SARNIA NOW WANT TO MEET CAPITALS

It Would Take the Kingston Game by Default—"Caps" to Decide.

The Toronto Globe says: The Sarnia Collegiate Football club has notified the O.R.F.U. that, while they would like to meet the Kingston Collegiate Institute, the other finalists in the inter-scholastic section of the Ontario Union junior series, known as Second A, they do not feel inclined to wait another week to enable the Kingstonians to come to this city for the "sudden-death" game ordered by the Union. The Sarnians intimated that they preferred, on account of the lateness of the season, to claim the game scheduled for Rosedale's Field on Saturday by default, so as to enable them to meet Capitals of Toronto, winners of Section B, in the finals. The Tunnel City club desire a home-and-home series with Capitals, the first game to be played at Sarnia on Saturday and the return at Sarnia a week later. Secretary Hewitt of the O.R.F.U. could not get in touch with the Capital management last night, declare their intentions today. There is reason to believe that the local team will agree to the home-and-home arrangement desired by the Sarnians. Whether Sarnia will exercise their right to take the Kingston game by default is contingent upon the decision of the Capital management.

"A" BATTERYMAN KILLED.

Corpl. "Nobby" Clarke Met Death in Action With R.C.H.A.

Letters received in the city give particulars of the death of Corpl. Richard Clarke, "A" Battery, R.C.H.A. The deceased was more popularly known as "Nobby" Clark, and was in the battery for six years, and made himself popular with officers and men alike. He carried over seas from Valcartier with the brigade in 1914. The letters are written by men in the unit who helped in finding the body. A shell struck the dugout in which many were working and unfortunately "Nobby" was killed. In Kingston he was a very active member of the Ancient Order of Foresters. All his relatives reside in Ireland.

J. W. Mitchell Comes East.

J. W. Mitchell, who has taken a prominent part in Manitoba's dairying development in recent years, has come east again, and goes to New Brunswick as director of an industrial and dairying. Prof. Mitchell is graduate of Queen's University, and for many years has been actively engaged in dairy work. He is a man of un doubted ability, with education enough to carry him through, and his work in New Brunswick will make an impression on the dairying of the province, beyond doubt.

Lieut. Frank Purdy in France.

Lieut. Frank Purdy writes from France to his father, County Treasurer David Purdy, that he is in command of No. 6 platoon of the 3rd Battalion, having been transferred from the 146th. He had been in the trenches for a couple of days. Lieut. Purdy said that all the officers of the 146th, with the exception of the majors and captains were in France. He asks that a pair of socks be sent for each man of his platoon, forty in number.

Desmond McGrath, aged twelve, of Marmora, who lost his eye as the result of a horse's kick, and Claude Larose, aged fourteen, of Sealey's Bay, who lost his arm as the result of the accidental discharge of his gun, who are both at the Hotel Dieu, are doing splendidly, and their recovery is practically assured.

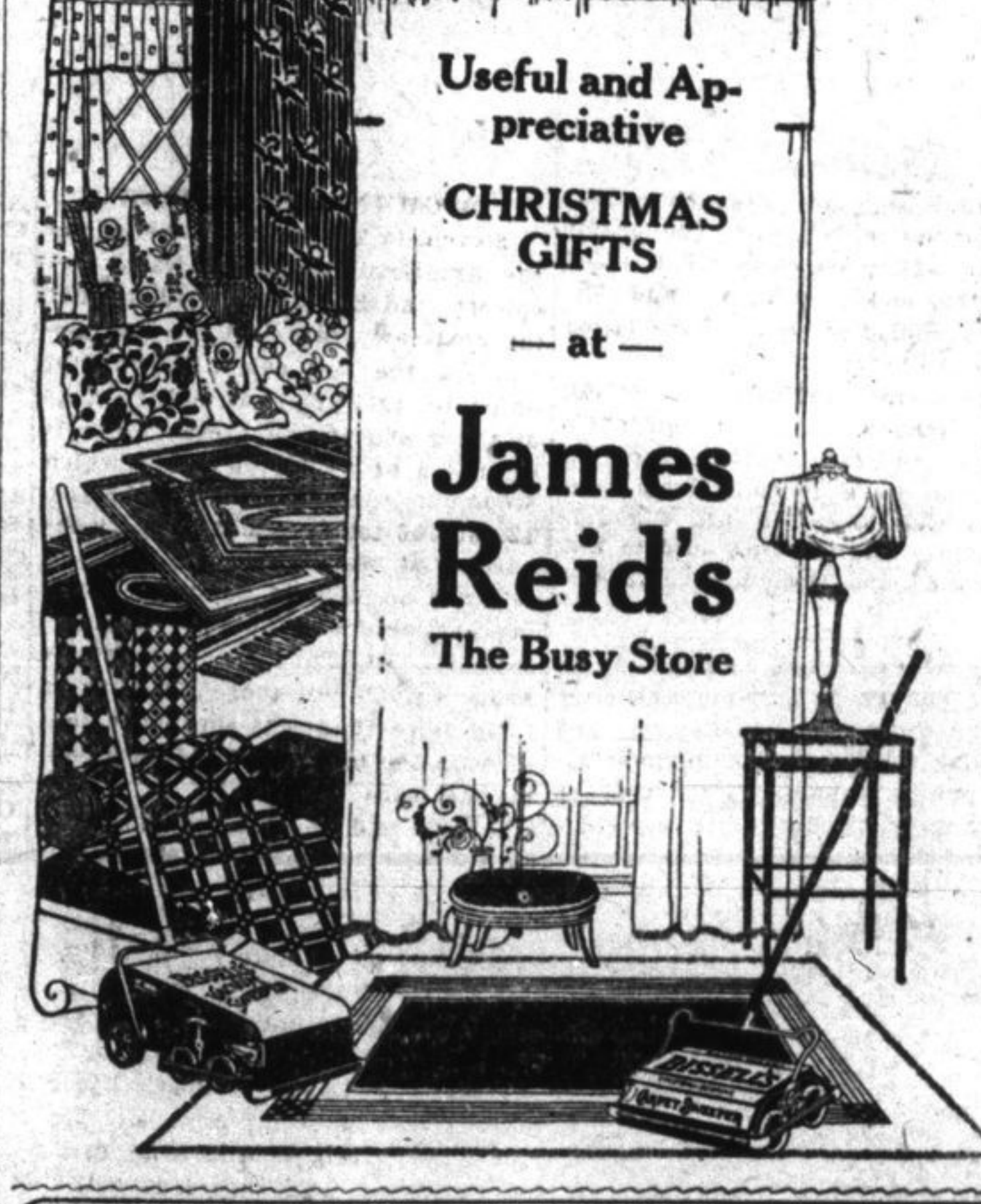
