THEIR CUNS MUST CONTROL

BRIDGEHEAD BY THE RAPID ADVANCE MADE

The Sudden Dash Made Against Mackensen's Forces Was Not Expected-Rumanians Develop Heavy Offensive in North.

London, Nov. 10.—It is thought probable here that a large portion of Von Mackensen's German-Bulgar-Turkish force invading Rumania via Dobrudja has been trapped by the sudden dash of the Russo-Rumanian forces, which are to-day reported from Petrograd to be battling for possession of the Cernavoda bridge-

The news came suddenly when it was still thought that the opposing lines in Dobrudja were fighting many miles north of the Constanza railway, of which the Cernavoda bridge across the Danube river is the famous and important connect- British Red Cross Fund
