OIL BARGE WAS RELEASED

THE TUG RAY STANTON GOT HER OFF ON THURSDAY.

Went on at Grenadier Island in Big Gale a Week Ago—Was Taken on to Montreal to Undergo Repairs. The tug Ray Stanton, of the Pyke Towing and Forwarding Company, succeeded in pulling off the Standard Oil barge No. 82 on Thursday. The barge went aground off Grenadier Island when she broke away from a tug in the terrible gale of a week ago to-day.

It was feared that the barge would have to be left on the rocks until the spring, as her bottom was badly damaged, and was in a very difficult place for the wreckers.

In stopping the leaks, fifty mattresses, 3,000 feet of lumber and twenty tons of concrete were used by the wreckers, and work was continued day and night until the difficult task was accomplished.

The huge vessel is an ocean-going boat on her maiden trip from Cleveland to New York, and was caught in the eighty-mile gale of last Thursday, broke away from the tug, and washed with such a force on the rocks that many leaks were made.

Wednesday night at 7.30 o'clock the "tanker" was ready for the tugs to pull on, but owing to the heavy seas and darkness it was not possible, and during the night she was taken out into deep water one half mile from shore.

During the night the gale increased, but in the morning, in spite of the tremendous seas, the captain of the tug decided to bring the "tanker" out, as delay might mean the work all over again.

A buoy was set out in twenty feet of water, outside of which the tug Lutze was obliged to stay. Although only drawing twelve feet, she struck the bottom several times between the seas. A ten-inch hawser, 3,000 feet long, was taken from the "tanker" by the Stanton, and after two hours of dangerous work the boat was again in deep water.

Loud were the praises for the wreckers by the Standard Oil Company's officials.

The barge was taken to Montreal to undergo repairs.

Movements of Vessels.

The steambarge John Randall is in Davis dry dock undergoing repairs.

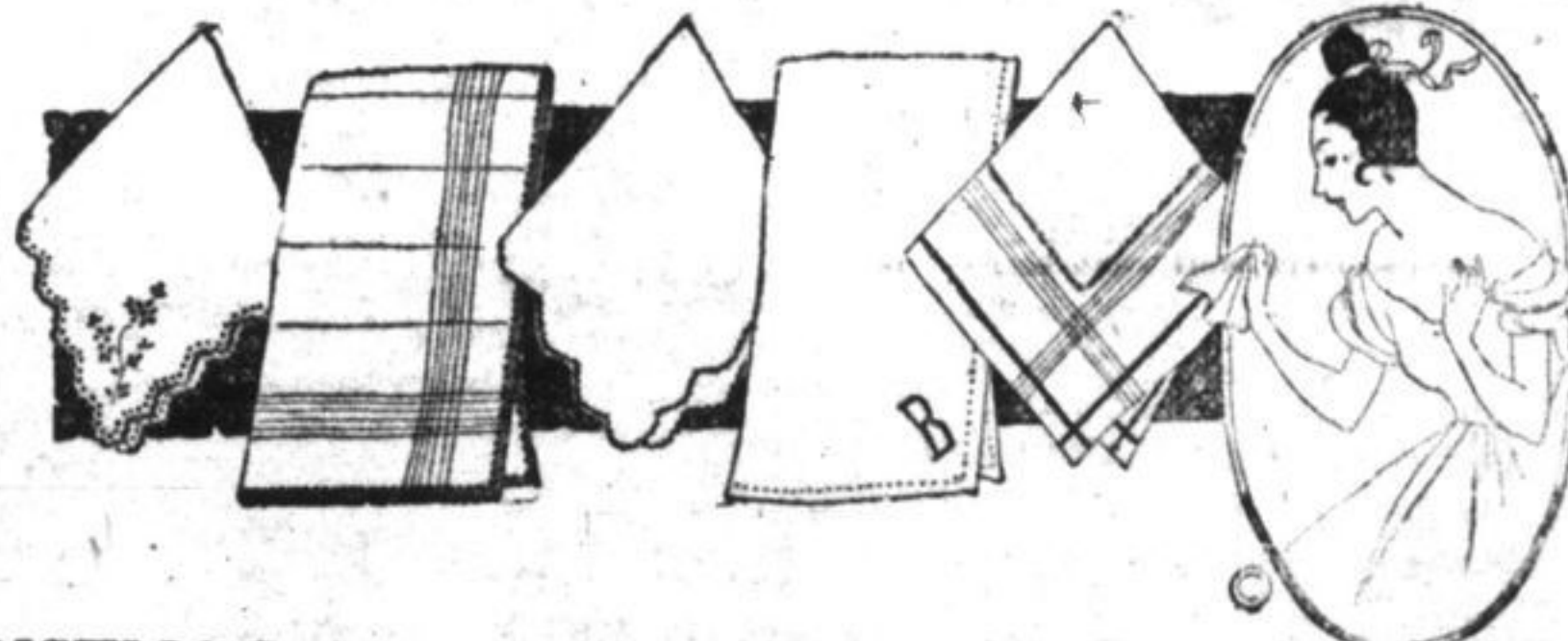
