TO BRING DOWN PRICES.

North Bay Town Council Urges Drastic Measures.

North Bay, Dec. 6.—North Bay town council passed a resolution urging that the Federal Government confiscate all wheat in all elevators and all food in cold storage, allowing the owners a reasonable profit, and commandeering all flour mills, sugar refineries, canning and packing houses, with storehouses and contents, and coal mines, to be operated by a commission, also railways and cars when needed, and to compel all manufacturers, mine owners and wholesalers to sell commodities for domestic uses to other persons, at prices and in quantities usually sold to the trade.

New Vote of Credit.

London, Dec. 6.—The new vote of credit which the Premier will ask the House of Commons to agree to on Thursday will be for £400,000,000. This would bring the total for 1916 up to £1,750,000,000.

Baked Tomatoes with Bacon Remove thin slices from top and bottom of ripe tomatoes, then divide each into two thick slices. Place in a baking tin and set in a moderate oven. When the tomatoes are partially cooked place on each half a crossing of two strips of thin bacon. Increase the heat so that the bacon will crisp nicely. Serve on rounds of buttered toast.

Flemish Fish Brush the bottom of a baking pan with a layer of chopped onions. On top of this place the fish, which has been carefully washed. Brush the top with the yolk of an egg and salt and pepper and the juice of a lemon. Bake in a quick oven thirty minutes. Place half a pint of water in pan where fish was cooked, add two level tablespoons of butter and two of flour, rubbes together, stir into smooth, add half a teaspoon of salt. Strain over fish.

Graham Muffins. Cream together one and one-half tablespoons of melted butter and two heaping teaspoons of light brown sugar. Add one well-beaten egg and one cup of milk. Sift together one-half spoon of salt, two teaspoons of baking powder, one cup of white flour and three quarters of a cup of Graham flour. Bake in gem pans
