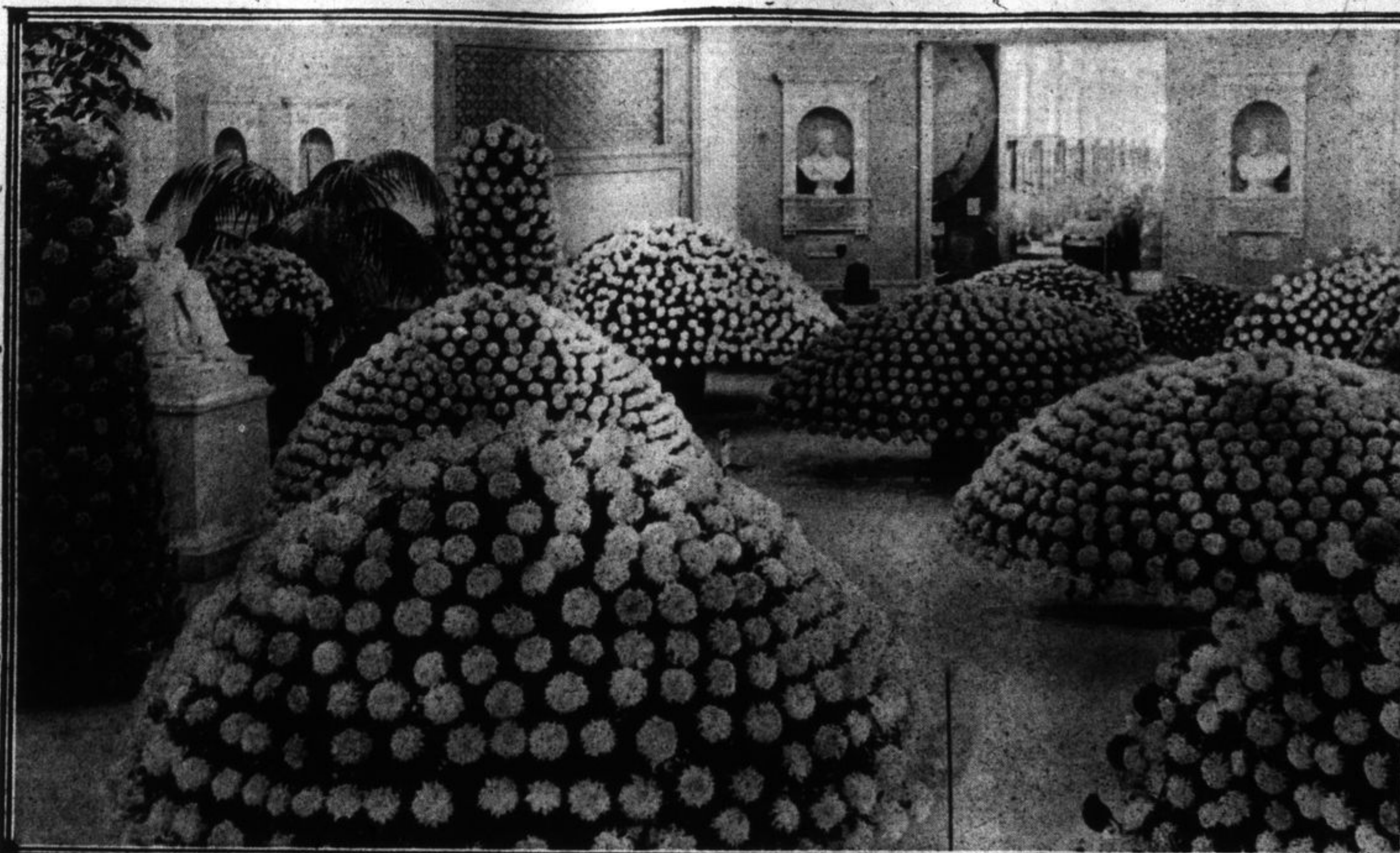


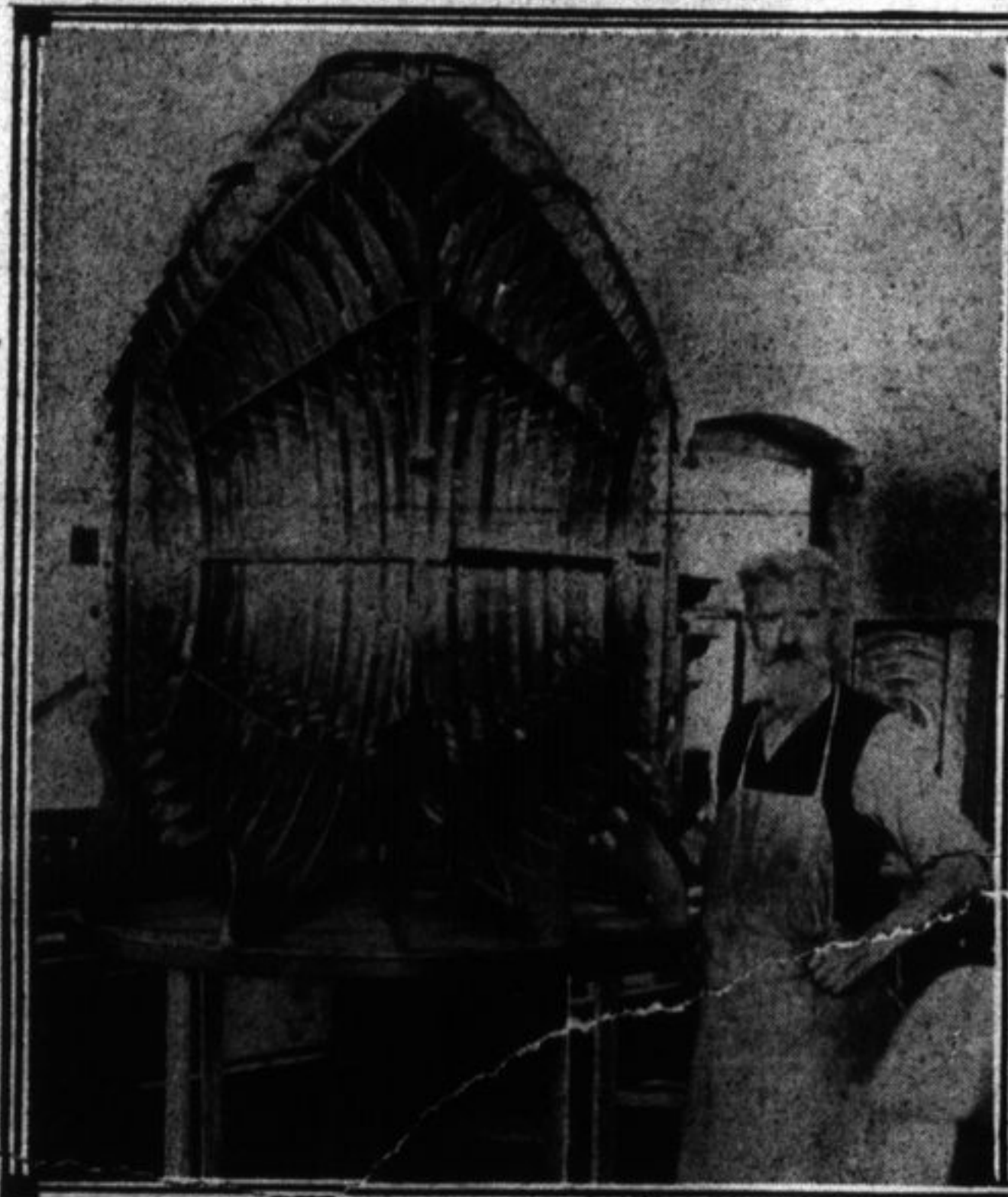
Five Unusual Pictures Focus the World's Leading Events of the Week



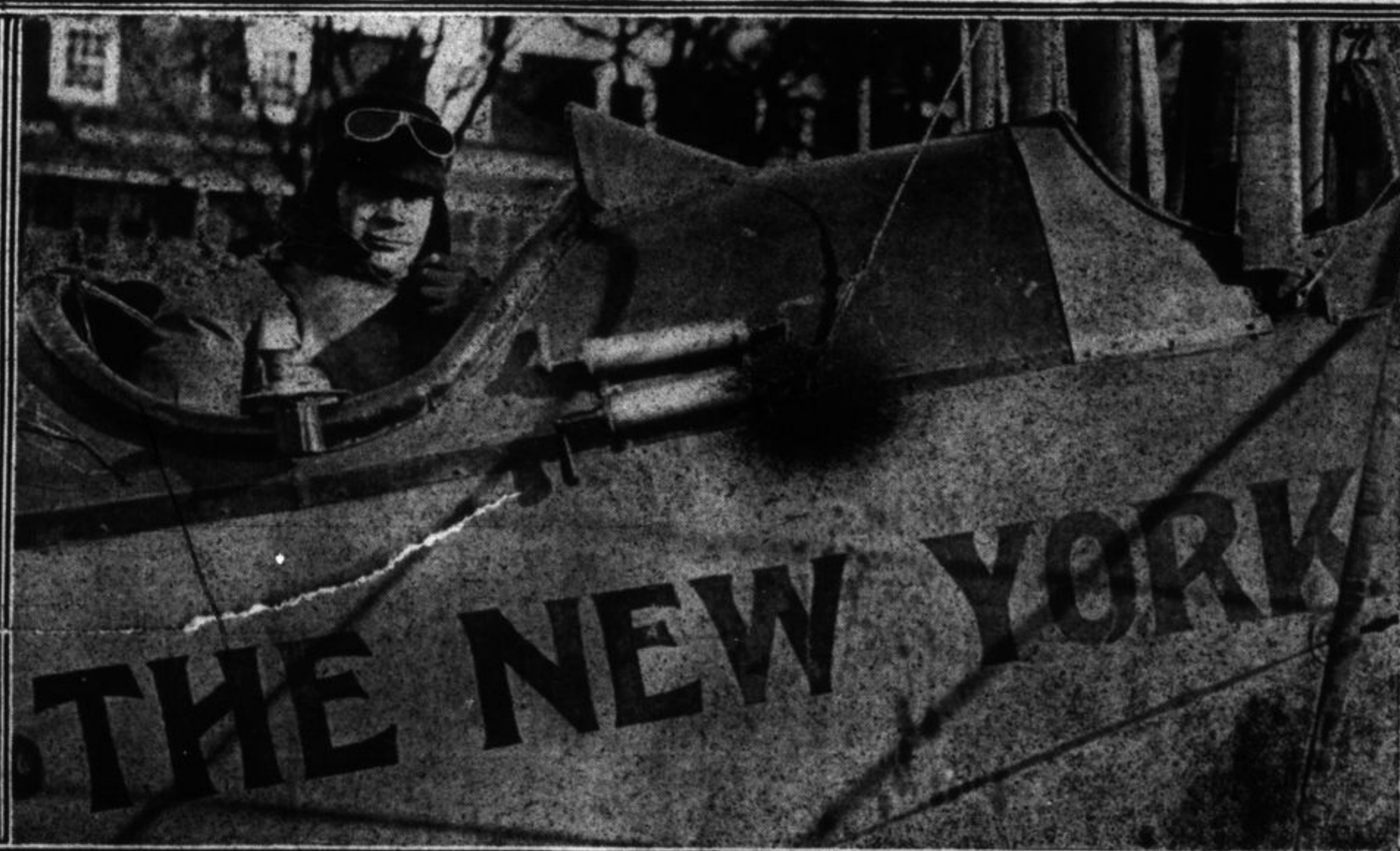

A view in the lighthouse at Tomkinsville, N.Y., where huge lenses flash their beacon many miles.

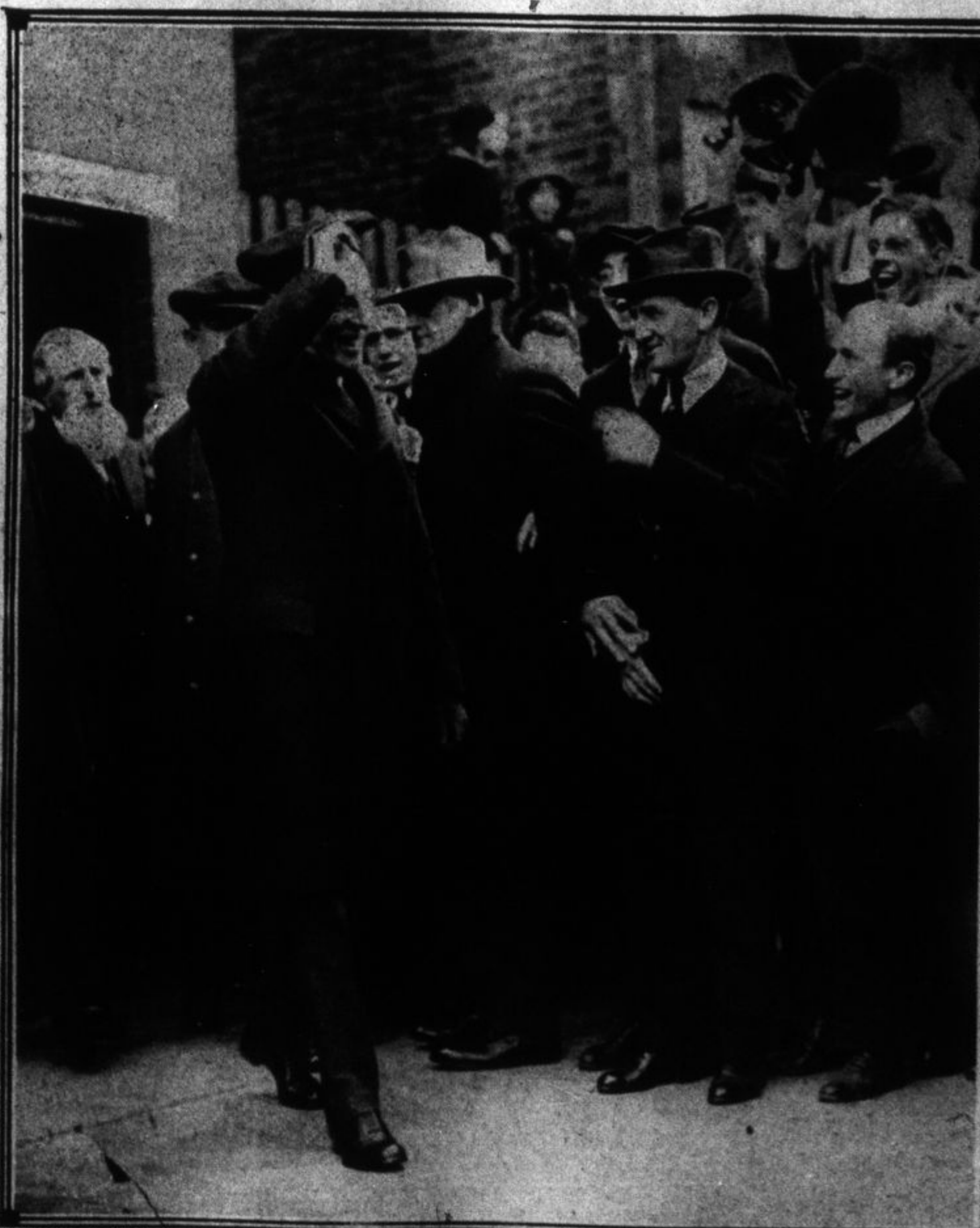

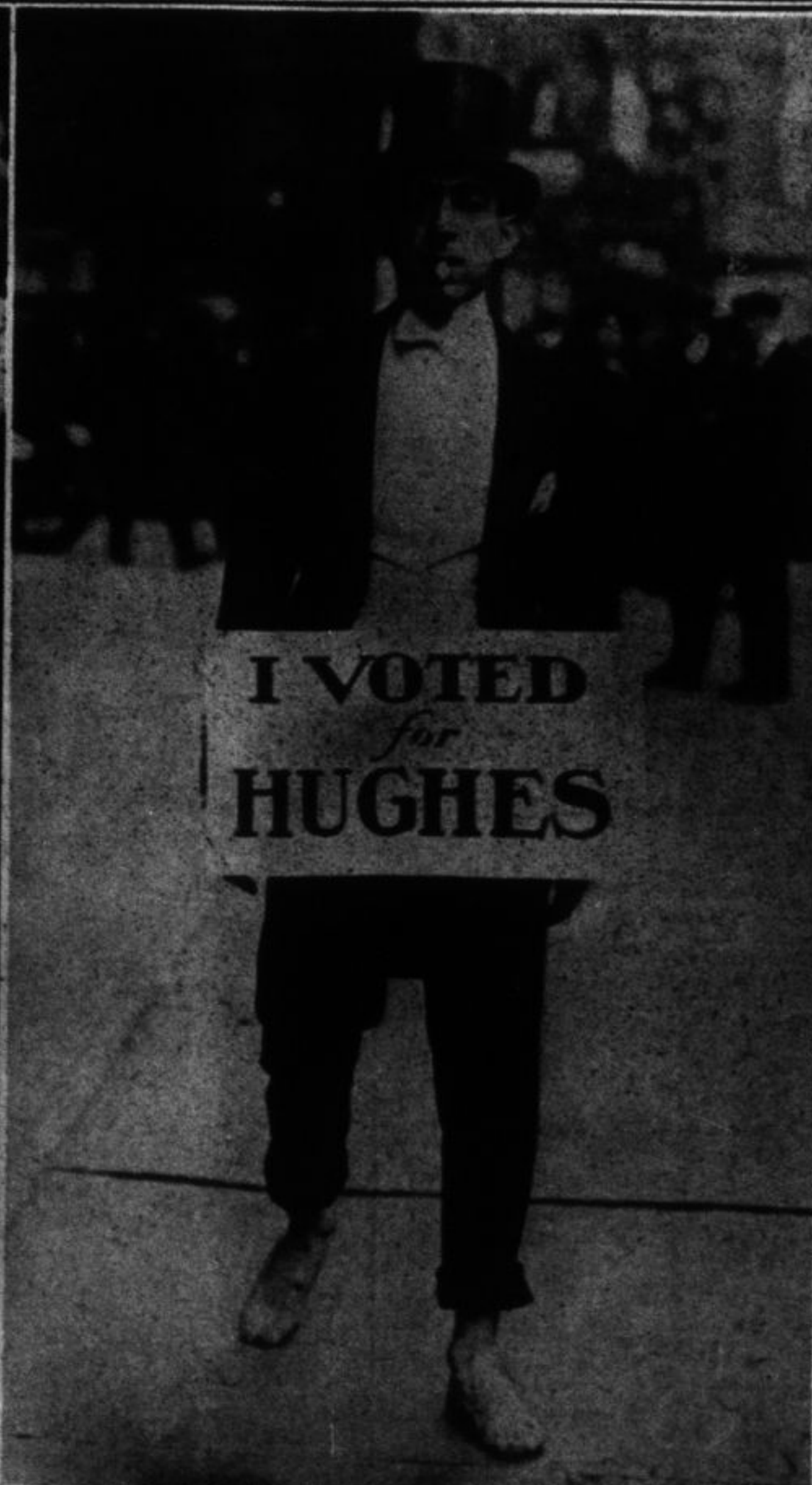


King Constantine of Greece addressing his troops at the palace in Athens during the recent crisis.

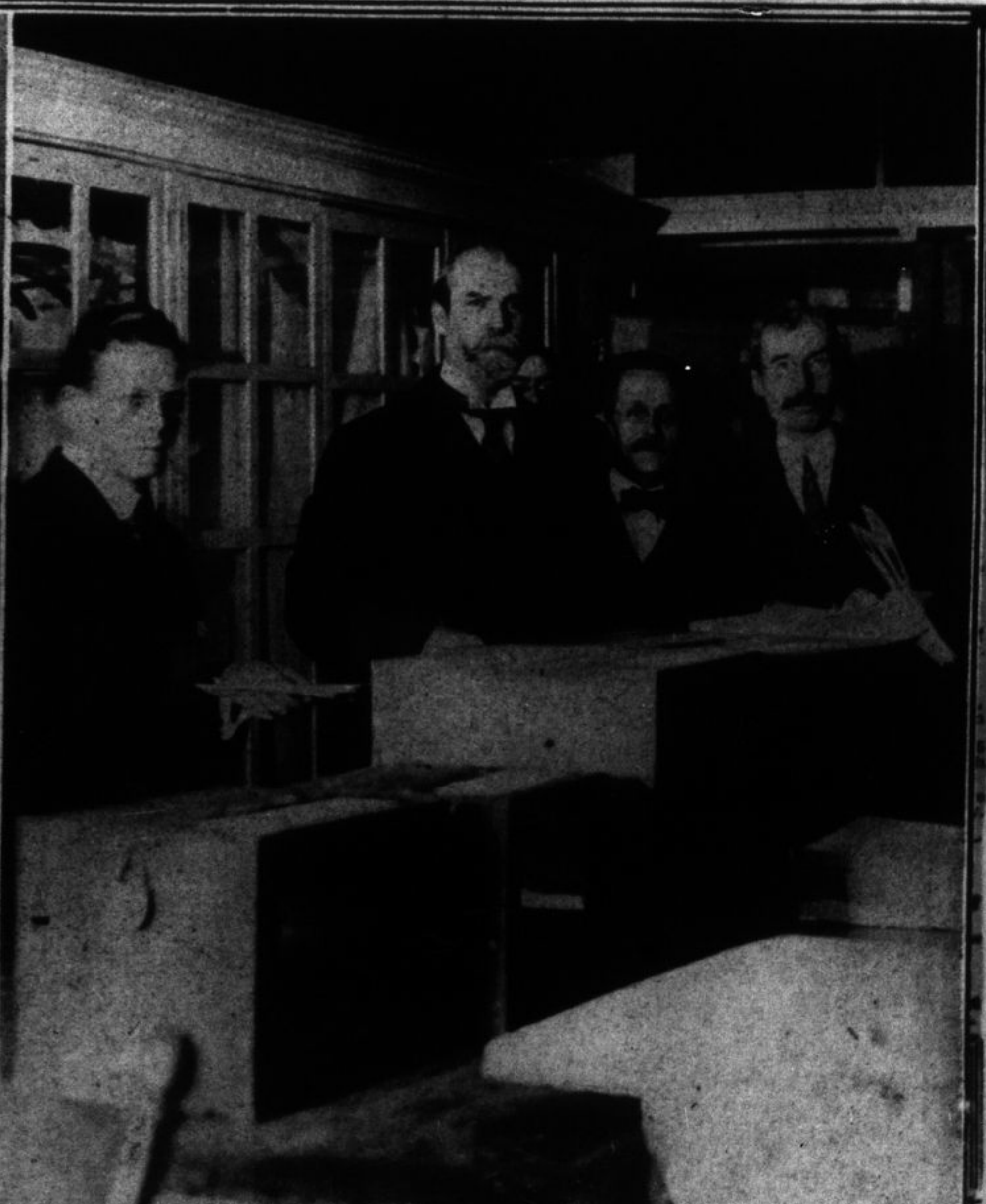
How the President of the United States and His Opponent Voted on Election Day
