**FINED BY MAGISTRATE FOR DRAWING A REVOLVER ON HIS FATHER-IN-LAW.**

Arthur Burchall was taxed \$10 and costs for pulling out a gun—serious charge of threatening to shoot was amended.

Because he drew a revolver on his father-in-law, Joseph Rollow, Arthur Burchall was fined \$10 and costs in the Police Court on Thursday morning. The case came up on Wednesday, and was adjourned a day for further evidence.

Burchall gave evidence on his own behalf. He said the revolver was not loaded, that the chamber was missing. He further stated that he did not pull the revolver out of his pocket until after his father-in-law had made the threat that he would fill him full of holes.

To D. A. Givens, who appeared for Rollow, the accused stated that he had thrown away the revolver which figured in the affair. Mr. Givens stated that he understood that a search had been made for the revolver, and that it could not be found.

"I did not point it at him," said Burchall, "I pulled it out when I saw him going towards his rifle."

The first charge against Burchall was that of threatening to shoot his father-in-law, but it was amended after the hearing of the evidence on Wednesday. He was then charged with carrying a revolver, and in giving judgment, Magistrate Farrell referred to this fact. The new charge was not quite so serious, but at the same time, the law recognized the seriousness of allowing people to carry fire arms. However, in this case there had been no evidence to show that the accused intended to do anything serious. It was very foolish for him to have pulled out the revolver, but in view of his previous good record, he would dispose of the case with a minimum fine of \$10 and costs.

**MUST HAVE LIGHTS BURNING.**

Police Out With a Big Stick After the Auto Drivers.

The police are out with a big stick after all automobile drivers who are violating the Motor Vehicles Act.

David H. Funnell was up in the Police Court on Thursday morning. The charge was that of driving his automobile on Nov. 19th with the tail lights out.

"They were going when I started," said Funnell, but Constable Leslie Armstrong, who laid the charge, told about seeing the car travelling on the down town streets with the rear of the car in darkness. The fine was \$5 and costs.

There was a similar charge against G. M. Ferguson, laid by Constable Leslie Armstrong, but it appears that the car alleged to have been driven without the tail lights, was sold by Mr. Ferguson in July to Sergt John Harte. Owing to the mixup an enlargement was made till Monday.

**EXTEND GOOD ROADS AREA WAS A PRISONER OF WAR**

Suburban Area is Included—County Council Asked for Grant to Belgian Fund and to Assist 253rd Battalion in Recruiting.

An appeal for a grant to the Belgian relief fund was made to the county council on Wednesday afternoon by Rev. F. G. Kirkpatrick and G. M. Macdonnell, K.C. The warden referred the matter to the finance committee.

At the Thursday morning session of the council a by-law was presented for the extension of the good roads system in the townships of Kingston, Pittsburg, Storrington, Loughboro and Portland. All the main roads leading out of the city of Kingston to be included as follows: Pocklington, Front, Bath, York, Sydenham, Portland, Perth and Storrington. These additional roads include the suburban road area in which Kingston and Frontenac are interested.

A by-law was presented to ratify the by-law passed by Hinchinbrook township council last day closing a road allowance.

The council adjourned until the afternoon, when a deputation from the 253rd Battalion, headed by Lieut.-Col. P. G. C. Campbell, was heard. The council was asked to lend its assistance in the recruiting campaign of this unit.

**LIEUT. CROZIER NOW ADMUTANT OF SPECIAL SERVICE.**

Taken Prisoner at Langemarck and Was in Germany for Five Months. The Special Service Company now, quartered at Artillery park has, as its adjutant, an officer who was for five months a prisoner of war in Germany. Lieut. Charles Crozier enlisted as a private, when the war broke out, in the 24th Montreal Battalion, and went overseas, being in the engagement at Langemarck which cost so many lives. He had his leg broken and a wound in his shoulder after being taken back of the lines he awakened in a German hospital. After five months imprisonment it was decided that he was unfit for further service and was exchanged. Arriving in Canada Lieut. Crozier went with the 19th Battalion and through Victoria and Haliburton counties did splendid recruiting work by showing the people the conditions in France and Germany, which he had experienced. After signing up a great many men he was then granted a commission in the 139th Battalion of Cobourg and came to Barrfield with that unit. Since the 139th went overseas Lieut. Crozier has been with the St. Lawrence Canal Patrol at Morrisburg but a few days ago was again transferred here and is now on duty with Capt. W. J. Thorne's command.
