STARVING PRISONERS IN GERMAN CAMPS

Letter Received by American Consul Proves This Dreadful Statement.

The work that the American Consul is doing for the prisoners of war in Germany is certainly appreciated, as is shown by a letter he has receiv-ed from a brother of one of the prisoners who is receiving parcels through this source. The letter reads in part as follows:

"I wish to thank you most sincerely for your kind attitude towards the boys of the Allies unfortunately in camps as prisoners of war. I appreciate very much that my brother is also benefited by your benevolent

"It seems, however, that the conditions in Germany are reaching a eritical stage; distribution of eatables among the prisoners of war has been limited to such a degree as to cause many prisoners of war to succumb. Three friends of my brother in the camp have recently died of exhaustion. I intend to forward a parcel every two weeks."
