## IN THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S

### THE UNIVERSITY APPEALS FOR RECRUITS FOR THE 253RD.

Results of Arts '17 Elections—Tennis Tournament Drawing to Close—Ladies Play Ground Hockey.

That the authorities at Queen's University are determined to aid in the formation of the 253rd Highland Battalion commanded by Lieut.-Col. P. G. C. Campbell in every possible way is shown by the letters that have been sent to all graduates urging them to work for the interests of the battalion and by further steps which are to be taken.

At the meeting of the Finance and estate committee on Thursday afternoon the matter was discussed and the following resolution was passed: "That this committee direct attention to the authorization for the formation of a Battalion to be known as the 253rd Queen's Highland Battalion, of which Colonel (Professor) Campbell is to be the officer commanding.

That those responsible for the conduct of the war continue to emphasize the need of men.

That Canada's contribution is many below the 500,000 promised.

That the depletion of the Canadian Expeditionary force by wastage and casualty by far exceeds enlistment.

In view of the foregoing this committee urges upon the staff, graduates, alumni and undergraduates, unless debarred by age or other insurmountable obstacle, the placing of their services by enlistment, at the disposal of Canada and the empire in this testing time, in the hope that the war may soon be brought to a successful conclusion and an honorable and enduring peace secured."

In the past Queen's University has contributed many of her sons to the expeditionary forces and it is not intended that at the present time these contributions shall wane.

Although there are many of the men who are under age in the university and many more unfit for service at the front, interest is being taken in the battalion, and every effort will be made to make a contribution to the battalion.

Graduates of the university are being appealed to, and it is expected that many will come to join this Highland unit from far and near confident that they will have one of the best commanding officers in the county.

## HELPING SOLDIER BOYS

### "THE SOMME CLUB" HELD SUCCESSFUL TEA AND SALE.

Quite a novel feature, and one which caused a great deal of interest was the drawing of tickets for a fancy cake for which a charge of ten cents was made, this alone raising \$23.

Miss Ethel Sutherland was convenor of the tea table, pouring the tea; Miss Ethel Wilder pouring the coffee, with Miss Mildred Pierce. The assistants were Mrs. L. Ryder and the Misses Violet Birney, Theima Carroll, Rita Green, Ethel McCullagh, Edna Singleton.

At the home made table Miss Bella McCall was convenor, with Misses Phyllis Coates, Laura Saunders and Frances McCullough.

Miss Muriel Metcalfe was convenor of the fancy work table, and she had with her as assistants Misses Ethel Davis, Thelma Polk.

## BUILDING IN KINGSTON.

Value of Permits so far Issued this Year is \$171,968.

The value of building permits issued by the City Engineer from January 1st till November 1st, is \$171,968 as compared with \$183,690 for the same period last year.

The permits issued during October were valued at \$13,517, as compared with \$12,910 for the same month of 1915.

Still Waiting For Report. The Utilities Commission has not yet received the additional report it is seeking from the Hydro-Electric Commission. This report will have reference to the installing of electrical pumps in the waterworks, which is now in need of additional pumping capacity.

Addressed Cheese Board. G. G. Pablow, Kingston, Superintendent of Dairy Schools for Eastern Ontario, was in Belleville on Monday and addressed the members of the Belleville Cheese Board, at their weekly gathering. His remarks were chiefly on the care of milk and cheese.
