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DAYLIGHT SAVING. The Associated Boards of Trade, meeting in Hamilton next month, may be disposed to move again in the matter of daylight saving.

The English press reports that the neutral ships of the Netherlands carry their freight openly to Germany via Holland. The correspondents of the papers have visited the shipping ports in Sweden and Norway, and have seen the good delivered by neutral ships upon the wharves, only to be re-shipped with changed addresses to Holland for Germany.

WHY LIVING IS HIGH. The members of the government who received the municipal representatives last week, and heard their appeal on the cost of living, did not seem them away satisfied.

HOW GERMANY IS FED. The amazing feature of the cost of living in England is the fact that Britain's toleration, through her navy, is contributing to the comfort of the German people.

While the pelting of the oceans was being arranged by Britain the enemy stole many an advantage upon her with the aid of the neutrals. But now the policy of the admiralty, and by a trade which is contraband so far as the Allies are concerned, is the surprise of the hour.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The utilities of our city should be paid for all the services they render to the people, and they should in turn pay taxes upon their enterprises like any other running concern.

Bread in England is selling at 10d per loaf. Flour is selling at 73s a quarter of 480 lbs., which is the highest price obtainable since the Crimean war in 1855.

Three hundred more men—or 700 in all within a week—have returned to Canada physically unfitted for the military service. The thing must be investigated and stopped.

The imperial government has taken over the wheat and flour trade of Britain and propose to regulate the cost of bread. The government across the water does not tell the people that it cannot do anything.

Canada still buying German goods: Are they indispensable? Or are some people so wedded to cheap products that they will barter with the enemy at any price?

The report of the medical commission must be followed by an immediate investigation of the whole medical service. Experience demands that every appointment must be made on its merits, that no one be given a promotion he does not earn, and that skill and efficiency be the requirements in every case.

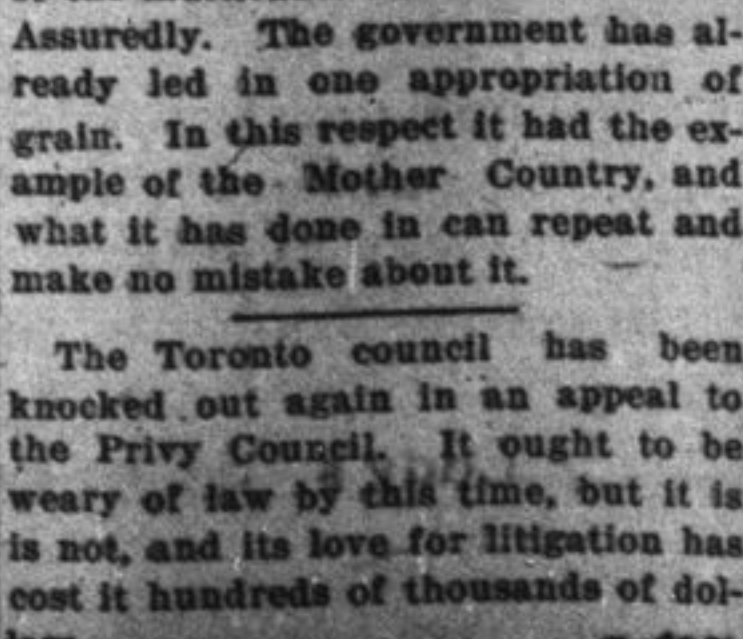
THE MUFFLER CUT-OUT. The Mufflet Cut-out is an attachment which enables the automobile to talk out loud.
