COAL ACROSS THE LINE.

Frederick Palmer, the well-known Saveral Schooners Arrived during Tuesday Night With Their Last Cargo of the Season-Movements of Vessels Reported.

Practically the entire local fleet of coal schooners arrived in port during Tuesday night with coal from Oswego, and it will be their last trip of he season. As soon as the schooners are unloaded they will be laid up for the winter.

The vessels would make a few more trips, but owing to the fact that there is a scarcity of coal it has been decided to put the boats into winter quarters. The schooners arriving were the Abbie L. Andrews and the St. Louis, loaded for Sowards, the Julia B. Merrill, for Anglins', and the steambarge John Randall, loaded for Wolfe Island. The tug Magnolis arrived with two barges from Oswego, coal laden, and they were taken to Montreal by the tug Virginia.




