NEW MINISTER INDUCTED
Suffered From Severe Headaches
FOR TWO YEARS.

REV. J. W. STEPHEN ENTERS
 PASTORATE OF ST. ANDREW'S.

Impressive Ceremony With Appro-
 priate Addresses, Marked Service
 Tuesday Night—Duty of Pastor
 and Congregation Aply Outlined by
 Speakers.

Rev. J. W. Stephen, Toronto, was
 on Tuesday night inducted as pastor
 of St. Andrew's church by the King-
 ston Presbytery, and the occasion was
 marked by an impressive ceremony
 and most appropriate addresses. Rev.
 Dr. Malcolm Macgillivray presided
 and conducted the induction service.
 The sermon was preached by Rev. G.
 E. Kidd of Gananoque, Rev. Dr. F. E.
 Torrance addressed the new minister,
 and Prof. W. G. Jordan addressed the
 congregation. There was quite a
 large attendance, the choir being also
 present.

Rev. W. T. Wilkins of Trenton,
 clerk of the Kingston Presbytery,
 told of the resignation of Rev. S. J.
 M. Compton, who went overseas, and
 reviewed the steps taken to secure a
 new minister. Rev. Dr. Macgillivray
 put the usual questions to the min-
 ister-elect, after which he was duly in-
 stalled into the pastoral charge of the
 congregation, and given the right
 hand of fellowship by the members of
 Presbytery and members of session
 assembled. The congregation then
 joined very heartily in singing
 "Praise God From Whom all Bless-
 ing Flow."

In his sermon, Rev. Mr. Kidd re-
 ferred to the great work the church
 was carrying on. The question, he
 said, was often asked, "what are the
 churches doing?" It was charged by
 some that the church was dead, and
 the question was also raised as to
 what the Church of Christ was doing
 when such a terrible war was possible
 and when graft, injustice, oppres-
 sion and exploiting prevailed.

"I want to say that the church is
 not dead," added the speaker. "The
 church of Christ never stood higher
 than it does to-day. True, there has
 been oppression, injustice and a great
 deal of wrong doing, but it is true
 that we find no response to our ideals
 of brotherhood and sympathy? Is the
 work not worth while? Our men
 are coming back from the firing line
 wounded, and what do they have to
 say. They all say, 'If I could only
 tell you what I have seen, if you only
 knew.' And if men only knew they
 would not hold back and say it is not
 worth while. I have been on the for-
 ward line for many years, and it is
 my impression that we are holding
 our ground and going forward, con-
 solidating our gains."

"Never imagine that the world is
 getting worse, and that the church
 is going down. We have a great lead-
 er, and under His strength we can go
 forward, and we know it is worth
 while. There is a great investment
 to be made for the sake of Canada,
 and for the sake of the kingdom of
 Christ."

The speaker appealed to the peo-
 ple to set aside all petty things and
 to work with a united front for
 Christ.

Rev. Dr. Torrance in his address
 to the new minister, referred to the
 words of Paul, who said: "We are
 ambassadors for Christ." The min-
 ister was an ambassador for Christ and
 the call must be a divine call. The
 minister served as the representative
 of the heavenly King.

It was most important that the
 minister should be loyal. He must
 not pander to the taste of the age. A
 minister who did so could not be
 loyal to his King. He must also have
 a thorough knowledge of the word
 of God. It was also of immense
 importance for the minister to be an
 earnest man, and at the same time,
 to be tender and sympathetic.

In his opening remarks to the con-
 gregation Prof. Jordan congratulated
 the people on having filled the vacan-
 cy.

"You now have a minister of your
 own," he said. "Many of you know
 him and respect him, and he is a man
 who has done good work in our
 church."

"You have now entered into a con-
 tract. You have asked him to be
 your minister, and you must give him
 your support. You have a fine church
 and a good man. You have good
 material and equipment for the
 work. This is very important, but it
 is only the foundation. Your duty



OUR QUOTA IS 40,330 MEN
THIS DISTRICT HAS ALREADY RECRUITED 39,579 MEN

The Command of Brig-Gen. T. D. R.
 Hemming, G. O. C., Has Made a
 Very Envyable Record.

The latest recruiting return issued
 at headquarters here shows
 that a grand total of 39,579 men
 have been enlisted in this military
 district since the war broke out.
 There exists in military circles the
 widest difference of opinion as to
 what this district's quota of Canada's
 500,000 is, but the Whig's figures
 are being used freely, and generally
 accepted as being as nearly correct
 as possible. The figures published
 a few weeks ago in the Whig were
 supplied by Lieut.-Col. Mulloy, who
 secured them in Ottawa at the first
 recruiting conference there some
 months ago.

Premier Borden on New Year's
 Day asked for 500,000 men from the
 Dominion of Canada. That works
 out as thirteen per cent of the Do-
 minion's population of 3,821,067
 men, which is the figure of the last
 Dominion census. There were 119,
 325 males in this military district
 at the same time. Thirteen per cent
 of that number makes this district's
 total 40,330.

Less than 1,000 men must come
 forward before that number will be
 reached here, but it is variously es-
 timated that between 3,000 and 5,
 000 men have left this district en-
 list in units in Toronto, Montreal and
 other centres outside.

This subject has aroused a great
 amount of interest and more accu-
 rate figures are needed, but there
 seems to be no way of securing them
 until the national registration is
 taken during this winter.
