The shipments of comforts by the various people interested to units and individuals overseas with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, in nearly every case, are being shipped by express, and the inland Revenue charges in this regard are very high. This it has been decided, must be discontinued and the strictest economy must be exercised, and only in exceptional cases are packages to be forwarded by express, at the public expense. When shipments of this description are being forwarded, same must be made by freight, and transport warrants issued to cover the charges.

Major G. I. Campbell, chief recruiting officer, has returned to the city from a visit to Perth, Montreal and Ottawa.

Capt. J. A. Dougan and Capt. A. Farrar, A.M.C., have been taken on the strength of the depot ambulance (Queen's).

Nursing sister Olivia Wilson, A.M.C., is taken on the strength of A.M.C., and is detailed for duty at Osgoona Military hospital.

Lieut. A. A. McCormack, C.A.M.C., is taken on the strength of the depot ambulance (Queen's) as lieut. and quartermaster.

Quartermaster and Hon. Capt. P. A. Palmer has been in Renfrew and Madoc in connection with engineer services.

During the absence on leave of Colonel G. Hunter Oglvie, A.A.G., Lieut.-Colonel H. R. Wilson, D.A.A., and Q.M.G., will act as A.A.G., 3rd military district.

Capt. J. C. Norwell, assistant to the D.A.A. and Q.M.G., is on the sick list and confined to his home on King street.

Lieut. Slade, who was recently granted a commission after serving conscientiously through the ranks for many years, is now with "C" Battery, R.C.H.A., which is commanded by Lieut. Penhale.

Wednesday was pay day for the troops in the city, and the various pay offices and the Bank of Montreal were busy.

Lieut.-Col. E. C. Arnoldi, formerly with the Depot Artillery Brigade here, is now supervising the training of the Toronto Artillery Brigade.

N.C.O.'s and men of the city garrison have been issued with winter caps and mitts.

Among the officer instructors at the Royal School of Artillery is Lieut. O'Connor, Ganoquo, who was overseas with the first Canadian Division, and twice wounded was invalided home.

There were twenty-seven recruits secured in the last two weeks for "C" Battery, R.C.H.A., through the recruiting offices of the battery in Montreal, which were opened some time ago by Lieut. W. C. Pittsfield.

The Royal School of Artillery of over 200 officers and N.C.O.'s is now well under way at Tete de Pont Barracks. Lieut.-Col. R. B. commandant, has secured the use of a "reflector" from the Royal Military College for use in giving lectures in the Ontario Hall class. It will be useful in showing maps and various diagrams to the large class. The commandant is also planning to place the miniature village in the hall for lecture purposes.

Corp. J. A. Connell, of Smith's Falls, and Pie. F. Penny, Montreal, who went overseas with the 130th Lanark and Renfrew Battalion from Barriefield Camp, and were transferred to the 12th Reserve Battalion, write from West Sandling Camp, Shorncliffe, that they have now been transferred to the C.A.S.C. as despatch riders and are soon to leave for France.

To-morrow evening "The Mrs. Telgmann's Concert Party" will give an entertainment at the Military Y. M. C. A. room.

In connection with the alleged fraudulent disposal of foodstuffs, which were issued to the 207th Battalion by the Government, it is rumored that the foodstuffs were taken from the barracks and sold illegally. It is reported, says the Ottawa Free Press, that several men are implicated. Gen. Hemming has appointed a court of inquiry to investigate the charges.

Capt. Palmer, engineering officer for the district, left on Wednesday morning for Renfrew on duty.

Lieut.-Col. Allen and Capt. Hyman, formerly of the 155th and now of the 254th Belleville Battalion, were in the city on Wednesday morning.

Queen's Field Ambulance is enlisting a number of men who have poor eyesight. Those who are deficient in this respect, but who are otherwise fit, are taken for service.

Major J. Hamilton, A.D. of S. and T., is arranging to secure this district's quota of the 5,000 Army Service Corps overseas reinforcements

that have been asked for from Canada. He is planning to have officers located in practically every town of the district for the purpose.

Major J. M. Wilson, A.D.D.S., has decided on the following redistribution of dental officers: Capt. H. A. Stewart to 235th at Belleville; Capt. Renton to 230th at Brockville; Capt. Bajrd to 235th Company at Cobourg; Capt. S. H. Simpson, Capt. Manser and Allen to the local clinic.

Sergt. Inst. Redding has taken over the duties of quartermaster-sergeant for the school of signalling.

Word received here states that Major J. K. Mackey, 6th Howitzer Brigade, whose home is in Pictou, N.S., has been granted the medal of the Distinguished Service Order for his work overseas.
