NEWEST NOTES OF SCIENCE

Yeast cakes will keep fresh a long time if buried in salt.

A can opener of German invention slices off the entire top of a can. If the underside of a heavy rug be coated with shellac it will not curl up.

More than one third of the 138,000 white men in the Transvaal are unmarried.

Glycerine well distributed, revives the color in an old typewriter ribbon.

Holland has 100 soap factories, producing about 10,000,000 pounds of soap a year.

The honey and wax production of the United States is valued at about \$6,000,000 a year.

Great Britain's per capita coal consumption is about three times as great as that of France.

A Mesota man has patented a simple device to prevent tools dropping out of a man's pocket.

Denmark prohibits the sale or exportation of butter containing more than sixteen per cent. water.

Eight blades, set in a semicircular frame, form a new implement for cutting halves of cakes evenly.

Asbestos has been discovered in Sardinia in quantities that are expected to make mining profitable.

A new tumbler has two compartments one to hold ice and the other for liquids that are to be cooled.

Salt-peter is manufactured from nitrogen extracted from the air by several plants in Norway and Sweden.

Resembling an enlarged nut cracker, an implement has been invented for cracking the shells of lobsters.

A Swiss scientist has succeeded in freezing living fish and reviving them several weeks or months later.

To teach children how to use electricity for cooking is the purpose of a recently invented miniature range.

Recent experiments in India indicated that the light emitted by fire-flies was similar in many ways to X-rays.

It takes but three tenths of a second for an electric signal to pass over the 2,700 miles of an Atlantic cable.

Semi-official Spanish estimates place the world's production of wine last year in excess of 26,417,000 gallons.

A typewriter invented in Germany is said to do perfect work although it is small enough to be carried in a pocket.

Louisiana established a new high record for petroleum production last year, the state's output being 14,309,455 barrels.

Large metal rings, fastened together with chains, form an English anti-skidding device for motorcars with broad, flat tires.

An Ohio inventor's screwdriver is provided with jaws to hold a screw and that can be adjusted to several sizes and positions.

As a substitute for rubber tubing in handling petroleum, gasoline and gases a German scientist has invented tubes made of glue.

An egg beater patented by a woman is made of a single piece of wire, so formed as to follow closely the curves of any pan or dish later.

A new German electrical device to enable a moving train to set a signal makes use of a slight sinking of a rail as a train passes over it.

United States army officers are testing a wireless transmitting outfit that has sent messages as far as twenty miles without the use of an antenna.

Embroidery manufacture is by far the most important of Swiss industries, 78 per cent. of the residents of one canton being embroidery workers.

Illinois is the leading state in the production of common brick, Pennsylvania in fire brick and Ohio in vitrified paving brick and sewer pipe.

An automobile radiator has been placed within a flywheel by a Roumanian inventor, the water being cooled as it is whirled around inside the wheel.

A two faced doll's head has been patented, each having a different expression, one being covered with the hair when the other is exposed to view.

Electric traction has made possible the conquest of the Pyrenees by transportation men, no steam railroad having been able to conquer their grades.

A recent development of the electric sewing machine is one in which the motor is built in and its speed is controlled by a brake operated by a pedal.

The Gospels have been printed in Japan in three little known dialects for circulation among the aborigines of Western China by English missionaries.

Spring clamps at each end permit a new cord adjuster for electric wires to be attached or removed without disconnecting a cord from its socket.

Trees can be protected from injury by animals by keeping the surrounding ground clean and coating their trunks with a whitewash containing Paris green.

There are about 35,000,000 fur felt hats made in the United States each year and about 7,000,000 wood fibre ones.

To clean the inside of bottles a Frenchman has invented a brush that can be adjusted to any angle, from its handle by a screw running inside the latter.

Building a concrete tank fitted with a window, a Scotch doctor succeeded in getting a number of motion photographs of otters and other underwater animals.

A new electric fan to be placed in a window to ventilate a room can be regulated to supply any amount of air desired and throw its current in any direction.

Sweden and Norway together manufacture more carbide of calcium than any other single nation, but use very little of it, exporting almost the entire production.

Clipping the point from a safety pin, sliding the coil over a hat pin and closing the clasp over the point of the latter will protect it from injuring a person.

Most inspectors in Berlin are employing the motion picture camera in their work, enlarged photographs

showing micro-organisms in motion if the meat be diseased.

A weighted sketching board, with which information can be dropped from an aeroplane without tiring it to flight, has been invented by a United States army private.

An English physician has advanced the theory that the juices of the mouth are intended to keep the teeth clean, not to prepare food for digestion as generally believed.

A balloon-carrying recording instrument sent up by Italian scientists reached an altitude of 23 miles and found the lowest temperature 70 degrees below zero, twelve miles up.

BIG EARNINGS OF PAPER COMPANY

International Paper Company Earning Six Hundred Thousand a Month.

New York, Nov. 17.—If International Paper Co., lives up to the expectations of some interests, net earnings in the two years 1916 and 1917 will reach anywhere from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000. Such figures are almost inconceivable until it is recalled that the company in the past year has raised its earnings from a little more than \$100,000 to over \$600,000 monthly. That the latter figure is not anywhere near the full earning capacity of the company is evident from the fact that the major portion of the company's daily output of 1,800 tons of newsprint is still being paid for at the low prices prevailing at the time when contracts were closed the latter part of 1915.

New Pulp Company.

Portland, Me., Nov. 17.—E. B. Lindsey, of Boston; George Lewis, of Holyoke, Mass., and E. M. Blandin, of Bath, N.H., have organized the Arrostook Pulp Co., which is to erect at Van Buren, Me., a plant to manufacture sulphate or Kraft pulp, which is used in certain grades of brown paper and twine. The immediate investment will be \$5,000,000, and the plant will be in operation by next June, with a capacity of about 40,000 tons of Kraft pulp per annum.

Steel Foundry Dividend.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—Dominion Steel Foundry directors declared a regular dividend on the common stock of 2 per cent. and in addition a bonus of 8 per cent. This makes 40 per cent. distributed this year to date.

To Increase Pulp Output.

Montreal, Nov. 17.—The Chitcotini Pulp Company will increase its pulp mill capacity to 130,000 tons annually, compared with present output of 80,000 tons of mechanical pulp. This mill is claimed to be the largest exporter of mechanical pulp in America and the second largest pulp mill in the world.

Holly Dividend Record.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—The Hollinger mine, with the payment of the dividend of October 9th has paid a total of 187 per cent. on the issued capital entailing a disbursement of \$5,850,000.

Commercial Notes.

Standard Oil of Nebraska has declared its regular semi-annual dividend of \$10 a share.

It was reported that the International Mercantile Marine Company had bought a controlling interest in the New York Shipbuilding Company, operating a plant at Camden.

Richard P. Gough, president of the Sellers-Gough Fur Co., Limited, Toronto has been elected a director of the Home Bank of Canada.

A syndicate of practical mining men have leased the properties of the Porcupine Gold Reef Company in Porcupine and will commence practical development.

Swift and Co. shareholders at Chicago have adopted resolutions authorizing an increase in the capital stock of the company from \$75,000,000 to \$100,000,000.

K. C. H. Robenson has sold his membership in the New York Cotton Exchange to Webb Floyd for \$17,500, an advance of \$250 of the price realized at the last previous sale of a seat.

Negotiations are under way for the purchase by J. P. Morgan & Company from British capitalists of all the securities of the New Orleans and Northeastern Railroad.

Lackawanna Steel earnings in October made a new high record, being approximately \$1,125,000 net, after all charges, or at the rate of slightly over \$34 per share.

A. D. Thomson, of Duluth, a former Montrealer, and a brother of A. G. Thomson, of Thomson and Earle, Montreal, has been elected a director of the Great Northern Railway, of Minnesota, and other Hill companies.

Hunger Stalks Through Belgium NOW!

While we in Canada are bringing in the harvest, filling our store-rooms and stocking our pantries with an abundance of good food—our Allies in overrun Belgium are facing another winter of near-starvation.

Women and children there by millions have gone for two years on short rations, for the Belgian Relief Fund has never been sufficient to provide full fare.
