A BROCKVILLE BATTALION

THE 230TH IS BEING REORGANIZED AND STATIONED THERE

Col. de Salabery is to Command—Separation of French and English in the 178th and 207th Battalions. The 230th Battalion of French-Canadians of Ottawa, commanded by Lieut.-Col. de Salabery, has been the source of much trouble in Ottawa, due to the fact that interference with Col. de Salabery prevented him forming a well-working fighting unit. The trouble came to a head recently when Lieut.-Col. S. A. Thompson, C. S. O., and Major R. D. Ponton, of headquarters here, were sent to Ottawa to investigate. The result of their recommendations means a complete reorganization on a new basis.

The 230th Battalion has been disbanded. The French-Canadians in it, who cannot qualify as good lumbermen, etc., for a forestry battalion, are to be transferred to the 178th Battalion of Montreal. The remainder who can not qualify as lumbermen are to be transferred to the 207th Battalion at Ottawa.

Those who are left are to form the nucleus of the 230th Forestry Battalion under Col. de Salabery, with Major Howard as second in command. This forestry battalion will be located in Brockville for winter training. Recruiting for it will be open to the Dominion.

In Bivouac And Barracks

Camp headquarters moves to the city Friday, and the camp will officially close on Saturday.

Queen's Battery will not be stationed at the Drydock Barracks, as at first contemplated, but will go into one of the University buildings.

For the truth, as many other correspondents have testified, is that there is nothing in them to gratify the morbid, nothing to leave the sense of "bestial horror," nothing but must make the spectator a better and a braver man, more convinced than ever of the invincible spirit of his fellow-countrymen in France, and more determined than ever to play his own part in the war. We hope ourselves that they will be exhibited from end to end of the country for a lesson and an example.

FRONTENAC CHEESE BOARD.

Sales Made at 22 1-16 Cents at the Meeting on Thursday.

Cheese sold at 22 1-16 cents on the Frontenac Cheese Board on Thursday afternoon. There was boarded 175 boxes of white cheese and 237 boxes of colored, as follows: White—Inventory, 39; Glenburnie, 40; Glenvale, 45; Model, 60. Colored—Arigan, 30; Sunbury, 50; Silver Springs, 30; Thousand Islands, 27; Elginburg, 70; Verona, 40; Wolf's Island, 50.

At 22 1-16 cents George Smith purchased the offering of Glenburnie, Glenvale, Silver Springs, Thousand Islands, Elginburg, and Wolfe Island, and at the same figure John Gibson bought the offering of Arigan, Inverary, Model and Verona.

The secretary, William Pillar, brought up the question of assistance for the Belgian Relief Fund at the request of Rev. F. G. Kirkpatrick, of Kingston Mills, who has been working in regard to the matter, and on motion of William Fawcett, seconded by Herbert Sly, it was decided to have a committee, composed of President Hamilton and the secretary, along with R. V. F. C. Kirkpatrick and G. M. Macdonnell, wait on the county council at its November session and ask for a grant for the Belgian Relief Fund.
