EXODUS OF OFFICERS IS TO BE EXPECTED

Gen. Turner Likely to Cut Off Heads of Idle Canadians.

(Special to the Whig.) Ottawa, Dec. 8.—It was authoritatively stated this morning that no distinction is to be made in England between members of Parliament and other Canadian officers in reducing the number of unemployed officers of higher rank now overseas. Any officer of higher rank than lieutenant who cannot get to France or whose services cannot be utilized in England or France must resume civilian life.

The appointment of Major-General Turner, V.C., to command the Canadian troops in England is expected to be followed by the ruthless lopping off of deadwood. He has been at the front since the beginning of the war, and will not tolerate the existence of men whose only claim to militarism is the wearing of uniform and drawing of the King's pay. The coming winter will likely see an exodus from England back to Canada of scores of such officers.

Newark, N.J., cheers greeted Mrs. Margaret Beutinger late Thursday afternoon when she left the Court House to appear before a grand jury by the murder of her husband, Cristof Beutinger, a well-to-do coat merchant, whom she shot in their home in Caldwell last July.
