COAL, MILK, BREAD TOO HIGH

THIS IS OPINION OF TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL.

Formation of Municipal Depots Favored—Committee Appointed to Report on Matter—Objection to Outside Contractors Doing Work on Mowat Hospital.

The Trades and Labor Council at its meeting Thursday evening discussed the prices being charged in the city for coal, milk and bread, and it was felt that they were altogether too high, and that, if possible, these commodities should be handled by the municipality. It was pointed out, however, that before the city could go into the coal, milk and bread business it would be necessary to secure legislative authority. The discussion was prompted by a communication from the Brantford Trades and Labor Council, suggesting the formation of municipal coal yards, milk depots and bakeries. A committee was appointed by the local council to inquire into the whole matter and report at the next meeting.

The council expressed disapproval of the fact that the work on the Mowat Memorial Hospital, which the Dominion Hospitals Commission is having done in order to care for tubercular soldiers, was being performed by outside firms. Local contractors could do the work just as well, the council thought, and as free light was to be granted by the city to this institution, the work necessary on the building should be given to local workmen.

An effort will be made to have Miss Laura Hughes, of Toronto, niece of Sir Sam Hughes, come to Kingston and deliver an address on social conditions. Those who have heard her have been greatly impressed with her skillful handling of present economic conditions, and should she come to Kingston she is sure to draw a large audience.

There was a good attendance at the meeting; several new delegates being present.
