said, were put in on the instructions of Father Kingsley, while those in the church grew out of the specifications.

### Father Kingsley's Evidence.

Father Kingsley testified that the understanding of the church committee was that the plaintiff would do the work for \$900 with no extras. He said that the system installed by Mr. Halligan proved most unsatisfactory and had to be removed. The hammering, which resulted from the pipes having been given an improper pitch, was something abominable, and people attending mass wondered what was wielding a hammer in the basement. The radiators became water-logged and one of them broke. A seam in one of the pipes had given out, due to the witness claimed, to a defect.

### Mr. Cunningham was cross-examining Father Kingsley when court arose for lunch.

### PLUMBERS ARE AFTER INCREASE IN WAGES

#### From \$3 to \$3.50 Per Day—Petition Likely to Be Granted.

The plumbers in Kingston have made a request to the bosses for an increase in wages from \$3 to \$3.50 a day, and if the increase is not forthcoming by Oct. 30th the men will go out on strike.

It is understood that the bosses, realizing the increase in the cost of living will give the increase asked for.

### ON CHILDREN'S AID WORK.

### W. H. Wyllie Gave an Address at Princess Street Church.

At Princess street Methodist church on Wednesday evening, W. H. Wyllie, Inspector for the Children's Aid Society, gave a most interesting address, dealing with the work of the society in its care of neglected children. The address was illustrated with lantern slides and was most instructive.

At the close of the address, on motion of Rev. G. Bell seconded by Rev. W. K. Shortt, M.A., a vote of appreciation was passed to Mr. Wyllie for his splendid address.

### CORNER STONE LAID.

At St. John's Church in Pittsburg Township. A very impressive and interesting ceremony took place at St. John's Presbyterian church on Wednesday afternoon, when Donald Hay laid the corner-stone for an addition to the main building. Mr. Hay is the oldest member of the St. John congregation, and was present at the original ceremony fifty-four years ago. There were over 200 present, who heard addresses by Rev. A. B. Morrison, Queen's, and Rev. E. R. McLean, Cooke's church, city.
