ARE SENDING COMFORTS TO MEN AT QUEEN'S HOSPITAL.

Purchased Gifts With Their Own Money to Cheer Men at Front—Will Reach Hospital for Christmas.

Children can do their "bit" in the way of providing for the comforts of men who are fighting at the front as well as the older folk.

This is shown by the efforts put forth by a little band of children residing on Stuart street, and as a result of the work of the little folk small comfort bags, filled with good things, will reach Queen's Hospital in time to bring Christmas cheer to some of the men who are doing their share to bring victory to the Allies. During the summer months the children met at the home of Mrs. (Prof.) J. E. Macdonald, Stuart street, one evening each week to spend a couple of hours in a social way and to partake of refreshments. These little gatherings afforded the children much pleasure, but while enjoying themselves they did not forget the fact that strong men were at the front fighting their battles, and so decided that they would do their share in the great struggle. They put away all the coppers, nickels and dimes they could get, and with the sum they realized purchased comforts for the hospital men. The girls set to work and made net little comfort bags, and on Friday night the children met at the home of Mrs. Macdonald and had a great time filling up the bags. Each bag contains writing paper, envelopes, story book, a stick of shirring soap, packages of clothes, chocolate, tooth brush, perfume, pencil, taffy and Chiclets. A cheery message, written by the children, was placed in each bag, and it goes without saying that the recipients will be more than pleased at the thoughtfulness of the children, and the latter are to be warmly commended for their patriotic work.

WAS BORN IN KINGSTON.

Killed in Action—Mother Lives in Deseronto.

Francis Vincent Kelly, Deseronto, is reported killed in action. Bomber Kelly enlisted over a year ago in a western battalion and went to the front with them after spending a few weeks in England. The deceased, says the Deseronto Post, was born in Kingston nineteen years ago, and for several years his parents resided there, his father being an employee of The Bell Telephone Company.

Later the family removed to Peterboro, where his father, James D. Kelly met his death from an electric shock. Later Frank resided with his grandmother, Mrs. Catherine Kelly, at Railton, leaving there a couple of years ago to go west from where he enlisted. His mother, Mrs. M. R. Neville, resided in Deseronto. An aunt, Mrs. Frank Koen, and an uncle, Peter Kelly, reside in Kingston.

Frank Kelly was a clever athlete, and a splendid type of young manhood and his many friends will hear of his death with keen regret.

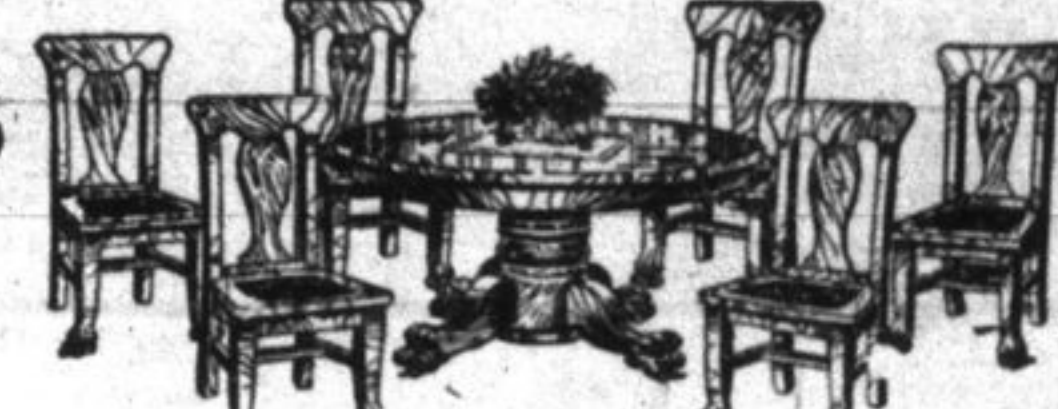

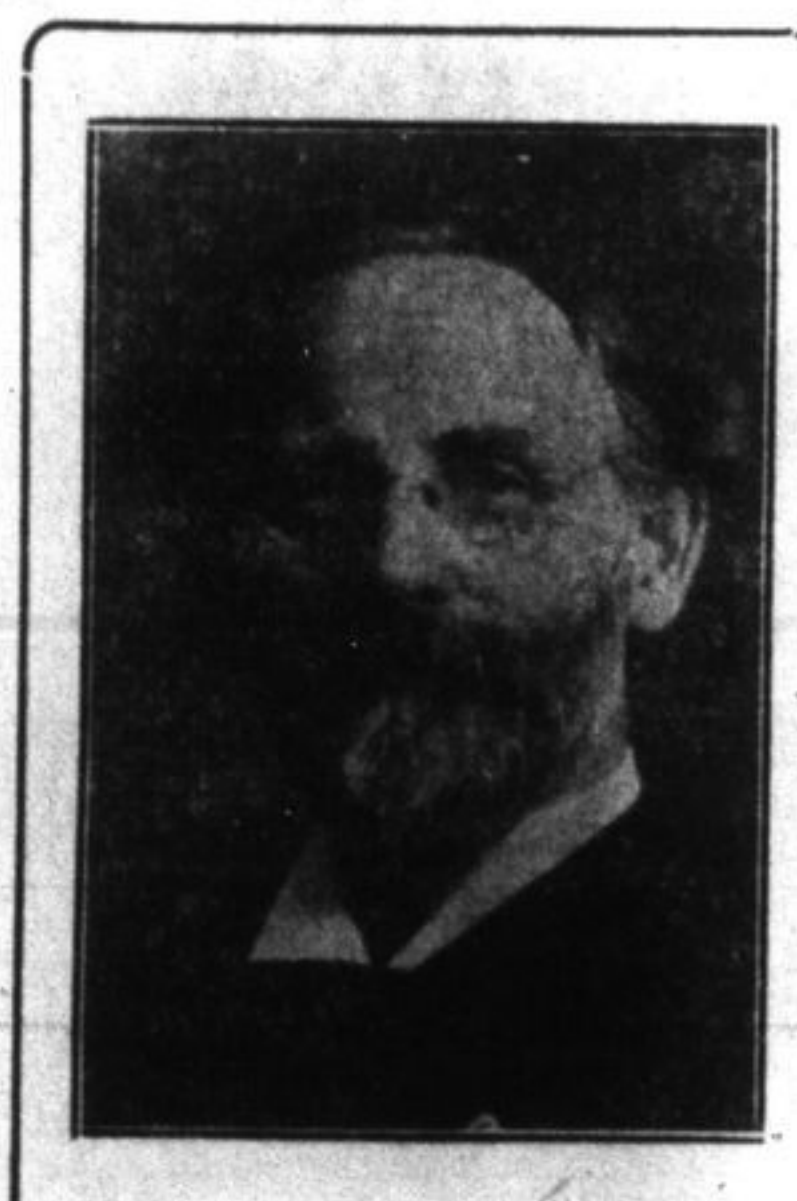
