### BIG INTEREST IN ELECTION

HUNDREDS SOUGHT INFORMATION FROM THE WHIG.

Bulletins Read by Hundreds While Telephones Were Kept Busy—Not Much Preference Was Shown—Whig Praised For Service—Returns Caught by Wireless.

Great interest was taken in Kingston in the presidential elections held in the United States on Tuesday. In the evening the Whig's election bulletins were read by hundreds of people, who remained until a late hour the Whig telephones were kept busy and the latest information was read and cheerfully given. The Whig has been generally complimented on the promptness and excellence of its service.

Nor was the interest in the elections much abated Wednesday morning. Many eager eyes scanned the bulletin boards and the telephones were kept humming. The fact that the result was still in doubt served to keep the interest up.

There was not much anxiety, however, displayed concerning the result. Kingstonsians apparently felt that it didn't make much difference to them which candidate was elected, although it was pointed out by a few that if Hughes won out living would be cheaper in Canada, as he was pledged to increase the protection tariff, which would keep out a lot of Canadian produce, with the inevitable result that prices would drop here.

United States Consul Johnson was one of those most interested in the returns. Of course, officially, it makes no difference to him which side wins out, for the splendid work that he has done and is doing will insure his retention in the service so long as he desires to remain in it. But as a native American and an official representative of his country it was but natural that he should be greatly interested in the result. He was a keen reader of the Whig bulletins and kept the telephone wires hot.

Sergt. L. L. Hicks, wireless instructor at the Queen's University headquarters, showed the Whig some of the U.S. election returns he caught on Tuesday evening. There were probably 10,000 wireless instruments throughout Canada and the United States after the returns.

### SAD STORIES REVEALED HELD ITS ANNUAL MEETING

#### TWO WOMEN SENTENCED TO JAIL ON CHARGE OF VAGRANCY.

#### Married Woman With Two Children Was Given Three Months, and a Young Girl Got Six Months—J. J. Kelso Gave Evidence in One Case.

Many sad scenes are staged at the Police Court, but there was never a more pitiful sight than that witnessed on Wednesday morning, when Mrs. Blanche Delina, a well-dressed woman, with a bright-eyed seven-year-old son by her side, was found guilty of vagrancy and sentenced to three months in jail. The little boy could not understand all the strange proceedings, but when he saw his mother taken from him he burst into tears. The boy will be cared for. The mother has a three-year-old daughter, who is at the present being cared for at the home of a relative in Peterboro. There was another sad case before the Magistrate, that of Cassie Babcock, also charged with vagrancy. She too was found guilty and the Magistrate gave her six months in jail. The two women were placed under arrest on Tuesday afternoon near Artillery Park by Constables Arnel and McCarey.

Mrs. Delina denied the charge lodged against her, and Constable Arnel was called. He said the accused lived on Johnson street, near Ontario, and that there had been complaints made about her home during the day and night. The police had been called on Tuesday afternoon to take the two women away from Artillery park, where they were acting in a disorderly manner.

Lieut. James Graham, Provost Marshal, told of the two women loitering around with the soldiers at Artillery Park.

A young girl, hailing from Lancaster, was called as a witness. She said she had stayed at Mrs. Delina's home for a few days. At first she denied that there had been any improper conduct there, but afterwards, under stiff cross-examination by Chief Bailie and Constable Arnel, admitted that there had been.

J. J. Kelso, inspector for the Provincial Society of the Children's Aid gave evidence in the case of the Babcock girl. He said she belonged to Napanee, that her mother was dead. There were some small children, and the father needed this girl to help look after the children, but the girl was wayward. Lieut. Graham, who, as chief of police at Napanee, knew the circumstances, also gave evidence.

The Babcock girl cried and pleaded for a chance to go back to her father, declaring that she would stay with him, but there has been so much trouble with her that the Magistrate decided it was best to send her up. The girl from Lancaster was sent to her home.

### BRITISH RED CROSS FUND.

Subscriptions Are Coming in at a Very Tedious Rate.

City Treasurer Bartels reports that the total subscriptions to date for the British Red Cross fund are only \$4,183.47. Not one-half of the churches have yet handed in their donations. The larger churches yet to hear from are St. George's Cathedral, St. Andrew's and Chalmers Presbyterian, Sydenham and Queen Street Methodist. Subscriptions would be welcomed from those in Kingston profiting largely by war orders, and it is understood from remarks made at Monday night's meeting of the City Council that there are quite a number in this class. ### ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY RE-ELECTED OFFICERS FOR YEAR.

#### Decided Not to Hold Annual Dinner and Service Will be in Cooke's Church on Sunday Evening, Nov. 26th.

The gathering held in the City Council Chamber on Tuesday night marked the 76th annual meeting of the Kingston St. Andrew's Society. In the absence of the president, Prof. John Dall, who is doing his "bit" at the front, the chair was occupied by J. B. Halkett. The latter spoke briefly, thanking the members for the honor and paid tribute to the president, who was fighting for King and country.

James Stewart, honorary secretary-treasurer, was called upon to read the minutes of the last annual meeting and also to present the report of the auditors, which showed a balance in the bank of \$400. The election of officers was afterwards proceeded with and resulted as follows:

President, Prof. John Dall (re-elected); vice-president, J. B. Halkett (re-elected); second vice-president, J. F. McMillan; honorary secretary-treasurer, James Stewart (re-elected); auditor, John McL. Stephen (re-elected). Rev. E. R. McLean, of Cooke church, was elected to the position of chaplain.

The following were elected, with the officers, as the executive: John E. Gow, John B. Bankier, W. G. Craig, David Murray.  
J. W. Fraser was re-elected pipe; Col. A. E. Ross, physician; and Major Andrew McPhail as bard.

Owing to the war, it was decided not to hold the annual dinner. It was decided to have the annual church service at Cooke's church on Sunday evening, Nov. 26th. The secretary was instructed to extend an invitation to all the Sons of Scotland to attend and hear the chaplain, Rev. E. R. McLean, preach.

The General Hospital was voted \$10 for caring for a Scotchwoman who needed help.

The Canadian Red Cross Society was voted \$10; the British Red Cross Society voted \$10, and the prisoners of war fund, through United States Consul Johnson, \$10.

A resolution of sympathy was passed on the death of three prominent members of the society during the year: John McIntyre, K.C.; Lieut. Col. H. R. Duff and Major J. M. Mowat. John McIntyre and Major Mowat were past presidents of the society.

It was reported that during the year there were no calls for help on the society, showing that the Scotch people were able to look after themselves.

### Accident at Locomotive Works.

A bad accident occurred at the Locomotive Works on Saturday afternoon, when Lawrence Byington had the misfortune to have a piece of hot steel hit him in the eye. On Monday he was taken to the Kingston General Hospital, where an operation was found necessary to save his eye. He is still in the hospital, where he is progressing favorably.

### Driver Charles R. MacVicar Dead.

Word was received on Wednesday that Driver Charles Ross MacVicar, who enlisted in Kingston in the artillery, has died of wounds in the Warley Hospital in England. He received gunshot wounds in the abdomen. Deceased belonged to Frontenac county, and leaves a sister at Cataract.
