ALL DESERTERS RELEASED

NEW ORDER-IN-COUNCIL OPENS WAY FOR NEW TREATMENT.

Will Be Sent Over in Senior Unit for Overseas Service—No More Jail Terms for Deserters.

A new method of dealing with deserters from units of this district is being adopted. The old plan, and the one which is in most general use throughout Canada, is to have all deserters tried by a magistrate and sentenced to one or two years' imprisonment. This has been done in Kingston on many occasions. With the supposition that men may not be needed for military purposes by the time this sentence expires, headquarters here does not believe that such a course is in the best interests of the country. These men who desert from an overseas unit, rather than go into the firing line, should be made to go in any case. To do this all that is necessary is to enlist them in some senior unit about to go over.

A recent order-in-council gives authority for the release of deserters from jail if they are to be re-enlisted and full advantage is to be taken immediately.

All the deserters who have been sentenced in places in this district and are now serving terms are to be released as soon as possible and put into the senior unit going overseas. They will then be given the chance to prove their worth, and the country's money for training them will not be lost.

POWER FOR KINGSTON AT \$28 PER HORSEPOWER

Local Commission Is Given This Rate on Taking 1,200 Horsepower.

Chairman Rigney, Commissioner R. F. Elliott and General Manager C. Folger, Wednesday afternoon waited on Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro-Electric Commission, and Chief Engineer Gaby, and were successful in obtaining hydro power for Kingston at \$28 per horsepower. In order to secure this rate, the Utilities Commission will have to contract for 1,200 horsepower, but it will be allowed a leeway of 25 per cent.

The contract will be forwarded by the Hydro-Electric Commission in a few days, and will be executed at the next meeting of the commission, Monday afternoon. Work will be started as soon as the contract is executed.

FRONTENAC CHEESE BOARD.

Sales Made at 23 1/2 Cents at Meeting on Thursday.

At the meeting of the Frontenac Cheese Board on Thursday afternoon 23 1/2 cents was offered for cheese, but only five factories sold at this figure, the salesmen holding off for a higher price. There was boarded 78 boxes of white cheese, and 536 boxes of colored, as follows:
