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**Boxer's Amateurism Questioned.** The case of Brousseau, the amateur boxing champion, is to be taken up at length by the augmented registration committee of the Quebec section of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada. Members of the committee realize that he is the most promising amateur boxer Canada has had for years, but it is understood that additional charges of boxing professionals on out-of-town trips will be laid.

### SPORTING NOTES.

Augusta, Pa., has been selected by Manager Griffith for the training camp of the Washington American league team next spring. The team has trained for the last five years at Charlottesville, Va.

Tommy Griffith, of the Cincinnati National league club, played his second consecutive season without missing a game. He had played in 315 games without a miss.

Lew McCarty, of the Giants, was the leading catcher of the National league during the past season with George Gibson, the London player, who was ruled out of Pittsburgh in the middle of the season.

The seating capacity of the Chicago National league park will be increased to 24,000, according to plans announced by President Wegman. Six thousand additional grandstand seats will be constructed.

Guy Dunlap, a recruit third baseman, who will report to the Pittsburgh Pirates next spring is regarded by Manager Callahan as a real find. Dunlap played in a trolley league with St. James, Mo., last season and had a batting record of .500 in 59 games. His record is filled with extra base hits.

Joseph Leslie Bush, otherwise known as Joe Bush, of the Philadelphia Athletics, recently won a \$7,500 damage suit against him. He was charged with running down and killing Louis Miller, an aged Northern Pacific flagman, in an automobile. M. E. Ryan, a Philadelphia baseball fan, defended Bush.

Elmer Smith, the Washington outfielder, who was a member of the Cleveland team in the early part of last season, and was one of Fohl's most dependable hitters, has received a contract for next season providing for a nice increase in salary.

The police of Lad., Ill., are hunting for two motorcycle bandits who entered the home of Edward Higgins and held up "Mike" Prendergast, the Chicago Cub pitcher. Prendergast was spending the evening with Higgins when the bandits covered him with a brace of guns and ransacked the house. They then relieved the major league twirler of his watch and cash.

"Duster" Mails, the Brooklyn young pitching recruit, has been picked by his team-mates to set the National league afire next season. Players who know what Mails has yet to show declare that he is going to be a big surprise when he gets started. He has lots of undeveloped stuff and has a great build for a hurler.

Purchase of Pitcher Robinson from the St. Louis Cardinals has been announced by the officials of the Little Rock club, who also purchased infielder D. Walsh from Milwaukee.

"Another Joe Gans." Every once in awhile we hear this claim made for a lightweight boxer, but it is always a false alarm. There won't be another Joe Gans any sooner than there will be another Shakespeare. The little black boy, who was born in Baltimore forty-two years ago, Nov. 25th, 1874, was the only one of his kind. There may be a better lightweight boxer than Joe, but he won't be another Joe. The "old master" succumbed to tuberculosis in Arizona about six years ago, and his passing caused general sorrow throughout the sporting world.

**No Decision in Junior Series.** The junior series of the Ontario Rugby Football Union is finished for this year, and Sarnia Collegiate are champions of section A, or the Inter-scholastic section, while Capitals of Toronto are champions of section B. The play-off between the two section winners is left to the clubs concerned, and is not ordered by O. R. F. U. Sarnia and the Capitals could not reach an agreement.

**New Swimming Record.** Norman Ross, of Stanford University, swam 220 yards at the Olympic Clubhouse, San Francisco, in 2 minutes, 21 3-5 seconds, establishing a new world's record, according to the laws of the International Swimming Federation, officials of which supervised the swim.

### WHO ARE CHAMPIONS?

This is a Rugby Puzzle in the United States.

The crest of the eastern football season passed with the playing of the spectacular gridiron classics of Saturday, leaving in its wake shattered idols and newborn heroes. The famous Harvard machine, built up at Cambridge during the past few years, was scrapped by a rejuvenated Yale eleven by a score of six to three at the same hour that the Army was wrecking the hopes of the Navy for an eleventh hour victory. The score in the latter game was 15 to 7.

On other fields similar scenes were enacted, and there remain only the contests of Thanksgiving Day (next Thursday) before the curtain is lowered on the great college sport for another year. The other games of the day developed nothing in the way of upsets or extraordinary play.

### IS AFTER TYRUS COBB

Great Things Expected of Sam Rice of Washington.

In Sam Rice, Clark Griffith believes he has a pitcher who will come pretty near leading the league in batting next year. Rice was a pitcher, who has been converted into an outfielder. In 59 games last season he had a batting average of .316 and in 19 games it is said he was suffering from malaria. When he got back into the game in the fall he gave a wonderful exhibition of hitting, going at prey near a .500 clip. Ty Cobb says he is by far the most promising hitter who has come into the league in recent years. "And I never saw such hitting as Rice did in Philadelphia and New York in the closing games of the season," says Griffith. "He drove in all the runs we got with long, clean drives between the fields, and he looked to be the greatest hitter I have ever seen."

### GEORGE MORIARITY EMPIRE

Former Detroit Player Added to American League Staff.

George Moriarity, of Chicago, the former Detroit player, has been signed as an umpire in the American League. B. B. Johnson, president, announced. Moriarity finished last season as manager of the Memphis Club of the Southern League after starting the season as a candidate for an infield position on the Chicago American team. The American League staff of umpires for 1917 already contains the usual eight, but whether Moriarity will be used as a ninth and extra arbiter, or whether one of the veterans is to be dropped, Johnson refused to say.

### Resent Cuts in Salaries.

"Newsy" Lalonde may not play hockey this winter. The reduced salary offered to him is not any more palatable to him than to other players, and it is understood that he has an offer from a friend in the racing business to spend the winter in Havana at a good salary.

Art Ross it is said, is also far from satisfied with the inducements offered him in his contract with the Ottawa club.

### To Play in Detroit.

A Detroit despatch says: Applications for games with Detroit hockey clubs for 1916 are coming in rapidly from Canadian cities. Among the teams which will be seen here this season are: Riversides, of Toronto, senior champions of the O.H.A., who will be given dates on Jan. 1 and 2; the Toronto R. and A.A., A. A. Lees, of Toronto, who won the junior O.H.A. championship in 1915-16, and split even in a pair of ice contests in Detroit, also want to come here, as well as the Aberdeens, of Ottawa; McGill University, of Montreal; Preston and Kingston.

The new arena will be unable to open Thanksgiving night, but it is hoped to open the first week in December.

### O. H. A. Annual Meeting.

The annual convention of the Ontario Hockey Association, which is to be held next Saturday morning at Toronto, will have plenty of interest for the clubs and delegates in the discussion of the various amendments that have been submitted for consideration. The suggestion to eliminate body-checking has already caused wide discussion, and there is sure to be a lively debate when this matter is introduced. There are controversial subjects, but this is the most important, as it means a radical change in the game if it is adopted.

### HAS ALWAYS BEEN FAIR AND JUST

President Tener Defends the National Commission From Attacks.

"Should the major league players declare a sympathetic strike because of the refusal of the National Association to grant certain requests of the Baseball Players' Fraternity it will be a strike not against the National Commission, but against the very game of baseball itself," said President John K. Tener, of the National League, in a statement issued in reply to a strike threat made by President David Fultz, of the fraternity.

"I cannot conceive that young men like our players can talk of attempting to tie up their business over such a trivial matter as is involved in the dispute between the Players' Fraternity and the minor leagues. A strike of this kind would simply mean that big league players would have to bear the entire brunt of it. The class AA and A minor leagues could easily pick up sixteen men for their teams, while the big leagues were idle.

### Maranville a Coach.

Rabbit Maranville, the brilliant little star shortstop of the Boston Braves, is not a college product, having learned his baseball on the sand lots whenever he could spare any time from his regular job, which was first assistant to a plumber. However, the "Rabbit" is working as hard as a coach, as his illustrious boss, Percy Haughton, is telling in Cambridge. Maranville is coach of the Springfield club of Springfield, Mass., and he daily is driving thirty gridironers through their paces. The "Rabbit" worth as a coach will be better known on Thanksgiving Day when his charges meet the Atlanta Boat club in their annual battle.

### Advice to the O.H.A.

The Toronto Mail Empire says: Those behind the O.H.A. motion to do away with body-checking point to the Western teams as an example of how the game should be played without using the body. However, they forgot to mention that Westerners played a very selfish game, and it was nothing to see a player hogging the puck continually. It's hard enough to make players play combination even with body-checking run loose.

### Brooklyn Open-Air Rink

Brooklyn will soon boast of one of the largest open-air skating rinks in the United States. Harry Pollock, who manages Freddie Welsh, has made arrangements to build a large open-air rink in Washington Park and has requested Manager George Kennedy, of the Canadian Hockey Club, Montreal, to go to Brooklyn to help draw up the plans.

### A New Hockey League.

The Eastern Canada Amateur Hockey Association was formed at a meeting at the St. Regis hotel, Montreal when nine leagues in Montreal, Ottawa, Quebec and Cornwall covering fifty clubs were represented. H. Reg. Sims, Ottawa, was elected president.

### To Receive Consideration.

The National Baseball Commission will hold a special meeting in Chicago on Wednesday. Changes in the new form of players' contracts will be among the subjects considered. The question of a change in the Chairmanship of the Commission will not be brought up.

### Another Track in Cuba.

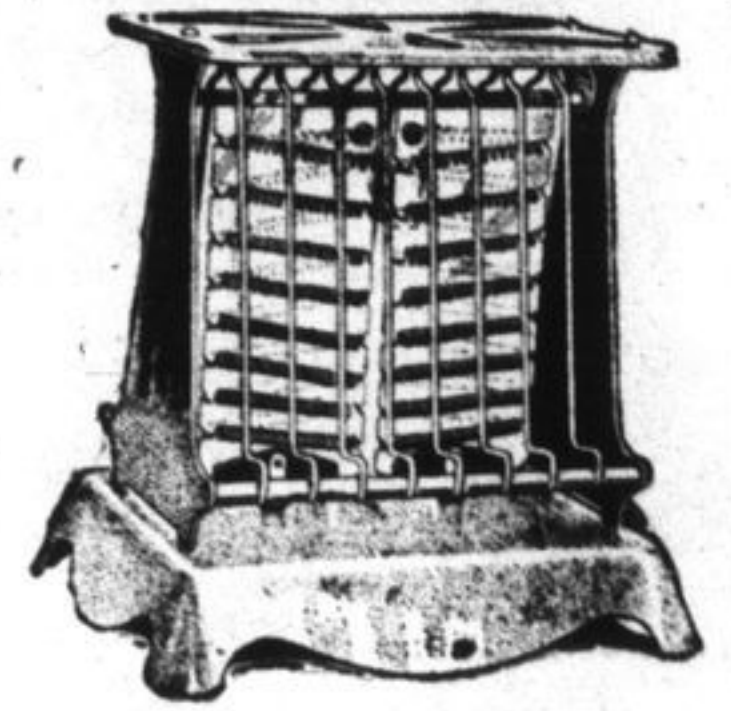
