RUSSIANS MAY CUT OFF ENEMY

By Their Capture of Dunareav, Two Miles From Cernavoda.

THEIR GUNS MUST CONTROL

THE BRIDGEHEAD BY THE RAPID ADVANCE MADE

The Sudden Dash Made Against Mackensen's Forces Was Not Expected—Rumanians Develop Heavy Offensive in North.

London, Nov. 10.—It is thought probable here that a large portion of Von Mackensen's German-Bulgarian force invading Rumania via Dobrudja has been trapped by the sudden dash of the Russo-Rumanian forces, which are to-day reported from Petrograd to be battling for possession of the Cernavoda bridgehead.

The news came suddenly when it was still thought that the opposing lines in Dobrudja were fighting many miles north of the Constanza railway, of which the Cernavoda bridge across the Danube river is the famous and important connecting link.

If the Russians have occupied Dunareav, two miles from Cernavoda in any force, their guns now control the bridge and approaches to the bridge and have possibly cut off a large portion of the Teutonic forces attempting to retire to the other side.

Later despatches also report that the Rumanians have suddenly developed a heavy offensive north of Bucharest, in the neighborhood of the passes through which the enemy managed to penetrate Rumania through Transylvania.

The actual work accomplished was as follows: 30 pair operation socks, 16 pair woollen socks, 40 scrap books, 5 1/2 doz. bandages, 2 pair wristlets, 60 pneumonia jackets, 45 crutch pads, 28 pairs pyjamas, 23 nightshirts, 31 army shirts, 5 1/2 doz. many-tailed bandages, 54 sheets, 47 pillows, 217 towels, 480 pair of socks sent to the trenches, besides the preparing of the treats for the Ramsgate Hospital and the Hillington Hospital.

MILITARY CIRCLES

Capt. George Shortt, who went overseas, is returning to Canada with a number of wounded soldiers. He will spend several days with his parents, Prof. and Mrs. Adam Shortt, before returning to England.

Rev. Father Cote, Huntsville, has handed in his resignation and offered his services as an overseas chaplain. A brother, Lawrence Cote, is a resident of Trenton.

Capt. (Rev.) H. B. Kenny, who had charge of the recruiting for the 240th Battalion for some months, has been transferred to the 240th Battalion of Refrew.

Divisional officers from the different military divisions in Canada are in Ottawa attending a conference called by F. B. Curdy, M.P., parliamentary secretary of the Militia Department. Brig.-Gen. Hemming of Kingston is in attendance.

Steps to improve the situation in regard to recruiting are being considered. The fortnightly returns indicate that the enlistment is slow, with a tendency to decrease.

While the National Service plan has to do with recruiting it is indirect, being concerned more particularly with designating labor for essential industry.

The situation in the different divisions are being reported on first hand by the officers in charge.

The 72nd (Queen's) Battery is now quartered at Halifax.

Campbell, chief recruiting officer for the third division who has just returned from a trip to the lumber camps in the northern part of the district, reports that the prospects for recruiting in that country are not as bright as they were some time ago. He finds that where a year ago able-bodied men were only receiving \$22 to \$25 a month, boys are now getting \$45 a month. Good men can get as much as \$65 a month and their board. The accommodation is also greatly improved.

The major is well pleased with the recruiting in certain sections of his district. During the past nine days sixteen recruits have been signed up in Kingston.
