### PAID SUPREME SACRIFICE

#### GUNNER HARRY SCOTT WAS KILLED IN ACTION.

Served in the Home Guard and Afterwards—Was Transferred to Queen's Battery—He Went Overseas Early This Year.

Word was received in the city that Gunner Harry Scott had been killed in action on October 29th. Gunner Scott came to Canada in 1911, and was employed at the Locomotive Works as a machinist. When war was declared he joined the Home Guards, was transferred into Queen's Battery in November, 1915, and went overseas in February of this year. He was well known in this city and will be mourned by many friends. He resided with his parents at 53 Beverly street, and is survived by his father and mother and four sisters. Mrs. Charles Dubery, Mrs. Frank Biddulph, Mrs. George Eastwell, and Miss Jessie Scott, all of whom reside in Kingston, also a brother and sister in Winnipeg, John Scott, and Mrs. Robert Bowyer. Deceased is the second member of of Leicester Lodge, Sons of England, to be killed in action. He was twenty-two years old.

#### HANDSOME GIFTS TO GUS O'BRIEN

Recipient Is Leaving Locomotive Works for Important Position in Toronto.

Gus O'Brien, who has been assistant superintendent of munitions in the Canadian Locomotive Company's plant and who is leaving to accept the position of assistant superintendent in the fuse department of the munition plant of the Willys-Overland Company, Toronto, was the recipient of some handsome gifts from his fellow-employees and other friends. The presentation took place Thursday evening at six o'clock in the shell office. J. P. Fleming read an address appreciative of Mr. O'Brien's many sterling qualities, personal and business, and A. E. DeLaroche made the various presentations, which consisted of a gold watch, a club bag and a scarf pin. Mr. O'Brien made an apt reply, referring, in a feeling manner, to the happy relationships that had always existed between him and other members of the various staffs, and expressing regret that those relationships were to be broken. He would always think, he said, with tender feelings of the years he had spent in the locomotive works and of those with whom he had been associated. Mr. O'Brien leaves the works with the best wishes of all. He has been connected with the plant for twelve or thirteen years, and has shown himself to be a capable employee, a considerate boss, and a firm friend of all.

#### PRESENTATION MADE ON HIS RETIREMENT

Sergt.-Major Boutillier, W. O., Presented With Gold Engraved Watch.

On Thursday evening the members of the sergeants' mess of the R. C. H. A. of Tete de Pont Barracks presented Sergt.-Major Boutillier, W. O., Royal Military College, with an engraved gold watch on his retiring from service. Sergt.-Major Boutillier has been connected with military work for thirty-two years, and was through the north-west rebellion. After spending some years with the Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery at Quebec, he was transferred in 1894 to the Royal Military College staff, and has been there since. Two sons, Frank and Arthur, who are with the R.C.H.A., and Joseph, who is with the 39th Battalion, have been wounded in action.

### MILITARY CIRCLES

The nineteen overseas volunteers of the Army Service Corps are being sent on Monday to Toronto to mobilize with the remainder of the company.

Lieut. E. W. Skjuner has taken over his duties as an officer of the 25th Battalion.

Capt. W. S. Swaine is in Renfrew on duty.

The district recruiting band under Lieut. Hinchey, is now at Belleville.

The military district is to supply half of a section for a divisional ammunition column to be raised by Lieut.-Col. G. A. Carruthers, Winnipeg. The column will be of eighty-four men and two officers.

There were eighteen deserters lined up before Lieut.-Col. H. R. Wilson, acting A.A.O., on Friday morning. Fifteen of them will be sworn in as members of the 207th and sent overseas with that unit.

#### NO FOOD TICKETS YET IN BRITAIN.

#### MAJOR H. E. PENSE GETS THE MILITARY CROSS

Kingston Officer of the 21st Battalion Has Received This Honor.

Major H. E. Pense, of the 21st Battalion, who is at present home on sick leave, has been awarded the Military Cross. When seen by the Whig, Major Pense was unable to say why he had been given the honor. However, there is no doubt but that the general good work of the major while at the front for a whole year, and for the manner in which he went forward with his company near Courcellette on the day he was wounded constitute the reasons. Major Pense was freely congratulated on the honor he had won.

Another member of the 21st to receive the Cross is Capt. K. E. Cooke, who was medical sergeant when the unit was in Kingston. Capt. T. F. O'Hagan, of the Medicals, a graduate of Queen's Medical College, has also been awarded the Military Cross.

**Sails With Munition Cargo.** New York, Nov. 17.—The White Star liner Adriatic sailed for Liverpool yesterday with forty-five first, thirty-five second and fifty third class passengers and a capacity cargo of more than 20,000 tons of munitions of war. The Adriatic carried a six-inch gun mounted at the stern.

The weekly budget of food for an average workingman's family has increased 33 cents since September, being now placed at \$9.30. The British Sailors' Relief Fund has received nearly \$100,000 in Toronto.
