SIX KILLED IN ACTION

QUEEN'S (40TH) BATTERY SUFFERED SOME CASUALTIES.

A Letter Tells of An Action in Which Six Were Killed and Three Were Wounded.

Harold Donaldson, overseas with the 46th Queen's Battery, has written an interesting letter to a friend in the city, which reads in part as follows:

"I am writing this on my knee, and my hands are so cold I can hardly write. We are still in the same position. I never saw such a country for mud, wet and cold. It has been fairly during the last week but so dark that the mud does not dry up. Especially around the wagon lines it is easily six inches deep. I was down for a bath which was the first for two months. I can tell you it was a luxury. The only water we got to wash in is out of shell holes and is pretty dirty."

We had very bad luck down here. We have lost six killed and three wounded. First we lost Gunner Scott, our cook, who was from Kingston. Next a dug-out was hit and Sergt. Laturney, Edward Corkhill, P. Cahill and Leo Blackader were killed. Then the other morning our drivers got it when a shell hit by a wagon. Poor "Bill" Keary from Vancouver was killed and Drivers Taylor, Wilson, George Mollard and Harvey Reeve were wounded. I was driving on a wagon behind and got my face scratched. Both my horses were scratched and the horse behind was killed. It was certainly a close shave. We had seven horses killed in that mess.

The 46th was split up over here into two sections—right and left. After a month and a half we were formed again and do not think we will be again split."

The death occurred on Friday of a highly respected resident of the township of Edwardsburg in the person of Mrs. John McAuley. She had lived in Spencerville for some time.

NURSING SISTER ARRIVES

MRS. W. H. LLOYD ARRIVED ON THE MISSANABIE.

No. 7 General Hospital (Queen's)

Handled a Great Number of Patients—Her Husband Medical Officer of 235th.

At noon Wednesday Nursing Sister Pearl Lloyd, formerly Miss Pearl Morton, arrived in the city from France after being overseas with No. 7 General Hospital. Nursing Sister Lloyd enlisted a year ago, and in February left with re-inforcements for the Queen's Hospital overseas. She crossed on the S. S. Scandinavia. After four months in England the re-inforcements left for France and for the next five months were at Treport where the hospital was under canvas.

Through family reasons, her return to Canada was asked for and through the kindness of Lieut.-Col. F. Etherington, commanding the hospital, she was able to return, going to Shorncliffe for a short while and then sailing from Liverpool. The Queen's Hospital has been very busy during the past summer handling the wounded cases from the Brno line. The general plan followed was to discharge the patients as soon as possible, as they were arriving in large numbers continually and a quick clearing was necessary. For this reason the work was heavy on the staff, but the patients seemed more than satisfied with the results and the care they were given.

Nursing Sister Lloyd is leaving with her husband Lieut. W. H. Lloyd for Belleville where he is joining the 235th Battalion as medical officer. He graduated in the last class at Queen's Medical College.

Railroad Y. M. C. A.

Niagara Falls, Dec. 6.—The campaign of the Railroad Y. M. C. A. of America to raise 20,000 new members in ten days has ended in a gratifying manner. Instead of 20,000 they got 38,134, nine thousand being gathered in on the tenth day. The Grand Trunk was asked to supply 550 new members, but they rolled up 569. The Railroad Y. M. C. A. has a membership of 122,000 in Canada and the United States.
