**HOW PTE. PECOR MET DEATH**

HE WAS INSTANTLY KILLED DURING A SUCCESSFUL ATTACK.

Chaplain of 47th Writes to the Deceased's Wife, Who is Left With Ten Children.

Mrs. C. A. Pecor, widow of the late Pte. Pecor, 80th Battalion, has received the following letter from Capt. Harold McCausland, chaplain 47th Canadian:

"You have no doubt heard already from official sources of the death in action of your husband, Pte. C. A. Pecor, of this battalion. It took place during a successful attack shortly after midnight of November 19th/11th. I believe his death was quite instantaneous, and he was buried by his comrades near the spot where he fell close to the village of Courcellette, Somme, France. Any effects of a personal nature he may have had will doubtless be forwarded to you in due course.

"May I as chaplain of the 47th offer to you my most sincere and deep sympathy. Your husband's death was a noble and splendid sacrifice to a great and a righteous cause, and you may rest assured that he has not died in vain. We will remember him among us as one of our heroes. May God bless and support you and all others who mourn the death of this brave and faithful soldier."

**Mrs. Pecor's Pension.**  
Mrs. Pecor, left with ten children owing to the death of her husband, Private C. A. Pecor, at the front, will receive a pension of \$86 a month.
