### ST. LUKE'S NEW RECTOR AT THE MILITARY Y.M.C.A.

REV. JOHN DE PENCIER WRIGHT HAS BEEN APPOINTED.

He is a Nephew of the Bishop of New Westminster—Will Take Over His New Duties in January.

Rev. John de Pencier Wright, M.A., B.D., has been appointed by the Lord Bishop of Kingston as rector of St. Luke's church, to succeed Rev. Canon R. S. Forneri, M.A., B.D., who resigned on November 1st of the year.

The following comprised the special committee appointed by the congregation to confer with the Bishop and submit three names to him: A. J. Murray, A. J. Shannon, church warden, George Compton, W. J. Saunders, and H. Jennings.

Rev. John de Pencier Wright, M.A., B.D., is the second son of the late Rural Dean Wright of Athens, and a nephew of his Lordship the Bishop of New Westminster. He was born in Carleton county in 1873, and received his early education at the Newboro and Athens schools. He entered Trinity University, Toronto, in 1893, where his college course was most brilliant. He was university scholar in philosophy in 1895 and prize man at his graduation with honors in the same subject in 1896.

In his divinity course he won prizes in new testament Greek, in liturgies and dogmatics. He completed his divinity course in 1898, with the degree of L.Th. In 1898 he tried the Bishop's examination for deacon's orders, and came first out of a class of seven, all of whom were graduates in both arts and divinity. Mr. Wright began his ministerial work in the North Admiration mission, and also served at Kingston, Amherstburg and Lyn, in all places with marked success. In 1913 Mr. Wright passed successfully his examination for the degree of bachelor of divinity, the examination being that set by the Board of Examiners for all Canada. His department was New Testament Greek. He received his degree from his Alma Mater in the same year. Mr. Wright was a representative of the Diocese of Ontario and the Provincial Synod, which met in Hamilton this year. He has also been a member of the Mission Board for some years, and was recently appointed by the Bishop a member of the executive committee. This year he built a beautiful church at Addison, which has been paid for.

Just recently Mr. Wright was offered a lucrative position at Whitby and also at other places, but refused. The members of the congregation of St. Luke's are to be congratulated in the very wise and popular choice which they have made in selecting Rev. John de Pencier Wright as their new rector. Mr. Wright married Miss Lockridge, of Tamworth. He has a brother in the ministry, Rev. S. B. Wright, of Matilda. The appointment has caused general satisfaction throughout the congregation. The new rector will take over his duties at the first of the new year.

### SERGT.-MAJOR O'HARA GIVEN HIS LIBERTY

He Was Found Not Guilty of Having Committed an Indecent Assault.

Sergt.-Major O'Hara, who was committed for trial on the charge of indecent assault, and who was arraigned Monday morning before Judge Lavell, was discharged, as the evidence was not sufficient to convict him. The court stated that there were two reasons for dismissing the prisoner. One was that the evidence regarding the alleged assault was not conclusive enough to remove a reasonable doubt as to the prisoner's guilt. The other reason was that whatever was done was done with the consent of the girl. She might have made a verbal remonstrance, but she made no physical resistance; raised no outcry, although people were continually passing by. The alleged offence took place in Frontenac Park close to a granolithic walk.

The prisoner vehemently denied the charge. He admitted kissing the girl, but this hardly constitutes a criminal assault. After the case was disposed of the girl fainted in the corridor of the court house, but was soon revived.

J. L. Whiting, K.C., appeared for the Crown, and T. J. Rigney for the prisoner.

### STARVING PRISONERS IN GERMAN CAMPS

Letter Received by American Consul Proves This Dreadful Statement.

The work that the American Consul in Germany is certainly appreciated, as is shown by a letter he has received from a brother of one of the prisoners who is receiving parcels through this source. The letter reads in part as follows:

"I wish to thank you most sincerely for your kind attitude towards the boys of the Allies unfortunately in camps as prisoners of war. I appreciate very much that my brother is also benefited by your benevolent activity.

"It seems, however, that the conditions in Germany are reaching a critical stage; distribution of eatables among the prisoners of war has been limited to such a degree as to cause many prisoners of war to succumb. Three friends of my brother in the camp have recently died of exhaustion. I intend to forward a parcel every two weeks."

Harry Kirk, of the 2nd Field Ambulance, Toronto. During the evening refreshments were served by a number of cathedral ladies, assisted by H. Peach and Lieut. Douglas.

Just before the close Rev. George Clendinning, of Brock Street church, and Pte. the Rev. R. C. Bartels, of Q. F. A., expressed the best thanks of the soldiers to the ladies of St. George's cathedral for the splendid entertainment.

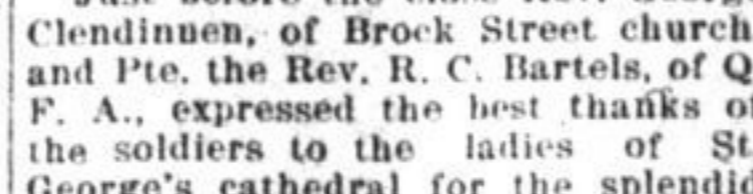
