

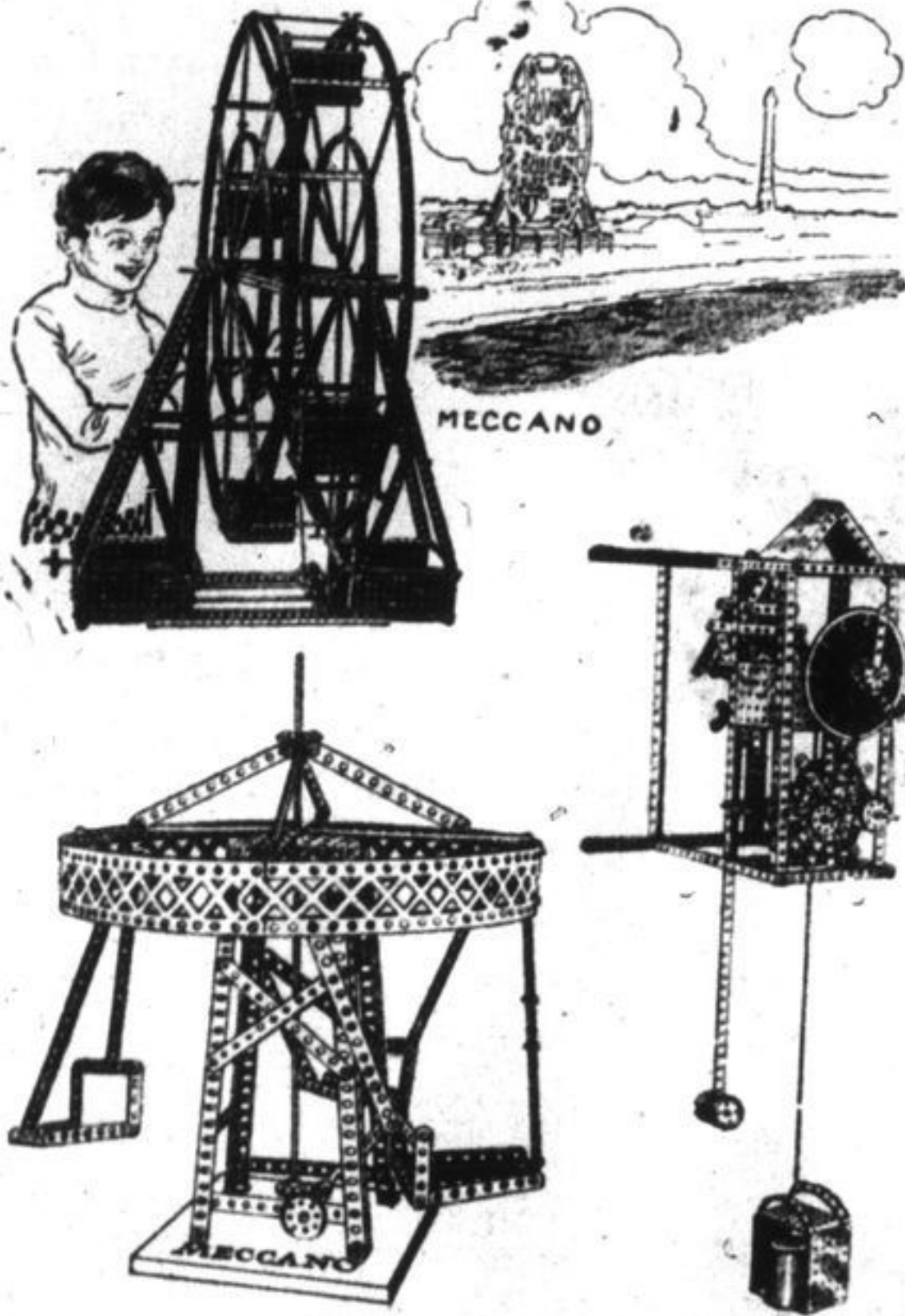

## HOCKEY NOTES.

Jimmy Green, who played defence for the champion Aura Lee Junior team last year, may figure on the Riversides this season.

Russell Stephenson, formerly of the Victorias, is in Ottawa with the Signal Corps, and will play with one of the amateur teams in the capital this season.

Commenting on the alleged efforts of the Toronto pros. to sign Glen Smith of the Riversides, a contemporary says "he has the ideal build for the professional games Smith is a six-foot husky, but what's the interference?"

Lieut. Gordon Meeking of the 228th Battalion will not be in the game this season. "Broken arches" in his feet, which prevented the player from showing his best form at Ottawa last season, are still giving him trouble. "Meek" will act in a coaching capacity for the 228th.

Canadians will have a hockey club when they sign up Veina, the goal-keeper. They will have Cozneau for the defence, but need a couple of other stalwarts to replace McNamara and Progers. Pitre and Lalonde will be out on the forward line again, and Skene Roman is also on the list of the Frenchmen.

Patriotic hockey, the same as played in Winnipeg last year, will be in order in South Saskatchewan, with a four-club league, consisting of Victorias, the 217th, the 214th teams and Moose Jaw.

Very little hockey will be played in Alberta this winter. There will be no hockey in Calgary.

Port Hope is talking of placing an intermediate team in the O.H.A. this winter. They have some good material.

The various New York teams have been at practice for some time on the St. Nicholas rink. Frank Heffernan, the former T. R. and A. A. and Victoria player, is working out, but it is not known as yet what team he will play with.

Lindsay will have a team in the intermediate series of the O.H.A. this winter. The team will be under the same management as last year and it is expected that there will be a number of new players in town. Among the players of last year, now available are "Chuck" Carew, Art. Carew, McElroy, O'Loughlin, Haugh, Dennison and Read.

The rule at University of Toronto that debar from faculty sports anyone who plays with any outside team will not keep those hockey players now attending Dental College from playing in the O.H.A. There have been many "Varsity" athletes who have played with other teams while attending the University, and there is no reason why the dental students hockey players will not do the same.

Several new goalkeepers will appear on the rival teams in the National Hockey Association this year, and if the plans of the magnates are successfully carried out, President Lichtenhein, of the Wanderers, has announced that he does not expect to have Bert Lindsay with the rebands this year. Lindsay is engaged at Renfrew and has intimated that he will not be able to spare the time. He is said to have returned his contract unsigned. In this event, Billy Hague, an Ottawa boy, who did great work in several of the games for Wanderers last winter, will likely get the call.

**Must Be Physically Fit.**  
In Boulogne, France, boxing tournaments are being held weekly by young men in the French and British armies, but the Government has passed a rule which forbids a man from taking part until he has been medically examined and declared physically fit.

**Charged With Sedition.**  
Cobourg, Nov. 16.—At the Cobourg Assize, an indictment will be preferred against Walter A. Blood, Port Hope, for using seditious words last June at Port Hope.

Prior to the war this offence was practically unknown in Canada and there are no reported cases in England for over seventy years.

## TO SELL "CHIEF" MEYERS

Indian Catcher is in Disfavor With Brooklyn Owners.

Chief Meyers may not wear a Brooklyn uniform again next season. The famous Indian backstop is said to be in disfavor with the powers that be at Ebbets Field. He slowed down in his play this year and was frequently injured. Furthermore, it is said that the Chief did not make a hit with his employers when he openly found fault with the sale of world series tickets in Boston and Brooklyn. Meyers was accused of being the ringleader in levelling criticism at the business managers of the series which the Red Sox won with comparative ease. If Meyers remains with the Robins he will have to accept a large cut in his salary. As a matter of fact, the officials of the Brooklyn club will not make a strenuous attempt to sign him to another contract. It will not be surprising if the Chief is offered to some other National League club in a trade for a younger catcher. Uncle Robbie needs at least two good backstops to help out Otto Miller.

## BASEBALL RETRENCHMENT

Minor Leaguers Are Counseled to Cut Out the Frills.

Reforms in the direction of minor league baseball, especially as to business management, are recommended to officers and members of the National Association of Minor Baseball Leagues by M. H. Sexton president of the association. Sexton protests against "loose and unbusinesslike" management, particularly in cities where "public-spirited persons form corporations to insure baseball for their communities."

"It is time for our members, particularly from Class B down, to cease trying to emulate the methods of the major leagues," the letter concludes. "Dispense with high-priced players and managers, cut down protracted training trips and seasons, reduce traveling expenses, hotels bills, extra park help and double umpiring, and get down to operation on a basis that revenues warrant."

**Final Medical Exams.**

**Tinker to Manage Cubs.**  
Charles H. Weegman was re-elected president of the Chicago National League club at its annual meeting at Chicago. It was said the question of a club manager was not raised at the meeting, which was taken to mean that Joseph Tinker would again serve in that capacity next year.

**Danny Maher Buried.**  
The funeral of jockey Danny Maher was held in London Saturday afternoon and was largely attended, Lord Rosebery being among those present. Floral tributes were received from Lord Derby, Lord Rosebery and Prince Leopold of Battenberg.

## ARMY HORSE TAKES SIR ADAM BECK'S CUP

Lady Beck's Entry, Inspection, Beaten by Mrs. Robert Tod's Sceptre.

Military and Mounted Police Day, was officially termed in the catalogue, brought an added bit of color to the ring attractions at the New York National Horse Show. One of the features was a contest for the Canadian Challenge Cup, presented by Sir Adam Beck, and won by a horse, Pete, belonging to the 2nd United States Artillery, and ridden by Capt. Daniel D. Puller of the Engineering Corps. Lieut. Hanley's Lansdowne, which won the cup last year, and which made the rounds of the jumps splendidly, was for some reason placed fourth and behind his stable companion, Ironsides, a decision that manifestly surprised the crowd of onlookers, who could not quite solve the reason for placing both behind Capt. Alexander's Metaphor, who sidled over the first two jumps instead of taking them in his stride.

In a class for ladies' saddle horses, in which ladies rode, Mrs. Robert E. Tod again won with Sceptre, the third blue which this sterling mare has won since the opening of the show. Even Lady Beck's Inspection could not get away from the outstanding qualities of this mare, which comes pretty close to being the perfection of a lady's saddle horse.

## PRAISE FOR CONNIE MACK

Jack Coombs Has Great Confidence in His Old Manager.

"Jack Coombs, the Brooklyn twirler, was talking about his former mates, the Athletics, recently. "People say Connie not only hurt himself and made the Athletics a joke as a drawing card, but hurt the business of the entire American League," said Jack. "That is not so. When Mack had his old team, with Collins, Baker, Barry, McInnis, Bender, Plank, Oldring, Strunk, Thomas and myself, we didn't wrangle with the umpires and swear at the opposing players. I guess we were too businesslike. But that is the way Connie wants his men to play."

"Mack's methods are just the antithesis of those of John McGraw, both in playing the game and in rebuilding a club. McGraw's idea is to buy ball players at any price, then mold them into a machine as quickly as possible and rush on. That method is all right if you have unlimited capital."

"Why, for what McGraw spent the last season for players he could have picked up every player on the old Athletics. Mack didn't spend anything for the men he has secured. Give Connie a season or two more of experimenting and he'll have the greatest machine in the country. It won't have cost him a penny, and it will last while three or four Giant teams are put together and crack apart."

## MUST BE "NATIVE SONS"

To Become Stakeholders at the New Orleans Track

Says The Montreal Herald: "Joseph Murphy, presiding steward for the Canadian Racing Association on the latter's circuit, is an American, and manager of the track at New Orleans, where racing is to be held this winter. Mr. Murphy comes to Canada each summer, and draws a substantial salary for his services. Yet the announcement has been made that all stakeholders at New Orleans must be 'native sons.' This rule is expected to be adhered to, and it may prove a lean winter for Canadians and others who have been expecting to make the trip down toward the sunshine. In addition to this new rule governing stakeholders, the Business Men's Association, which runs the New Orleans meeting, has announced that all book-makers who intend to do business in the 'palm garden' during the coming meeting must show a bank roll of satisfactory size before they will be allowed to 'cut in.' And so some of the 'shoestring' men, as well as the clerks, may meet with disappointment."
