NEWS FROM THE DISTRICT

In Brief Form the Events in The Country About Kingston Are Told—Full of Interest to Many.

Peterboro Council has let its garbage collection contract to E. K. Graham at \$6,250 a year.

A gentleman from Almonte says that town is so severely dry that even spirit levels are in danger of contraction.

Miss Matilda Huddleson, Smith's Falls, died in hospital on Oct. 26th. She was a sister of James Huddleson.

William James Fisher, Millbrook, died on Oct. 25th. He resided in Cavan township for many years and was a member of Cavan council for several years and also reeve of the township for a term.

Rev. George Henderson, St. Catharines, and Rev. Dr. Shorey, Port Hope, are enjoying their annual deer hunt in the north country.

Rev. G. A. Brown, Campbellford, has been invited to the Presbyterian church at Barrie. Campbellford has offered a salary of \$1,800 to remain.

The Calabogie and Renfrew Telephone Company at its annual meeting passed a dividend of 5 per cent. A somewhat larger dividend might have been paid, but it was decided to improve the lines.

The claims of Peterboro county to senatorial representation were expressed in a motion passed by the Peterboro council last night to be laid before Premier Borden for his consideration when present vacancies in the senate are to be filled.

Called to Carleton Place.
Carleton Place, Nov. 3.—A congregational meeting of Zion church was held for the purpose of making a choice of a pastor to succeed Rev. A. A. Scott, who resigned some time ago. Four candidates were under consideration, the choice falling on Rev. W. A. Dobson, Dunnville, who preached so acceptably here a few weeks ago. On the first ballot he received almost every vote of the meeting, and his choice was afterwards made unanimous. The salary was fixed at \$1,400 with four weeks' holidays. The call will be presented to presbytery at an early date.

Given Royal Humane Medal.
Cornwall, Nov. 3.—At a recruiting meeting in the Town Hall, Cornwall, W. V. Boyd, manager of the three Cornwall mills of Canadian Cottons, Limited, was presented with the Royal Humane Society's medal for saving the life of the ten-year-old son of Maurice Lavigne, of East Cornwall, who fell into the Cornwall Canal on August 2.

Recruits for 240th.
Brockville, Nov. 3.—A squad of recruits secured in Brockville left for Renfrew to join the colors of the 240th Battalion. They were secured through the efforts of Lieut. Babcock, until recently of Toronto.

CALLIED BY DEATH.

Head of Firm of J. J. Turner & Sons at Rest.

Peterboro, Nov. 2.—This city lost one of its progressive business men on Wednesday, when J. J. Turner, senior member of the firm of J. J. Turner & Sons, sail, tent and awning manufacturers, died after an illness from heart affection. He was born in London, England, fifty-six years ago, and came to Canada in 1872. Coming to Peterboro in 1880, Mr. Turner laid the foundation of the present business, which is the largest of its kind in Canada. Deceased was a Mason and a member of several other fraternal societies, a Conservative and an Anglican. He is survived by his widow and four sons.

Accident to Hastings Woman.
Hastings, Nov. 3.—An accident which might easily have proved fatal, occurred to Mrs. Robt. Shearer on Saturday last, as she was returning from the village to her home in Percy. When almost home, the horse she was driving took fright at a dog and ran away, throwing Mrs. Shearer out and dragging her under the buggy for some distance cutting and bruising her severely. Medical assistance was summoned and it was found that a cut on the forehead required some 12 or 14 stitches, one toe was dislocated and other bruises were discovered.

Mrs. Shearer, although still very weak and suffering from nervous shock, is improving and her physician has every hope for a complete recovery.

Navigation Open Through Trent.
Cobourg, Nov. 3.—Navigation from Lake Ontario through the Trent Canal to Peterborough is now an accomplished fact.

A pontoon gate lighter Witt at Welland, has been towed from that point through the canal, her objective being Young's Point, where she will be used in the construction of new locks next spring. The principle of operation of the lighter is something new and in this district, although lighters of similar design are said to be used on the St. Lawrence river.

1 1/2 Mills More For Red Cross.
Tweed, Nov. 3.—At a special meeting of the Village Council the by-law fixing the rates for the year, passed at the last session of the Council, was rescinded and a new by-law, including a levy of 1 1/2 mills extra to raise the sum of \$750 for the British Red Cross, was introduced and passed.

Garage Was Looted.
Lindsay, Ont., Nov. 3.—The garage of F. Tilcock was burglarized and a considerable quantity of automobile accessories taken. Entrance was gained by forcing the rear doors.

WESTERN FARMERS MAY WORK ON SUNDAYS

The Authorities Will Permit Carrying on of Threshing Operations.

Winnipeg, Nov. 3.—J. Bruce Walker, Commissioner of Immigration at Winnipeg, announced that arrangements had been made between the Ottawa government, the Attorney-General of Saskatchewan, and the Attorney-General of Alberta, whereby there would be no prosecutions for urgent work carried on in the provinces on Sunday in connection with threshing operations.

The Royal Northwest Mounted Police have been notified to act accordingly.

This action has been taken in view of the extraordinary conditions that exist in the two provinces. A great proportion of the crop has still to be threshed, and it is felt that at a time like this there is justification in the decision to allow the farmers to work on Sunday.

Regulations are being promulgated to prevent abuse of the new order. Only urgent work will be permitted.

MAY RECRUIT IN WEST.
