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LADY ABERDEEN ARRIVES

FOR MEETING OF NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN EXECUTIVE.
The Work Being Done by This Splendid Organization Throughout the Country—in Existence Twenty-Five Years.

Kingston welcomed most heartily the National Council of Women of Canada executive, which meets in Kingston to-morrow. This council has now demonstrated its vitality by nearly twenty-five years of existence since its foundation by Lady Aberdeen in October, 1893. In that period of time it has grown so greatly as now to number thirty-three local councils, scattered over Canada from Halifax to Vancouver, besides a large number of nationally organized societies, all federated together on the basis of the golden rule applied to law, custom and society. If the philanthropic women thus banded together stand for a principle which society so sorely needs, Lady Aberdeen's conception of what might be done by the moral force which a large number of earnest, philanthropic women might exercise on the social life and character of our people has not been disappointed, even though there still remains much to be done.

Improved legislation for women, as regards some of the most important conditions of her life, whether industrial or social, has been secured, legislation for the protection of women and children has been in several respects improved, female inspectors for factories and other institutions have been appointed, the spread of demoralizing reading matter greatly restricted, ideals of citizenship enlarged, teaching domestic arts introduced into our public schools, supervised playgrounds established, and such matters as public health, sanitation, better housing for those of scant means, conservation of natural resources, immigration, employment for women, child welfare, and household economics, and last, not least, the acute problem of the feeble-minded have received careful and beneficial attention with results that will develop as time goes on.

The women of the National Council through their federated societies have rallied splendidly to the present needs of our nation and empire, and established their righteous claim to greater participation in the public affairs of the country, for which they are doing so much.

Notice has just been received from headquarters in Toronto that the afternoon session of the executive to-morrow (Thursday) will be open to all members of federated societies of the local council. This will be welcome news to many who wish to see and hear for themselves something of the work of the council. All the other sessions will be open only to actual members of the national executive.

Lady Aberdeen in the City.

Lady Aberdeen arrived in the city Wednesday via the C.P.R. train from Ottawa, and was met by the president of the Local Council of Women, Miss A. M. Machar, and by W. F. Nickle, M.P., and Mrs. Nickle, the latter being the first honorary vice-president of the local council.

CANADIAN PATRIOTIC FUND.

The sum of \$6,517.80 Expended in Kingston for November.
The amount distributed in Kingston for November by the Kingston branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund amounted to \$6,517.80. The expenses of the board of management in handling the distribution of the amount for November was smaller than October, when the sum expended, including the expenses occurred in making the distribution amounted to \$6,592.15.

TO BUILD ENGINES.

The Canadian Locomotive Company Gets a Russian Order.
An order for twenty locomotives has been placed with the Canadian Locomotive Company by the Russian government. It is understood that negotiations for another large contract are now under way, and that they will shortly be concluded. Interests close in touch with the company state that the orders now booked ensure capacity operations well into 1917.

PETITIONS FOR RELEASE

DESERTER IS SERVING TERM IN THE PENITENTIARY.

Was Sent to Reformatory, But Escaped and Rather Than Return to Prison Farm He Asked to Be Sent to Penitentiary—Lieut.-Col. Hunter Consulted.

Albert Hill, who on Sept. 7th last was sentenced by Magistrates Hunter and Ruttan to one year for deserting from the 97th Battalion in March of this year, and who, at his own request was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for escaping from the Ontario Reformatory at Guelph, has petitioned for his freedom. The Justice Department has asked Lieut.-Col. Hunter, one of the trial magistrates, whether it would be advisable to exercise clemency, and he has advised that there was nothing to warrant his release. If Hill, however, would join another corps, such as the Home Guard or the Central Guard, the colonel said he would recommend his release.

Hill escaped from the reformatory on Oct. 10th and was captured the same day. He was tried and sentenced to serve an additional six months at the reformatory, but he requested to be sent to the penitentiary, as he did not like the prison farm. His request was granted, and on Oct. 12th he was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary, arriving there on Oct. 19th.

In his petition Hill, who is twenty-four years of age, points out that he is a returned soldier, having gone over with the first contingent. He enlisted in Montreal in August, 1914, and was gassed in battle April, 1915. He was sent home, and after reaching this country delivered recruiting speeches at various points. He mentions that this is the first time he has been in prison and adds that if a certificate of character is required it might be secured from Dr. Campbell of Lansdowne.

Hill took his sentence here with bad grace, and tried to assault the constable who had him in charge.

DIED FOLLOWING WOUNDS

PARTICULARS OF DEATH OF SERGT. G. A. CALLE.
Was Only Twenty-two Years Old, and Before Going Overseas Took Great Interest in the Boy Scouts—Six Brothers-in-law Are in Khaki.
Sergt. George A. Calle, who was reported killed in action on Monday, and who was a brother of Mrs. Alfred Tugwood, of this city, whose husband is also at the front with the 21st Battalion, had six brothers-in-law in khaki.
Further particulars have been received, showing that Sergt. Calle died of wounds. He was twenty-two years old, and was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert W. Calle, of Paris, Ont. He was born in Battersea, England, and came to Canada with his family nine years ago, settling in Kingston. Seven years ago the family moved to Paris.
At the outbreak of the war deceased enlisted for home service, and was stationed at Fort Henry. Later he enlisted with the 80th Battalion, and went overseas last May. On arrival in England he was drafted into the 73rd Highlanders, and had been in the trenches for some time. He was a young man of sterling character, and the sympathy of the community will be extended the family. While in Paris he took an active interest in the Boy Scouts, and before enlisting was assistant scout master there. Besides his parents, he is survived by six sisters.
