Gunner Rev. J. A. Pettie of the 72nd Queen's Battery, Kingston, was in Belleville attending the obsequies of his sister, the late Miss Jean Pettie.

Bombs. Ernest S. Hubbell, son of Major E. W. Hubbell of Ottawa, was wounded in France on the 11th of October. He is recovering in England in the Trench Mortar Battery, and is now in St. John's Ambulance Hospital.

Canadians sending Christmas parcels to prisoners in Germany are advised to see that the parcels are despatched from Canada by Nov. 1st, to ensure them reaching England in ample time to be forwarded to Germany by Dec. 1st.

MUCH PLEASSED WITH CITY. Chinese Consul-General Enraptured With Kingston's Location.

Yang Shu Wen, Chinese Consul-General to Canada, with headquarters at Ottawa, who is in Kingston for a few days visiting his fellow countrymen, was driven around the city Friday morning and expressed himself as greatly pleased with Kingston's location at the foot of the Lakes, and at the head of the St. Lawrence River.

Saturday morning before going for his drive the representative of China paid his respects to the representative of the United States, F. S. S. Johnson, and in the afternoon he visited the mica mines at Sydenham. Thursday evening he addressed the Chinese residents of Kingston, who numbered about 110, in their clubrooms in the Golden Lion block. The distinguished visitor returns to Ottawa Saturday.

RAILWAY LABOR SITUATION. Is Still Disturbed—Other Employees Seek More Pay.

Ottawa, Oct. 27.—The railway labor situation is still somewhat disturbed. The maintenance-of-way men on all three railways are demanding wage increases. In the case of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Northern eastern lines boards have already been granted under the industrial dispute investigation act. It is now rumored that the Brotherhood of Railway Employees, an organization embracing all roads and comprising baggagemen, freight handlers, telephone operators, clerks, etc., is again preparing to renew its demands of three years ago for a stated schedule and increased pay.

DR. MASSON DEAD At Cape Vincent—Graduate of Queen's, Kingston.

Cape Vincent, N.Y., Oct. 27.—Dr. Thomas Masson, for 41 years a well-known physician of Cape Vincent and vicinity, died yesterday morning at his home here. He had been ill for a long time and confined to his bed for the past two weeks.

Dr. Masson was a native of Seymour, Northernumberland County, where he was born in 1851. He was graduated from Queen's College, Kingston, Ont., in 1871, and came to Cape Vincent in 1875.

There survive his widow and a son, J. Fetter Masson. Two brothers and two sisters, residing in Canada, also survive.

BRITAIN CONSIDERS PLAN Of a Tunnel to France—Asquith Receives Deputation.

London, Oct. 27.—Full reconsideration of the question of the advisability of constructing a tunnel under the English Channel to connect England and France was promised yesterday by Premier Asquith in receiving a deputation in favor of the project.

He said the matter would be taken up either by the war committee or the committee on Imperial defence. The Premier admitted that before the war the balance of opinion had been against the project, but added that such a tunnel as the deputation proposed would have put Canada in a better position for transporting the expeditionary force and for the general purpose of the war.

8 YEARS FOR MANSLAUGHTER. Ex-Police Sergeant Maloney Sentenced For Death of Jas. Covey.

Ottawa, Oct. 27.—Ex-Police Sergeant Patrick Maloney of the Ottawa force, found guilty of manslaughter in connection with the death of Jas. Covey, a farmer of East Templeton, was sentenced to eight years in the penitentiary by Justice Kelly yesterday. T. J. Rigney, of Kingston, was Crown prosecutor.

With the Workmen. On Thursday evening Bert Armstrong of Toronto, superintendent of organization work of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, paid a visit to the two local lodges, Limestone and Kingston, and spoke on the valuation of certificates. District Deputy R. W. Longmore of Camden East, also gave an address.
