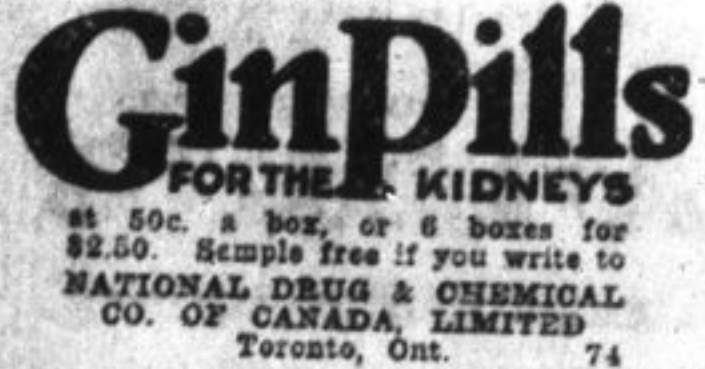

THE HOME FOR FRIENDLESS

ANNUAL MEETING WAS HELD TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

Good Work Done During Year—Addresses Delivered by Mayor Richardson and J. J. Kelso—Officers Re-elected. The annual meeting of the Home for Friendless Women and Children was held Tuesday afternoon, and the reports showed that much good work had been accomplished during the year, which closed Sept. 30th. The financial statement presented by the treasurer, Mrs. G. A. McGowan, reported a cash balance on hand of \$19.09. The report of the president, Mrs. W. H. MacNee, stated that sixty-one children and friendless women had been cared for. Six children had been claimed by their parents, two had been transferred to the Orphan's Home and eight had been adopted, leaving twenty-three in the home at the end of the year. Six of the children died from excessive heat last summer. The president in her report thanked Miss Van Straubenzon for her kindness in providing a service of song every Friday evening, praised Mrs. Thompson, Matron, and Miss Ferguson, assistant, for the splendid work they were doing; expressed gratitude to Dr. Keyes, the attending physician, and made an appreciative reference to Col. A. E. Ross, a warm friend of the institution, concerning the noble work that he performed at the front.

Addresses Delivered.

Mayor Richardson, who presided, delivered an address, in which he spoke highly of the work that the home was doing. The noble hearted ladies in charge were doing a kind of work which some wouldn't touch with a gloved hand. They were entitled to great praise and credit. The City Council appreciated the work that was being done. To care properly for friendless children was one of the best investments the city could make.

Officers Re-elected.

The officers were all re-elected. They are: President, Mrs. W. H. MacNee; first vice-president, Mrs. J. B. Walkem; second vice-president, Mrs. E. T. Steady; recording secretary, Mrs. E. J. B. Pense; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Daniel Phalen; treasurer, Mrs. G. A. McGowan. Mrs. MacNee said she thought she had borne the responsibilities of the office of president long enough, but she would continue, if it were the wish of the Board, until the war was over.

THE LINER ARABIA SUNK ON MONDAY

Four Lives L. Censors Withheld News. ing to American Elections. (Special To The Whig) London, Nov. 8.—The liner Arabia was sunk on Monday in the Mediterranean. She carried a number of Australian passengers from Sydney. Four lives were lost.

Although the facts of the Arabia sinking were known in London early yesterday, the censors would permit publication of them, it being presumably the Government's purpose to avoid even an appearance of attempt to influence or sway the American Presidential election. Officials hinted that they wanted to eliminate any possible chance of its affecting yesterday's balloting in America, if the attack was made with this in mind.

War Tidings.

Venezoloz troops are to be withdrawn from Katrine to avoid further fighting among the Greeks. The Deutschland will carry official mail back to Germany. Italian troops made new progress in their advance on Trieste Tuesday, taking prisoners and machine guns. Anglo-French troops have captured since July 1st 7,532 men, 1,449 officers, 988 machine guns, 173 field guns and 315 trench mortars. Gen. Poch has smashed forward and captured two and a half miles of German positions, with five hundred prisoners. The Russo-Rumanian forces continue on retreat in the Dobruja. The Peninsular and Oriental liner Arabia has been sunk by a submarine. Four passengers lost.

DEAN CAPPON LECTURES

BEFORE THE QUEEN'S THEOLOGICAL ALUMNI CONFERENCE. Deals With the Celtic Poetry of John M. Synge, in Which There is a Realistic Treatment of the Irish Peasant.

Prof. James Cappon, M.A., dean of the faculty of arts in Queen's University, delivered an instructive address in Convocation Hall, Tuesday evening in Convocation Hall. Before commencing his address, Dean Cappon remarked that two years ago at the Theological Alumni Association he had dealt with Celtic poetry as a whole. He had decided therefore to deal on one aspect of this class, the dramatic poetry of John M. Synge. Prof. Cappon referred to the main characteristics of the later Celtic poetry, its idealistic themes and its lofty and beautiful dream thoughts. He quoted from numbers of the exponents of this branch of poetry and then came to the work of J. M. Synge. In a carefully planned treatise he dealt with the main characteristics of Mr. Synge's works, declaring that in many ways the thought and structure of Synge's drama were far different from the works of his predecessors. Instead of the idealistic tendency so marked in their works there was a more realistic treatment of life, especially of the Irish peasant. In his works he brings out the Irish character and gives an eminently successful view of Irish life.

The different points in Dean Cappon's lecture were well illustrated by selections from the plays of Synge, and in moving a vote of thanks for his delightful address, Rev. A. G. McKinnon, Lachine, Que., made special mention of the eulogatory abilities of Dean Cappon.

Rev. R. Brydon, King, Ont., also paid tribute to the dean, declaring that he was promoting a noble work in the development of the young men and the young women of Canada by giving forth the best of his great store of knowledge of English literature.

CRUSHED TO DEATH, SUFFOCATED, DROWNED A Crowded Trolley Car Plunged Through an Open Drawbridge.

Boston, Nov. 7.—It is now certain that forty-seven persons were crushed to death, suffocated or drowned when a crowded elevated trolley car plunged through the open drawbridge last night, and carried its shrieking victims in to the water of Fort Point Channel. Investigation points to Motorman Walsh as responsible for the accident. Hysterical and nearly drowned, he was dragged from the water and saved. His claim that the lights on the bridge were out is denied by eye-witnesses. He is charged with manslaughter.
